

# MOTION

At over 468 square miles, the City of Los Angeles is a cornucopia of 572 neighborhoods that deliver a range of city services in facilities and infrastructure that includes libraries, parks, recreation centers, cultural arts facilities, streets, street lighting, sidewalks, and bike lanes to name a few. Much of the City's infrastructure was built beginning in the 1920s, and now requires maintenance, upgrades, and expansions to meet the needs of our residents. In other neighborhoods, a lack of city services and facilities needs to be addressed as the City's population has outgrown our existing infrastructure, and residents deserve open spaces and facilities to recreate, learn, and travel safely.

While many studies and assessments have been completed with regard to the infrastructure and maintenance needs of the City of Los Angeles over the years, it has been decades since the voters have had the opportunity to comprehensively invest in the City's built environment and weigh in on priorities for the City's infrastructure. The changing grant landscape at the federal level will only serve to deepen the financial impact on our infrastructure costs and needs, requiring a much higher need for local investment. It is imperative that the City Council do its due diligence over the next 15 months to develop an infrastructure bond measure that meets the needs of the residents of the City.

I **MOVE** that the City Council **INSTRUCT** the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA), with the assistance of the City Administrative Officer, to report back with a comprehensive list of infrastructure and maintenance needs, including new facilities and the rehabilitation of existing facilities, that would be eligible for an infrastructure bond measure to be placed before the voters for the November 3, 2026 election.

I **FURTHER MOVE** that the City Council **INSTRUCT** the following Departments to provide the necessary information to the CLA in a timely manner for the above-described report back: Bureau of Engineering, Bureau of Street Lighting, Bureau of Street Services, Department of Recreation and Parks, Department of Cultural Affairs, General Services Department, Information Technology Agency, Library Department, and the Department of Transportation.


