Summary: The NoHo Neighborhood Council, by a unanimous vote, hereby supports Council File 21-0031, which would modify the CARE/CARE+ street cleaning and outreach protocols to conform with CDC guidelines. The CDC has issued guidelines that "Clearing encampments can cause people to disperse throughout the community and break connections with service providers. This increases the potential for infectious disease spread." In light of this, the NoHo NC supports the alternative to current CARE/CARE+ cleanups presently piloted in CD 11, wherein voluntary services are orchestrated via community ambassadors with outreach connections to the unhoused population. Said outreach teams seek compliance with ADA guidelines while simultaneously providing services such as food distribution, toilet services, showers, and tents without the need for law enforcement presence. NoHo NC respectfully requests that these improvements be codified in LASAN policy surrounding the CARE/CARE+ program.

Community Impact Statement in opposition of City Council File 21-0031

Modifications to Sanitation Cleanups

January 26, 2021

Dear Honorable Councilmembers,

The NoHo Neighborhood Council hereby supports Council File 21-0031, which would modify the CARE/CARE+ street cleaning and outreach protocols to conform with CDC guidelines¹.

Currently the Bureau of Sanitation (LASAN) conducts comprehensive CARE/CARE+ cleanups within the special exemption zones (SEZ) established around *A Bridge Home* shelters and at select locations of camped unhoused persons in collaboration with City Council members. While those cleanups were suspended in March of 2020 at the beginning of the COVID crisis, they were re-implemented in July and reaffirmed in December.

Said cleanups now occur weekly at the Bridge Home facility on Raymer Ave in North Hollywood and at the underpasses along the 170 and 101 freeways, and will occur in a radius around the Tiny Home Village set to open on Chandler Blvd on Feb 1. The sanitation program has a decidedly mixed record, resulting in removed refuse but also forcing unhoused residents to take down their tents and relocate while city workers power-wash the sidewalks. Noncompliance results in people's personal possessions being confiscated and discarded.

Council District 11 is piloting an alternate approach, in which the services provided by LASAN are voluntary rather than involuntary, and are orchestrated via community ambassadors with outreach connections to the unhoused population. Said outreach teams seek compliance with ADA guidelines while simultaneously

providing services such as food distribution, toilet services, showers, and tents without the need for law enforcement presence.

As of January 4, 2021, The LA County Department of Public Health showed 4,578 cases of COVID-19 among the unhoused population, as the pandemic grew out of control in the Winter months.

This motion, if adopted, would direct LASAN to develop service-based protocols for CARE+ operations, or to revise present policy to incorporate the following:

- Compliance with CDC guidelines regarding public health and encampments
- Regular, scheduled and well-publicized cleanings
- Offers by LASAN of services such as trash pick-up, bulky item pick-up, etc.
- Designation of areas where trash and waste can be placed for disposal and removal
- Use of community partners and ambassadors to conduct outreach and facilitation
- Provision of easy-ups or shade structures so people can temporarily relocate with their belongings during a cleaning
- Provision, through LASAN or partner agencies, of mobile showers, bathrooms, COVID-testing, tent exchange and distribution of food and water
- Hiring of unhoused residents to keep areas tidy between LASAN cleanings
- Reasonable accommodations for people with disabilities.

With these adjustments, this council believes the CARE+ program can be improved while aligning with the LAHSA's harm reduction goals.
