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## Los Angeles Justice Fund – Program Highlights

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## The Need – Why LAJF?

- Building a safety net Urgent need to protect families, keep communities safe and maintain trust in institutions.
- Protecting vulnerable community members with deep ties to Los Angeles.
- National momentum Local government leading innovations.
- Public/private investment maximizes resources, creates partnerships
- Reinforces shared values due process, racial equity.

# LAJF: Building Safety Net Infrastructure

- · Building removal defense pipeline
- Expanded removal defense capacity via 11 nonprofit legal services providers and 5 capacity building nonprofits providing combination of training, expertise and technical assistance
- 42 Immigration attorneys hired
- 50 law students and attorneys trained in removal defense
- Shared workspace 3 miles from Adelanto Detention Center

#### **LAJF Clients**

- 291 clients served through December 31, 2018 (and a total of 420 as of June 30, 2019).
- LAJF clients have longstanding ties to the United States and are deeply entrenched in their communities.
- Clients are diverse, young, vulnerable and connected to the City and County of Los Angeles.
- · Key stats:
  - · 26 different nationalities
  - · 15 average years living in US
  - 71% under 40 years of age
  - · 48% parents to children living in the U.S.
  - · 92% from a vulnerable class
  - 60% are male, 35% women, 5% identified as other than male/female

### **LAJF Impact to Date**

- 11 nonprofit, LAJF legal services providers have served 420 clients through June 30, 2019 (about half are city funded cases)
- 1,314 individuals screened
- Out of the completed cases, 44% had successful outcomes, allowing clients to remain in the United States, compared to the success rate of unrepresented cases nationwide of less than 5%.
- Created a new corps of removal defense attorneys coming out of law school to expand the pipeline of immigration attorneys
- LAJF benefits go beyond clients and radiate through families and community restoring dignity and fairness to imbalanced process

## **LAJF Funding Needs**

- Of \$7.4M two-year grants invested, LAJF granted:
  - \$5,505,000 to 11 legal service provider grantees
  - \$1,320,000 to 5 capacity building nonprofit organizations
- · 87% of LAJF cases remain pending
- As of June 30, 2019, LAJF grantees have spent 71% of grant resources
- Majority of LAJF grantees are projected to spend
  90% of grant resources by December 31, 2019

## LAJF 2.0 - Looking Ahead

- Support and sustain LAJF infrastructure
- Build upon LAJF successes and learnings from 2-year pilot.
- Fine-tune program design to expand impact of the LAJF, achieve greater efficiencies and economies of scale.
