




Community Plan Areas (CPAs)

 Connects participatory budgeting to a larger, existing participatory process










Percent People of Color (not white non-hispanic) **Percent Below Poverty Line**



Percent of Households Overcrowded



Cumulative COVID-19 Case Rate*




Percent of Households With No Internet



CDC Social Vulnerability Index

The SVI uses Census data to determine social vulnerability -- which it defines as a community's ability to prevent human suffering and financial loss in a disaster. The SVI ranks each census tract on 15 social factors, including poverty, lack of vehicle access, and crowded housing.





CDC/ATSDR SVI Themes & Social Factors:

- Socioeconomic status (below poverty, unemployed, income, no high school diploma)
- Household composition & disability (aged 65 or older, aged 17 or younger, older than age 5 with a disability, single-parent households)
- Minority status & language (minority, speak English "less than well")
- Housing type & transportation (multi-unit structures, mobile homes, crowding, no vehicle, group quarters)

CalEnviroScreen

CalEnviroScreen identifies California communities by census tract that are disproportionately burdened by, and vulnerable to, multiple sources of **pollution**. The index uses a suite of 19 indicators to characterize pollution burden (12 indicators) and population characteristics (7 indicators)



Healthy Places Index (HPI)

An index compiled from 26 indicators in 8 categories: Healthcare Access, Clean Environment, Neighborhood Quality (parks, tree canopy, supermarkets, etc), Housing, Transportation, Education, Social (voting, household characteristics), and Economic.


Home Owners' Loan Corporation "Redlining" Maps

The Home Owners' Loan Corporation (HOLC) was created in the New Deal Era and trained many home appraisers in the 1930s. The HOLC created a neighborhood ranking system known today as **redlining**. Local real estate developers and appraisers in over 200 cities assigned grades to residential neighborhoods.

Areas that received the lowest grade often received this grade because they were "infiltrated" with "undesirable populations" such as Jewish, Asian, Mexican, and Black families.

Banks received federal backing to lend money for mortgages based on these grades. Many banks simply refused to lend to areas with the lowest grade, making it impossible for people in many areas to become homeowners. While this type of neighborhood classification is no longer legal thanks to the Fair Housing Act of 1968, the effects of disinvestment due to redlining are still observable today.
