**Comments for Public Posting:** Dear City Council: I am a UCLA alumna and have always been concerned about the chronic vacancy in Westwood Village. It is undeniable that the high vacancy rate as well as pathetic neighborhood character is partly due to the outdated Westwood Village Specific Plan. I am in favor of amending the plan to eliminate the definitions of fast food establishments and restaurants as well as eliminating their use ratios. I also support the Planning department's suggestions for removing overly restrictive parking requirements and allowing businesses to obtain parking leases in lieu of covenants. Westwood Village is a haunting shell of what it was during its heyday, and it would be beneficial for the area to bring those elements back. UCLA has consistently been rated as one of the top universities in the US and the world, and the college town should accordingly be inviting and safe for prospective students and families. Additionally, the Olympics are coming in 2028, and the purple line extension should be completed within the next 5-7 years.
