

ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENT COMMITTEE REPORT relative to the workers affected by the Phillips 66 refinery closure in Los Angeles, next steps for remediation and reuse of the site with a timeline and cost estimates and personnel needs to assess, clean up, and revitalize potential impacts onsite, and related matters.

Recommendations for Council action, pursuant to Motion (McOsker - Yaroslavsky – Krekorian):

1. REQUEST the Economic and Workforce Development Department to:
 - a. Assign staff and prepare a transition plan to assist workers affected by the Phillips 66 refinery closure in Los Angeles. Such a plan should include opportunities to reskill and upskill workers for new economy jobs.
 - b. Coordinate with the appropriate County and State entities, and Phillips 66, with the transition plan to assist the workers impacted by the closure as well as for the future use(s) of the site.
2. REQUEST the Office of Petroleum and Natural Gas Administration, with assistance from the Los Angeles Bureau of Sanitation Citywide Brownfields Program and input from Phillips 66, to present next steps for remediation and reuse of the site with a timeline and cost estimates and personnel needs to assess, clean up, and revitalize potential impacts onsite.

Fiscal Impact Statement: Neither the City Administrative Officer nor the Chief Legislative Analyst has completed a financial analysis of this report.

Community Impact Statement: None submitted.
