FY 2020/21 Prop. 56 CA Healthcare, Research and Prevention Tobacco

Tax Act of 2016 Grant Award

Transmitted herewith for Mayor and City Council consideration is a continuation grant award totaling \$4,608,556 for FY 2020/21 to address illegal sales of tobacco products to minors. Awarded grant funds will maintain retailer compliance checks and enforce state and local tobacco laws.

Grant funding originates from the Prop. 56 California Healthcare, Research and Prevention Tobacco Tax Act of 2016, which is administered by the California Attorney General's Office through a competitive grant process. Council previously accepted a FY 2017-20 award (CF #12-1204-S6) to launch LA DATA (Decreasing Adolescent Tobacco Access), which is now entering its fourth year of operation.

Since its inception, DATA has undertaken 2,676 PC 308 investigations; 884 tobacco retailer inspections: 5 tobacco search warrants/investigations of illicit tobacco; 98 hookah related task force operations. DATA has referred 417 first time PC 308 violators to a tobacco-specific diversion program (developed by the City Attorney's Office); conducted 960 tobacco retailer trainings; and completed 197 youth tobacco use prevention outreach programs.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

The total grant project cost is \$5,182,941 of which \$4,608,556 will be reimbursed by the State of California, Department of Justice. The difference of \$574,385 is indirect cost not reimbursed from the grant because of the 5% administrative cost cap imposed by the grantor.

SUMMARY – DESCRIPTION OF REQUEST

Description	The Los Angeles City Attorney's Office (LACA) seeks continuation funding to support its evidence based youth tobacco-use prevention efforts vitally needed in the City of Los Angeles. Launched in 2018 through Prop. 56 funding, LACA established DATA (Decreasing Adolescent Tobacco Access - a strategic partnership between LACA and the Los Angeles Police Department) to reduce tobacco access to, and use by, youth. As the prosecutorial agency responsible for all misdemeanors and infractions occurring within the City of Los Angeles, LACA coordinates aggressive tobacco retailer enforcement, direct retailer outreach, and multi-agency collaborations through its Tobacco Enforcement Operations Division. In addition to leading efforts to decrease the unlawful sale of tobacco products to minors, LACA monitors nearly 4,500 tobacco retailers to ensure compliance with local tobacco permit guidelines and all tobacco related laws. Through FY 2020 funding, LACA will enhance DATA enforcement strategies proven effective during the inaugural grant period, which an independent evaluator describes as "a national model of excellence when it comes to law enforcement initiatives that promote public health and safety."

Summary of Goals and Objectives	Through FY 2020 funding, DATA seeks to: 1) continue Penal Code Section 308 enforcement through evidence-based informed strategies; and 2) enhance DATA's tobacco-specific diversion program and tobacco retailer education through new technology and online approaches.

PROBLEM STATEMENT – DESCRIBE THE ISSUES OR PROBLEMS TO BE ADDRESSED WITH GRANT FUNDS.

Geographic Area to be Served	Spanning 468 square miles, the City of Los Angeles is the largest city in California, home to nearly four million multi-cultural, multi-lingual residents, of whom 21% are under the age of 18. Like many large urban regions, Los Angeles grapples with socio-economic inequities across health, wealth, education, and housing, in which 18% of the total population lives below the poverty level. As the largest public school system in California, the Los Angeles Unified School District annually enrolls 734,000 students. Citywide, the ratio of tobacco retailers to schools is 4.4.
Tobacco Rates and Patterns	Nationwide, about 2,000 youth under 18 smoke their first cigarette each day. Youth are 2.6 times more likely to use e-cigarettes than traditional cigarettes due to the popularity of flavors offered. In Los Angeles, 65,869 youth ages 15-20 years, report using tobacco products that span e-cigarettes, vaping devices, cigarettes, little cigars/cigarillos, big cigars, and hookahs. The majority of these youth acquire tobacco products from retail locations such as vape shops, gas stations, convenience stores and supermarket employees. Consequently, law enforcement strategies must focus in on tobacco retailers to effectively reduce adolescent tobacco use.
Other Known Factors	The health risks of youth tobacco use are well known, rendering continuation funding for DATA more vital than ever. Unfortunately, for youth who smoke and vape the lethal consequences include severe pulmonary disease, acute respiratory syndrome, impaired brain development caused by repeated nicotine use, and susceptibility to lifelong nicotine addiction. These long term impacts demonstrate why it is vital to interrupt the initiation, and use, of tobacco among youth - especially during this time when smoking and vaping are being associated with higher COVID risks and complications.

GOAL 1: Increase Retailer Compliance by 10% Through Continued PC 308 Enforcement

Goal Description	Through compliance, limit youth access to harmful tobacco products.
Measurable Outcome	Track retailer enforcement activities and compliance rates.
Timeline	1/1/2021 - 12/31/2023
Narrative Description	California Penal Code Section 308 makes it unlawful to sell, give, or furnish tobacco products to anyone under 21 years. Over 4,500 tobacco retailers operate within the City of Los Angeles, who are subject to PC 308 enforcement activities led by the LAPD.
	During the first DATA grant period, LAPD exceeded all of its grant objectives to conduct investigations, retailer inspections, and task force operations. For example, LAPD set a goal for 300 undercover decoy investigations at retail locations to ensure operators had permits and did not sell to minors. LAPD exceeded this by 892%, completing 2,676 investigations.
	In addition, LAPD issued 529 citations for PC 308 violations. Of these, 394 retailers (75%) participated in LACA's tobacco retailer diversion program created under DATA. LACA prosecuted the other 79 offenders (15%) and the remaining 10% are currently awaiting a filing decisions or are in failure to appear status. Through these joint interventions, DATA increased PC 308 compliance citywide by 9.2%. This is statistically significant given such a direct impact over a short period of time and across such a vast and diverse area.
	DATA's proven approach entails an education first model, followed by enforcement and escalating sanctions if needed. Through FY 2020 funding, LAPD will continue a comprehensive and informed enforcement program by conducting a minimum of 3,000 direct retailer inspection outreach visits and 1,500 PC 308 investigations.

GOAL 2: Enhance Tobacco Retailer Diversion Program through Online Engagement

Goal Description	Change behavior for first-time offenders.
Measurable Outcome	Track retailer diversion program completion and recidivism rates.
Timeline	1/1/2021 - 12/31/2023
Narrative Description	A central component during the first DATA grant period entailed the creation of a new tobacco-specific diversion program for PC 308 offenders. This diversion program provides a restorative justice-based alternative in lieu of a criminal misdemeanor case filing as part of an education first model to raise awareness regarding the detrimental impacts associated with underage tobacco sales. Once launched, over 140 offenders cited by LAPD participated in the diversion program. They completed an in-person tobacco retailing education class covering tobacco-related laws and the societal consequences triggered when retailers unlawfully furnish tobacco products to youth. To remedy the harm to their community, each participant was also expected to undergo a restorative justice obligation recommended by a community panel comprised of local volunteers, typically in the form of community service hours. To increase efficiencies and program completion rates, DATA will retain a vendor (through an RFP process) to create a first of its kind online tobacco retailer education program. By going virtual, offenders can successfully complete their education obligations from any location at any time. The virtual platform will include a comprehensive tobacco retailing curriculum, as well as innovative and evidence-based cognitive behavioral therapy and mindfulness interventions to deter future illegal sales of tobacco products to minors. A case management feature will also be included to assist participants to complete their diversion obligations while also providing responsible retailer tips and reminders through texts and push notifications. Through these key enhancements, LACA's diversion program will continue to increase its impact.

GOAL 3: _____ Increase Prosecutions of Repeat Offenders

Goal Description	Deter violators from ongoing or escalating illegal sales to minors.
Measurable Outcome	Track recidivism rates of repeat offenders.
Timeline	1/1/2021 - 12/31/2023
Narrative Description	During the initial DATA grant period, the LACA filed 79 criminal misdemeanor cases against offenders for selling tobacco products to minors. While criminal enforcement deters violators from repeat conduct, retailers still become susceptible to repeat violations due to employee turnover and training deficiencies of new employees. To mitigate against this, increasing prosecutions and escalating sanctions for repeat offenders can serve to reign in compliance. Targeting repeat offenders will further have an impact on chronic illegal tobacco sales where retailers flagrantly disregard the law or see it as a cost of doing business and illegal sales are an entrenched part of the community. Too often these locations bypass sustained enforcement as compliance activities move on to new locations in an effort to provide citywide coverage. By focusing on repeat offenders through data analysis and target operations, these flagrant violators will be held more accountable. Experienced DATA prosecutors will have the skills and expertise to secure/create an evidence chain demonstrating repeat behavior, the skill and awareness to combat anticipated defenses, and the experience to overcome potential bias regarding perceptions of tobacco sales being a "victimless crime." Through continuation funding, DATA prosecutors can extinguish ongoing and escalating sales to minors.

GOAL 4: _____Enhance Tobacco Retailer Education to Improve Compliance Rates

Goal Description	Increase direct retailer outreach & improve community relationships
Measurable Outcome	Number of in person retailer educations provided.
Timeline	1/1/2021 - 12/31/2023
Narrative Description	Through FY 20 funding, LAPD will provide real-time tobacco education in the field as part of its expanded retailer "upfront" inspection protocol. These upfront, or one-on-one, training opportunities will allow retailers to immediately address any area of concern and/or remedy any non-compliance issues identified by LAPD during their inspection.
	During the on site training, LAPD will teach retail practices with all employees. This includes hands-on demonstrations regarding proper age verification and role playing scenarios to: 1) assist identifying counterfeit IDs; and 2) provide guidance on best practices for refusing a sale. As an adjunct to this strategy, LAPD will incorporate a new protocol to include an invitation for retailers and their employees to participate in the anticipated online virtual tobacco retailer curriculum. Upon completion, a certificate will be issued for display at the location.
	The goal of an upfront strategy is to avoid a citation through participation in LAPD's in person trainings and completing the virtual tobacco curriculum. This approach aligns with the statewide trend to rethink traditional criminal justice modalities to prioritize prevention over punishment.
	Once implemented, compliance rate data will be analyzed during the FY 20 grant period to determine if this one-on-one, pre-enforcement engagement with retailers is effective in decreasing PC 308 criminal violations.

Measurable Outcome	Recommendations implemented from first DATA evaluation.
Timeline	1/1/2021 - 12/31/2023
	As part of a process evaluation to gauge the success and impact of DATA, LACA initiated an RFP for a program evaluator. Maroon Society was retained and conducted a comprehensive evaluation of the DATA program. Maroon Society determined that DATA is a best-practices program managed by a team highly committed to decreasing adolescent access to tobacco for the benefit of improved public health. Key findings included: 1) DATA increased tobacco retailer compliance with PC308 by 9.2% citywide; 2) DATA diverted and prosecuted retailer violations equitably citywide; 3) retailer compliance with PC 308 is not explained by neighborhood poverty; and 4) youth tobacco access differs widely across the City. While the evaluation validated DATA's approach, even more can be done to effect systemic change through data driven educational outreach and targeted retailer enforcement. For example, LAPD initially deployed PC 308 investigations to provide equal coverage across the City's 21 police divisions and 15 City Council districts. Over time, Maroon determined that compliance rates varied and each community has different levels of enforcement needs. Specifically, areas with a higher concentration of schools and tobacco retailers put youth at a higher risk for accessing tobacco; therefore more resources should be focused in these regions. Through FY 20 funding, Maroon will enhance its tracking of PC 308 investigations, retailer citations, compliance rates, diversions, criminal case filings and recidivism rates to inform real time engagement, enforcement, and education strategies citywide for maximum effectiveness of Prop 56 funds.
