The Echo Park Neighborhood Council (EPNC) supports this motion and urges that no new gas, diesel, nor fossil fuel stations (and no new pumps at existing stations) be permitted in the City.

Gas stations pose significant health hazards to neighbors. A number of compounds that are harmful to humans are released from gas stations during fueling and from underground storage tanks. Studies have shown that the release of these compounds worsen local air quality and raise rates of cancer, anemia, birth complications, and other ill health effects.

Additionally, gas stations hurt the walkability and safety of neighborhoods. Heavy traffic and multiple entrances increases the risk to drivers, pedestrians, and cyclists while taking up valuable urban land that could be used for much-needed housing or green space.

This ordinance would encourage the adoption of zero-emissions vehicles, in line with the state's goal to have 5 million electric vehicles on the roads by 2030 and 250,000 electric vehicle charging stations by 2025.

The EPNC urges the City Council to adopt this motion and a subsequent ordinance to enact its goals without delay.
