Comments for Public Posting: There is no need for a PPD in Lake Hollywood Estates. There is rarely parking pressure there, and none that comes close to the DOT's own stated threshold of 85% for 4 Blocks. Sometimes residents might have to park car(s) 2 or even 3 whole houses away from their own home, all with 2-car-garages and 2-car-driveways. Current conditions seem pretty reasonable and should not be the new threshold of parking burden, and are unlikely to change even with addition of paid/meter parking along Lake Hollywood Park.
