

Two-time Golden Globe®, SAG®, and Emmy® nominee Christina Ricci is one of Hollywood's most respected actors.

Ricci will next be seen reprising her fan-favorite role as 'Misty Quigley' in the highly anticipated third season of Showtime's hit drama series "Yellowjackets," a performance that earned her an Emmy nomination for Best Supporting Actress in a Drama Series. In 2022, she appeared in Tim Burton's "Wednesday," Netflix's second most-watched English-language series of all time, which received an Emmy nomination for Outstanding Comedy Series." Ricci has received great acclaim in various roles including Ang Lee's ensemble film, "The Ice Storm." She then went on to star as 'Dedee Truit' in the scathing comedy "The Opposite of Sex," for which she received Best Actress Golden Globe® Award, American Comedy Award, and Independent Spirit Award nominations for her work in the film.

Upcoming, Ricci will star alongside Hamish Linklater in the true crime series "Chop Shop," inspired by the Kathy Braidhill book of the same name. The series, which she also produces, will follow the twisted tale of the Lamb Funeral Home in 1980s Los Angeles, which will see Ricci play a journalist inspired by Braidhill.

She recently wrapped production on the action-comedy "Guns Up" opposite Kevin James, as 'Alice', which follows an ex-cop and family man who moonlights as a mob henchman when a job goes horribly wrong and has one night to get his family out of the city. Written and directed by Edward Drake, the film is set for a 2025 release.

Previously, Ricci starred in the Amazon original series "Z: The Beginning of Everything," for which she also served as a producer. In the biography series, which Ricci sourced and co-developed, she played 'Zelda Sayre Fitzgerald,' the brilliant, beautiful, and talented Southern Belle who becomes the original flapper and icon of the wild, flamboyant Jazz Age in the 20s.

Moan;" Mark Palansky's "Penelope;" Wes Craven's "Cursed;" a critically acclaimed performance in Patty Jenkins' "Monster;" Erik Skjoldbjærg's "Prozac Nation;" Sally Potter's "The Man Who Cried;" Tim Burton's "Sleepy Hollow;" John Waters' "Pecker;" a memorable cameo in Terry Gilliam's "Fear and Loathing in Las Vegas;" Vincent Gallo's "Buffalo 66" and Lesli Linka Glatter's "Now and Then;" Brad Silberling's "Casper;" Barry Sonnenfeld's "The Addams Family;" and Richard Benjamin's "Mermaids."

The actress's performance at age seven in a school Christmas play caught the attention of a local theatre critic, who suggested to her parents that she consider an acting career. She made her professional acting debut one year later in "Mermaids" in the pivotal role of Cher's youngest daughter and Winona Ryder's sister. As a child actor, Ricci won over audiences and critics alike with her winning portrayal of the strangely adorable Wednesday Addams' in "The Addams Family" and the sequel "Addams Family Values." She went on to star in the surprise hit of the summer 1995 season "Casper." For that, Ricci received the NATO Show East Star of the Year Award and the Star of Tomorrow Award from the Motion Picture Booker's Club for her strong performances and the \$100 million-plus box office successes of "Addams Family" and "Casper."

On television, Ricci starred as the title character in the television series, "The Lizzie Borden Chronicles," for which she earned her a 2016 SAG Award® nomination. The series is a fictionalized account Lizzie Borden and the 1892 murders of her father and stepmother and is a continuation of the story begun in the 2014 film "Lizzie Borden Took an Ax", in which Ricci also starred. Ricci's additional TV credits include a starring role on ABC's "Pan Am;" a recurring role on "Ally McBeal;" a guest appearance on "Grey's Anatomy," for which she received an Emmy® nomination; as well as guest appearances on "Saving Grace" and "The Good Wife."

In theatre, Ricci made her Broadway debut in "Time Stands Still" and starred off-Broadway in "A Midsummer Night's Dream."
