Historic-Cultural Monument Application

FINDINGS

• Fire Station No. 14 "exemplifies significant contributions to the broad cultural, economic or social history of the nation, state, city or community" for its association with the desegregation of the Los Angeles Fire Department.

CRITERIA

The criterion is the Cultural Heritage Ordinance which defines a historical or cultural monument as any site (including significant trees or other plant life located thereon), building or structure of particular historic or cultural significance to the City of Los Angeles if it meets at least one of the following criteria:

- 1. Is identified with important events of national, state, or local history, or exemplifies significant contributions to the broad cultural, economic or social history of the nation, state, city or community;
- 2. Is associated with the lives of historic personages important to national, state, city, or local history; or
- 3. Embodies the distinctive characteristics of a style, type, period, or method of construction; or represents a notable work of a master designer, builder, or architect whose individual genius influenced his or her age.

SUMMARY

Fire Station No. 14 is a one to three-story fire station located on the northwest corner of Central Avenue and E. 34th Street in the South Los Angeles neighborhood of Los Angeles. Constructed in 1949, the subject property was designed in the International architectural style by Southern California architect Earl T. Heitschmidt (1894-1972). Originally, Fire Station No. 14 operated out of a building constructed in 1900 on the same lot as the subject property. In 1936, the fire station was opened to Black firefighters to provide a second segregated station, and in 1949, the subject property was constructed next to the original fire station, which was later demolished. Fire Station No. 14 remained segregated until September 1956, and still serves as a fire station for the City.

Job discrimination became an important target of civil rights activism during the postwar years. galvanizing legal challenges and direct actions. One of the most publicized campaigns for equal rights in employment in Los Angeles involved the local branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) and the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD). In 1924, the Los Angeles Fire Department decided to assign all Black firefighters in the city to Fire Station #30 (1401 Central Avenue, HCM #289). However, as the population around the Central Avenue corridor rose and the fire station became overcrowded, the subject property was designated the second all-Black company. All-Black fire stations represented both racial segregation and sources of community pride. Civil service regulations were regularly violated to maintain the segregated system and retain the rank of captain as the highest open to African Americans. By 1953, the NAACP was pressing for equality in hiring, transfers, and promotions in LAFD. An alternative to integration put forth by the LAFD management, was to convert Fire Stations #20 and #21 to all-Black companies to open promotional opportunities. The idea, however, was rejected in favor of integration, which was implemented by a newly appointed chief of the LAFD in 1956. As a result of a Federal Consent Decree in 1974, the LAFD adopted an Affirmative Action Program and created a Minority Recruitment Unit to improve the recruitment of members of underrepresented demographic groups.

Generally rectangular in plan, the subject property is of reinforced concrete construction and is composed of a series of one-, two-, and three-story volumes that all have flat roofs. The primary, east-facing elevation has a balanced, asymmetrical composition with a one-story volume featuring a pedestrian entrance situated in a metal-framed assemblage with hopper-style windows above and stacked to the side of a metal slab door, and a two-story volume for the fire truck entrance. A red brick veneer visually connects the two volumes. Dividing the two-story volume between the first and second stories is a shallow, linear canopy that has a ledge-sign consisting of metal letters spelling out "Fire Station No. 14" in capital letters. The first story has two, non-original, roll-up style fire truck doors. On the second story, the concrete is scored into a grid pattern with a ribbon of windows centered in the grid. The north-facing elevation is a flat plane with one-over-one, double-hung, steel sash windows. At the northwest corner, there is a three-story tower capped by a flat roof with overhanging eaves that houses the hose tower. A service yard is located on the north side of the building, which is separated from the sidewalk by a non-original, concrete block wall. The south-facing elevation steps up from one story to two stories with fenestration that includes one-over-one, double-hung sash and casement windows.

Earl T. Heitschmidt was born in Portland, Oregon in 1894, and attended the University of Oregon and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He worked at various architecture firms in Portland, Boston, and New York before opening his own practice in Los Angeles in 1930. When Heitschmidt was an associate with the New York firm of Schultz & Weaver, the firm designed the Los Angeles Biltmore Hotel. Some of his more distinguished works include the Wrigley Mansion in Phoenix (1929-30), Columbia Square with William Lescaze (1937, HCM #947), Wrigley Field (1938), Park La Brea (1941-49), General Motors Training Center in Burbank (1953), Los Angeles Furniture Mart (1955), and Harvey Mudd College Master Plan in Claremont (1956). Heitschmidt passed away in 1972 at the age of 77.

The subject property has experienced minor alterations that include a modification to the parapets in 1966 and the demolition of a one-story salvage, drying, and oil room that stood at the rear of the building in 1994, as well as the replacement of the fire truck doors and perimeter wall at unknown dates.

In March 2009, the subject property was listed in the National Register of Historic Places, and concurrently listed in the California Register of Historical Resources, as being one of two segregated fire stations in Los Angeles and its significance in the desegregation of the Los Angeles Fire Department.

DISCUSSION

Fire Station No. 14 "exemplifies significant contributions to the broad cultural, economic or social history of the nation, state, city or community" for its association with the desegregation of the Los Angeles Fire Department. While initially considered a source of pride, the establishment of Fire Station No. 14 soon highlighted the limitations of employment and advancement opportunities for Black firemen within the LAFD. With the Black population of Los Angeles growing, but no new all-Black engine companies being formed, the subject property became a focus for civil rights activists seeking racial equality in municipal employment. The campaign by the NAACP to expose racial discrimination within the LAFD ultimately led to the desegregation of the department, while reinvigorating the organization, which launched other campaigns with new leadership and increased membership. As one of two segregated fire stations at the core of this campaign, the

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subject property stands as a testament to the perseverance of civil rights activists who fought for equal access to LAFD career opportunities.

Despite some alterations, the subject property retains a high level of integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association to convey its significance.

CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT ("CEQA") FINDINGS

State of California CEQA Guidelines, Article 19, Section 15308, Class 8 "consists of actions taken by regulatory agencies, as authorized by state or local ordinance, to assure the maintenance, restoration, enhancement, or protection of the environment where the regulatory process involves procedures for protection of the environment."

State of California CEQA Guidelines Article 19, Section 15331, Class 31 "consists of projects limited to maintenance, repair, stabilization, rehabilitation, restoration, preservation, conservation or reconstruction of historical resources in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic buildings."

The designation of Fire Station No. 14 as an Historic-Cultural Monument in accordance with Chapter 9, Article 1, of the City of Los Angeles Administrative Code ("LAAC") will ensure that future construction activities involving the subject property are regulated in accordance with Section 22.171.14 of the LAAC. The purpose of the designation is to prevent significant impacts to a Historic-Cultural Monument through the application of the standards set forth in the LAAC. Given that the subject property is already listed in the National Register of Historic Places and the California Register of Historical Resources, the pending designation will lead to a higher level of review and protection of the historic significance and integrity of the subject property that could otherwise be lost through incompatible alterations, new construction, or demolition, particularly to the interiors of the buildings. The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation are expressly incorporated into the LAAC and provide standards concerning the historically appropriate construction activities which will ensure the continued preservation of the subject property.

The City of Los Angeles has determined based on the whole of the administrative record, that substantial evidence supports that the Project is exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section Article 19, Section 15308, Class 8 and Class 31, and none of the exceptions to a categorical exemption pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15300.2 applies. The project was found to be exempt based on the following:

The use of Categorical Exemption Class 8 in connection with the proposed designation is consistent with the goals of maintaining, restoring, enhancing, and protecting the environment through the imposition of regulations designed to prevent the degradation of Historic-Cultural Monuments.

The use of Categorical Exemption Class 31 in connection with the proposed designation is consistent with the goals relating to the preservation, rehabilitation, restoration and reconstruction of historic buildings and sites in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties.

Categorical Exemption ENV-2021-6170-CE was prepared on September 13, 2021.

FINDINGS

Based on the facts set forth in the summary and application, the Commission determines that the application is complete and that the property may be significant enough to warrant further investigation as a potential Historic-Cultural Monument.

BACKGROUND

On July 21, 2021, the Director of Planning determined that the application for the proposed designation of the subject property as an Historic-Cultural Monument was complete. 7. WRITTEN STATEMENT

A. Proposed Monument Description

Fire Station No. 14 is located at the northwest corner of Central Avenue and East 34th Street in the City of Los Angeles. The International Style reinforced concrete building varies in height from one to three stories. A concrete block wall surrounds the lot associated with the building on the north side. On the south elevation, newly installed landscaping screens the building from the neighboring property. The building retains all aspects of integrity.

The building is generally rectangular in shape and is composed of a series of one-, two-, and three-story volumes. The street-facing (east) elevation has a balanced, asymmetrical composition with a one-story volume containing the pedestrian entrance and a two-story volume for the fire truck entrance. A red brick veneer connects the two volumes visually. The pedestrian entrance is situated in a three-part, metal-framed assemblage that creates a strong graphic effect. A metal slab door is set in the south end; above the door are two hopper-style windows. To the south are four hopper-style windows stacked vertically in each of the two remaining sections. Dividing the two-story volume between the first and second stories is a shallow, linear canopy. Perched on the edge of the canopy are individual metal letters in a modern font spelling out "Fire Station No. 14" in capital letters. The first story has two, non-original, roll-up style fire truck doors. On the second story, the concrete is scored into a grid pattern with a ribbon of windows centered in the grid.

The north elevation is a flat plane with one-over-one, double-hung, steel sash windows. The windows are evenly distributed with some set individually and some grouped into fours. At the northwest corner, a blank three-story volume houses the hose tower. A flat roof with overhanging eaves caps the tower. On all four sides, just below the eaves are three vents with vertical slats. A service yard is located on the north side of the building, which is separated from the sidewalk by a non-original, concrete block wall.

The south elevation steps up from one story to two stories with window types that include oneover-one, double-hung sash as well as casements.

The only apparent exterior alterations are the replacement of the fire truck doors and perimeter wall. Historic photographs indicated that the doors were originally bi-folds with six panels and the wall was originally brick. The building permit records indicate demolition of a one-story salvage, drying, and oil room that stood at the rear of the building and corrections to the parapets.

B. Statement of Significance

Fire Station No. 14 is listed in the National Register of Historic Places and California Register of Historical Resources and is eligible for designation as a Historic-Cultural Monument under Criterion 1 of the Cultural Heritage Ordinance. It is associated with events that have made a

significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history. It meets the eligibility standards in the African American History of Los Angeles Context Statement for the Civil Rights theme. Constructed in 1949, Fire Station No. 14 is significant as one of two segregated fire stations in Los Angeles. As such, it was a target for civil rights activists seeking racial equality in municipal employment.

All-black fire stations were simultaneous representations of racial segregation and sources of community pride. The first African American member of the Los Angeles Fire Department (LAFD), Sam Haskins, was hired in 1888. Born into slavery in Virginia, he was assigned to Engine Company No. 4. He died in the line of duty in 1895. George Bright became the second black fireman in Los Angeles when he was hired in 1897. By 1902, he had attained the rank of lieutenant and the department was faced with a dilemma – segregate crews or allow a black man to supervise white men. In 1924, the department decided to assign all of the black firemen in the city to Fire Station No. 30 under Bright's supervision.

As more blacks joined the department, Fire Station No. 30 became crowded. The department's wrecker (heavy rescue) was assigned to Fire Station No. 30, simply because there was insufficient riding room for all the firemen on the engines and truck. Another station was needed. In 1936, Fire Station No. 14 was opened to black firemen creating two additional captain and engineer positions along with ten additional firemen positions.⁴ At first, this development was considered a source of pride in the community. Two stations with a total of 44 firemen was the largest representation of African Americans in a municipal fire department in the United States.⁵ Mayor Frank Shaw was given credit for the separate but equal policy and recognized as a progressive by the community. In 1949, a new Fire Station No. 14 was opened next to the old one, which was later demolished.⁶

The separate but equal policy, however, meant employment and advancement for African Americans within the department was limited to the needs of the two fire stations. Although the population of Los Angeles, including the number of African Americans, was growing, no new all-black engine companies were formed. The Los Angeles Urban League began calling for the integration of the department, noting that the City was violating civil service regulations in

order to maintain the system.⁷ Leon Washington with the *Los Angeles Sentinel* also called for an investigation into the matter. Other forms of discrimination against black firemen were alleged, such as unequal treatment in examination procedures, interview panels, and training evaluations.⁸ Fire Chief John Alderson, however, was opposed to racial integration and argued that black firemen were satisfied with the system.⁹ Additionally, the City Charter authorized him to manage the department in the best interest of the people of Los Angeles.¹⁰

Racial tensions within LAFD continued to fester until 1953 when Norris Poulson was elected Mayor. Shortly after he took office, he was presented with a petition prepared by the NAACP demanding an investigation into racial discrimination within the LAFD. The petition was prepared by Loren Miller and Thomas Neusom, attorneys for the NAACP. Among the petition's allegations: blacks were not appointed to vacancies unless they existed at Stations No. 14 or No. 30; blacks were not permitted to transfer from those stations to other stations; and blacks were denied promotions above the rank of captain. To prove the point of the NACCP, 39 of the 79 black firemen in the department asked to be transferred from Stations No. 14 and No. 30 to one of the 85 other stations in the city. Chief Alderson denied all of the transfer requests, maintaining that it was his authority under the City Charter to make personnel assignments.

In January of 1954, the NAACP began preparing for federal court action by deposing Chief Alderson as well as several fire commissioners. ¹³ In May of 1954, the U.S. Supreme Court decided in *Brown v. Board of Education* that separate was not equal and ruled that racial segregation of children in public schools was unconstitutional. The landmark case was one of the cornerstones of the civil rights movement and established the precedent that separate but equal doctrines in other areas such as employment were not equal at all. In light of *Brown v. Board of Education*, the Board of Fire Commissioners sought an opinion from the City Attorney on whether the department's policy was in violation of Federal or State law. ¹⁴ The answer was in the affirmative and Chief Alderson was asked by the Board to produce an integration plan. The Board rejected his first integration plan on September 2, 1954 and gave him until the end of the month to produce another plan, which he did not.

Mayor Poulson was more assertive than the Board and told Chief Alderson to submit an integration plan or his resignation.¹⁵ The Board considered an alternative to integration, which involved converting Fire Stations No. 20 and No. 21 to all-black companies to open up

promotional opportunities. The Board also planned to hold a series of public hearings to determine the best means of integration. Mayor Poulson then engaged in a battle with the Board and suggested that the City Council remove any commissioner who failed to act. He reminded the Board that the City Attorney and State Attorney General had ruled that a racially segregated department was a violation of the State and Federal Constitutions. 17

As prophesied in the *Los Angeles Sentinel* "Even in Los Angeles Segregation Dies Hard;" two more years would pass before the integration of the LAFD. On October 28, 1954, the Board passed a resolution that ordered Chief Alderson to initiate a "gradual" integration program. The NAACP, however, remained on guard and noted the vague language of the resolution. In 1955, a number of black firemen were transferred from Stations No. 14 and No. 30, but not without conflict. Some black firemen requested transfers back to Stations No. 14 and No. 30 because they were harassed by white firemen. White firemen who were friendly with their black co-workers were either ostracized or transferred to other stations without request. Chief Alderson remained steadfastly opposed to integration and was supported by some commissioners. While some black firemen organized a mutual support organization called the Stentorians, some white firemen organized the Firemen's Fact Finding Committee to oppose integration.

On June 9, 1955, the Board ordered Chief Alderson to report on the progress of the integration plan. By this time, Mayor Poulson had replaced several of the commissioners with men who supported the desegregation of the department. Chief Alderson claimed that the Board had not provided specific instructions in writing and estimated that it would take five years to integrate the department.²¹ The Board once again passed a resolution, but this time it was for immediate and total integration; Chief Alderson had three weeks to submit a plan.²² Rather than obeying the order, on November 1, 1955, Chief Alderson announced his intention to retire effective December 29, 1955. On December 15, the Board ordered Chief Alderson relieved of his duties for insubordination, although he was allowed to retire on schedule.²³

On January 17, 1956, Mayor Poulson appointed William L. Miller as the new Fire Chief. Two weeks later he transferred eight black firemen to Fire Station No. 7 on Main Street.²⁴ By September the department was finally desegregated; however, the battle for civil rights was far from over. White firemen continued a campaign of harassment and punishment against black firemen and their sympathizers. As a result, fewer and fewer African Americans sought a career in the LAFD. By 1969, the LAFD realized they needed to rectify the situation by actively

recruiting within minority communities, but then announced a two-year hiring freeze. With no progress in hiring minority candidates, the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) sued for racial discrimination in 1972.²⁵ The DOJ accused the City of violating Title VII of the 1964 Civil Rights Act that prohibits employment discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, and national origin. City Councilman Billy G. Mills assisted the DOJ in making their case, although the City denied there was a pattern of discrimination.²⁶ When a consent decree went into effect in 1974, there were only 45 African Americans in the department.²⁷ In other words African Americans represented 18 percent of the city's population but only 3 percent of the department. The terms of the consent decree required the City to appoint minority applicants until the department reflected the population. The City also agreed to change the civil service classification from fireman to firefighter and to publicize the fact that females were eligible to become firefighters.²⁸

Fire Station No. 14, along with No. 30, stands as a testament to the perseverance of civil rights activists who fought for equal access to LAFD career opportunities. The long but successful campaign also reinvigorated the NAACP, which launched other campaigns with new leadership and increased membership.²⁹

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


Fire Station No. 14, view of east elevation, looking west (Teresa Grimes, April 2021




Fire Station No. 14, view of north elevation, looking south (Teresa Grimes, April 2021)






Assessor Parcel Map, property outlined in red

Negro Firemen To Man Station At 34th Street

Det. Lieut. Garrott Named Acting Captain at Newton Street Police Station

The end of two long drawn community fights came with dramatic suddenness this week when Negro firemen were stationed at the 34th street fire station and a Negro police officer, Detective Lisutenant Homer Garrott, was named head of the Newton street detective bureau.

Mr. Garrott, who has spent more than 20 years on the police force here, was given the rank of acting captain and was promoted from the head of the Newton crime prevention bureau—the juvenile squad. Officer Earl Broady was named to the position left vacant by Mr. Garrott's appointment.

appointment.

The placing of Negro firemen at the 34th street station was accompanied by the naming of seven more Negro firemen from the eligible civil service list. Two fire stations in this community are now manned by Negro firemen, the 14th street station having long been under their con-

trol.

Agitation for the placing of Negro firemen at the new station has been intermittent in the community for many years and with the gradual growth of the Negro community has been inevitable for some time.

Mr. Garrott's appointment at Newton street police station paved the way for the removal of former Captain m. Bradley who has been in disrepute here for some time and whose unpopularity grew by leap and bounds following the beating last July 18 of Horace Hampton by a group composed of three police officers, a deputy district attorney and two civilians.

Oredit for the appointment was given to Mayor Shaw, and the city administration by those in close touch with the situation. Both the mayor and the administration came in for congratulations by interested citizens who acclaimed the action as progressive and forward looking.

Fire Station History Told

Following up our program of plotures displaying the pride of the Eastside, the 14th Street fire station, housing Truck Company No. 30 and Engine Company No. 20, and the two new captains, recently appointed, we are this week presenting for your edification Engine Company No. 14 at 34th and Central avenue, under command of Captains Washington and Bailey, with a complement of 14 men. This is an evidence of what Mayor Shaw believes to be recognition of the rights of citizens of any race or of any community.

Most significant is the fact that with a complement of 30 men at the 14th Street fire station and 14 men at the 34th Street fire station, makes a total of 44 men of our race who are members of the city's fire department. It is with pride that we can truthfully say that this is the largest representation in a city fire department anywhere, in the United States, and we can also say that all of this is due to the broad program carried on by Mayor Frank L. Shaw as chief executive of this great city.



Biased Appointments, **Promotions Charged**

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second in a series of articles dealing with community conditions and problems requiring the attention of officials responsible for the health and safety of our citizens. It is the purpose of the Sentinel in this series of articles to solicit the support of the community in its campaign to eliminate these undesirable conditions. The campaign is being conducted personally by Leon H. Washington Jr., Sentinel publisher, who welcomes your complaints, suggestions and constructive criticisms almed at improving our community. This week's article deals with inefficiency and inexcusable race relations of the Los Angeles Fire Department.

The Los Angeles Fire Department maintains one of the baldest rank jimcrow practices ever inflicted upon a western community. There is no allbi, no excuse, no justification for the department's policy of maintaining segregated fire houses in Los Angeles.

So vicious is this policy that there are a number of quali-fled Negro firemen on the list who must wait until one of the present firemen dies or retires before they will be appointed to jobs.

IMPORTANT STATIONS

There are two fire houses commonly known as "colored companies." These are located at 14th and Central and at 34th and Central.

sixth annual report of the fire department issued by Chief John H. Alderson. According to the report, Station No. 14, at 14th and Central, had a total of 864 alarms, 183 false alarms, a total run of 1,818 miles, and 69,250 feet of hose laid for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946.
Station No. 30, at 34th and Central, answered 788 alarms 141 false alarms, ran 1,632.6 miles, and laid 56,850 feet of

Of the city's 83 engine companies, these two ranked among the first seven for the number of alarms answered in that year. The heroism of these firemen has never been questioned. According to the chief's report, the city is now approaching

a population of two million persons. The State Department of Motor Vehicles last year checked into the state automobiles that indicate that more than 200,000 new families moved

into Los Angeles.
INADEQUATE FACILITIES

In spite of this increase, and particularly in the Negro community, which has more than tripled its population, no new companies have been formed in the district.

Restrictive covenants force Negroes to live in ghet-toes. Many landlords, realizing this fact, spend little or nothing on improvement of their property. Spot-zoning comparable to that which permitted the O'Connor Electro-Plating Co. disaster makes the Negro community one of the vulnerable districts for fires and combustible ex-

In Southeast Los Angeles it is estimated that in the last four years more than 50,000 new homes were erected. Many of these homes are located within the city limits and are serviced by Co. 65, located at 103rd and Compton. Under the fire department job-by-complexion system, this is an all-white atation in spite of the fact that the community is 98 per cent Negro and Mexican. SOUTHEAST DISTRICT

Petition Spurs Action

Mayor Poulson has taken steps to accomplish a feat that two predecessors covering a 20-year span aever undertook—an investigation into alleged local Fire department discrimination.

Monday, he asked the Fire commission to investigate a petition charging that racial discrimination is a standard Fire department practice.

Though discrimination allegedly has been rampant in the department for years, and despite lipservice given the problem by ex-Mayors Shaw and Bowron, Mayor Poulson's action, expressed in a ietter to Fire Commissioner How-ard J. Callanan, represents the first positive step to study segregation charges.

The commission set a hearing on the petition for Oct. 8.

Petitioners claim that Negroes passing the civil service examination for fireman can only serve when a vacancy occurs in one of two fire stations staffed only by Negroes.

Additionally, the petition maintuins that the highest rank to (Continued on Page A-2)

Poulson's letter underscored the need for "investigating immediately the allegations in the petition."

He also said, "If they are true, I am sure that you will agree this such practices are abhorrent in a democratic nation such as ours. I trust your board will take such aumminy action as may be necessary to completely eliminate any such unfairness."

In an interview with the Sentinel, Mayor Poulson said that during his campaigning for the mayorally seat recently, he heard talk of Fire department discrimination. "I stated I wasn't in favor of it then, and I don't favor it now," he said.

Mayor Poulson said he isn't necessarily investigating the charges simply because they involve possible discrimination against Negroes, but because the rights of American citizens are involved, and it didn't matter whether they are of French, Dutch, German, Ralian, Mexican extraction the important fact is, he said, there is no place for discriminatory practices in his administration.

He also pointed out that a new Fire commission is now in office, and that it can approach the problem freshly. He said that the reorganized Fire commission could exert a type of action which may or may not have been done in the past.

Poulson declared that he hopes the hearing will determine all of the facts outlined in the petitionred charges, and that he will not stand for discrimination in any respect. Meanwile, he declined to "just put people on the defensive" until he knows exactly what the facts of the case are.

This district represents the progress that has been made by many individuals who came to Los Angeles from other sections, worked hard, saved their money, built homes and take pride in developing the area into one

of the finest residential districts in the city.

Yet, according to the sixtleth annual report of the fire department, provisions were made in the budget for the acquisition of sites for engine companies at Brentwood, Pico and Robertson, Venice, San Fernando District, Cahuenga Pass, Franklin and Van Ness avenues; and previous provision for Main and Augusta streets, 29th and Main streets, North Hollywood, Westchester District, Encino and Bel-Airbut not one word about the Southeast district. SEPARATE, UNEQUAL

While Negro firemen are barred from stations in white neighborhoods, at least three all-white stations are maintained in neighborhoods that are predominantly colored.

Here again, as the Sentinel has often pointed out, we see that wherever facilities are segregated, they are "separate but not equal." Although we do not condone segregation under any conditions, it seems to us that under the policy followed by the fire department, Negro firemen are doubly discriminated against by being barred from some of the stations in the colored community.

Negro firemen who risk their lives day after day in performance of their duty, do so knowing that they can hope for no advancement beyond the rank of captain, and retire-

ment.

The Sentinel believes that a full-scale investigation should be launched at once by both the Board of Fire Commissioners, headed by Gordon G. Hair, and the Police and Fire committee of the city council, consisting of Councilmen George P. Cronk, Harold Darby and Don Allen who represents the Seventh District.


Prelude To Court Action

Fire Chief John H. Anderson Wednesday told NAACP lawyers at a deposition hearing on charges of discrimination in the fire department, that he personally thinks assignment of Negro firemen to Stations 14 and 30 only is proper. There are 87 stations in the city.

The NAACP and a citizens committee headed by Dr. H. Claude Hudson had charged last October at a public hearing that the Los Angeles Fire department practiced segregation by assigning Negroes exclusively to the two stations located on Central avenue, and denying them proper promotional and transfer opportunities.

The unusual hearing which began Monday took the form of a deposition hearing to perpetuate testimony preparatory to the filing of a court action. The depositions were being taken before Court Commissioner Clinton Rodda.

Chief Alderson—first witness at the current hearing—is quoted as (Continued on Page A4)

NAACP Atty. Thomas G. Neusom quizzed Alderson at length concerning the department's personnel records, asking him if "any records are kept with respect to race, nationality, color or religion."

"Religion makes no difference," Anderson answered. In earlier testimony, Alderson

had denied that there was any notation of race or color on any fire department personnel forms, but admitted that photos of firemen were attached to their applications.

Neusom examined three personnel folders and called Alderson's attention to notations of "Negro," "colored," and "brown" on some of the papers. Alderson shrugged his shoulders.

He was directly asked if he intended changing the alleged segregation policies, and specifically the assignment of Negro firemento stations throughout the city. Alderson said no.

Alderson said members of the "so-called Negro race" could best serve the interests of the city and department in their present location because of their ability to work as a team and many other reasons "outside of race."

"What do you mean so-called

Negro race?" Neusom retorted.

Alderson squirmed in his seat as Commissioner Rodda discounted any reason to clarify his re-

Chief Alderson admitted from the hearing's outset that there are 81 Negroes in the department. Seventy-five are assigned to the two stations, he said, and the other six are scattered in other bureaus not assigned to fire fighting duties.

He accused "outside interests" of instigating requests made last year by 54 Negro firemen for transfer to non-segregated units, No requests for transfers out of the two "Negro" stations were made prior to last year, Alderson said.

He said none of the requests were granted because "they all reached headquarters with disapproval by all intermediate chief officers."

Alderson was asked if the records of Negro firemen could be inspected in the department offices, and the fire chief said "not without a court order." Commissioner Rodda said examination of records would unduly prolong proceedings and will he not make such an order at this time. The hearing was originally scheduled

to last two days, but that time

was expended questioning Alder-

son.

Atty. Neusom told reporters that the committee he represents will probably withhold court action until Mayor Poulson has time to make good on his promise to end segregation within six months.

At SENTINEL press time. Fire Commissioner W. H. Lollier was taking the stand.

Poulson Fires Blast at Alderson Over Integration 'Stall'

Mayor Poulson called for a showdown yesterday with Fire Chief John Alderson on the subject of integration of colored members of the Fire Department with white personnel.

The Mayor, in a bluntly worded communication to the Fire Commission, said that the Fire Chief had been stalling for months about putting an integration program, advocated by both Poulson and the Fire Commissioners, into effect and that he should be forced to act or asked to resign.

Mayor's Message

The pithy paragraph which concluded the Mayor's mes-

sage was this:

"I further recommend that, if the Chief Engineer (Alderson) refuses or fails to comply with such order or orders by your honorable body, or evades or misinterprets the terms thereof, you then without hesitancy demand his immediate resignation and, up-on obtaining it, replace him with a man who does not regard himself as above the laws of our city, State and nation.

In other parts of his letter recent decision of the Fire the Mayor said that written opinions of the State Attorney General and the City Attorney had held that "the existence in the Los Angeles Fire Department of two fire stations staffed wholly by Negroes constituted in itself segregation on the basis of race allone" and was therefore in violation of recent U.S. Supreme Court decisions. preme Court decisions.

Cites Integration

"If they should issue such an order I will then consider how it may be implemented."

Request Approved

As a result of the inaction on the burning question itself, the possibility arose that the predicted showdown may be between Mayor Poulson and the commission, rather than with Alderson.

"Any further delay such as this is unfortunate," said the Mayor. "However, I believe that the commission, in conformance with the laws of this land, will solve this serious

"If not, I will then ask the City Council to approve the removal of any commissioner or commissioners who are blocking an orderly conclusion of this matter and thus failing to abide by the law."

Brock Away

Final outcome of the controversy may await the return of the fifth member of the commission, Milton J. Brock Sr., who is expected back from Europe about the middle of this month.

Yesterday's meeting in the Fire Department headquarters building, 217 S Hill St., opened in a tense atmosphere.

The 300 off-duty firemen attempted to crowd into a small auditorium seating only 150. They lined the walls and aisles and spilled out into hallways and adjoining offices.

In a sharply-worded letter to the Board of Fire Commissioners, Mayor Poulson Tuesday ordered that Chief Alderson be instructed to end fire department segregation or "replace him with a man who does not regard himself as above the laws of our city, state and nation."

The fire chief has been in hot water some months for his policy of assigning Negro firemen to but two of the city's 90 stations. The chief had claimed his policy was utilized "in the best interest of the city and of the department"

Charges were first directed against the department policy by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, who alleged that such policy denied Negroes equal assignment and promotional opportunity, and was in violation of the constittion.

Poulson also directed the board

"The chief fire engineer has seen fit to flout policy and wantonly misinterpreted orders," the mayor pointed out. "His motives I cannot fathom, nor comprehend why he has chosen to disregard with such effrontery the orders of the commission."

NAACP officials were jubilant over the letter. Atty. Thomas G.

Neusom of the legal redress committee issued the following statement:

"The mayor is to be commended on his forthright stand. As one of the attorneys for the NAACP. I subscribe to the immediate removal of John H. Alderson as chief engineer, and in view of his threat over the radio to the Negro employees of the fire department, I feel he is not qualified to administer any plan of integration."

Even In Los Angeles— Segregation Dies Hard

I witnessed the makings of mob violence last Thursday, and it wasn't pretty. It never is.

Everything was there except a band playing "Dixie," corn pone, and the Confederate flag.

It was even mixed with a standard ingredient — race

hatred and blind dedication to a dying cause.

The scene was Fire department headquarters, 217 S. Hill street. The occasion—a regular meeting of the Board of Fire Commissioners. The issue—integration of Negro and white fire fighting personnel.

In a blunt letter to the commission last week, Mayor Poulson had demanded such integration in the light of personal study and opinions of the City attorney and State attorney general that to segregate Negro Ilremen into but two of the city's 90 stations on the basis of race alone is a constitutional violation.

Fire Chief John H. Alderson has publicly admitted that segregation exists in the department and he intended doing nothing to change it. His stand is challenged by the mayor, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, civic groups and several members of the fire board itself.

The commission was convened to consider the mayor's charge of Alderson's "absurd arrogance... wanton misrepresentation of orders," and his immediate replacement, if Alderson continued to block the integration order, with a man "who does not regard

himself above the law . . ."

But Alderson was not without support too.

A "goon squad" of about 400 off-duty firemen jammed the corridors, effectively blocking efforts of NAACP attorneys, Negro reporters and spectators, and anyone else who was not of white complexion from entrance to the hearing room. It looked accidental and above board, but their motives were unmistakenly clear.

Mob rule took over, and for 45 minutes the ugly crowd kept the blockade going. Standing three and four abreast and three deep at each entrance, the well-organized firemen silently defied anything dark to enter the chambers.

There was low muttering and high feeling as the trumpeters of Alderson's cause shoved around and attempted to collar NAACP attorneys as they tried to make their way to the commission offices.

Guess who was the savior of the day? Chief Alderson himself, who strode into the corridor and warned his men not to do anything that would reflect on themselves and the department.

Was the visiting firemen's attitude a planned affair? I think so.

This reporter overheard one firemen say to a small group, "Don't forget, we're supposed to make plenty of noise when Alderson appears." They did.

Thus Chief Alderson had his day, and Los Angeles nearly had a race riot. But the issue is still in doubt. One way or another the year-old controversy is coming to a head.

It was a little difficult to sleep that night with the knowledge that segregation dies as hard in Los Angeles as it does in Natchez.

Stand Reiterated

"This board reiterates its stand that the assignment of the Negro fire-fighting personnel exclusively to Stations 14 and 30 is not in accord with the policy of this board, and is considered to be a discriminatory assignment of such personnel, and therefore, not lawful.

"This order constitutes an instruction to the general manager (Chief Engineer) concerning his exercise of the powers conferred upon him by the charter of the city of Los Angeles that he is hereby instructed, ordered and directed to initiate a gradual transfer of a part of the personnel now stationed at Stations 14 and 30 to such other stations in the city of Los Angeles as he may deem to be in the best interests of the people of the city and of this department, regardless of race, creed or color.

Further Provisions

further that:

"The rank and capabilities of the respective personnel shall be carefully weighed in making each transfer and/or assignment under this directive; and provided, further, that the Chief Engineer shall take such action and issue such orders as will assure the co-operation of the entire personnel of the department with this program of integration of personnel without regard to race, creed or color.

"The Chief Engineer shall be, and he is hereby instructed, ordered and directed to appoint, transfer, assign and promote personnel of this department without regard to race, creed or color."

Audience Breaks Up

After the commission adopted the resolution the small auditorium holding the 100 visiting firemen emptied almost instantly. Robert Hatfield, chairman of the Fire Department's fact-finding committee on integration and seg-regation, said: "We can't issue a statement until we study the resolution."

The two attorneys, Edward C. Maddox and Herbert Simmons Jr., representatives of the legal redress committee of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, criticized the time loophole in the resolu-

tion.

In a prepared statement they said: "The NAACP acclaims the resolution's forthright recognition of the law and the adoption of a policy denouncing segregation in the Los Angeles Fire Department and its clear mandate for 'fair

play' in employment.
"We recognize, however, that a gradual plan with no commencement date is fraught.

The source identified the men only as "Kenworthy, Barnes and McFarland."

Engine 46, located at Vernon and Normandie avenues, is the second station in the city to which Negroes have been transferred in an integration program demanded by the NAACP and other civic (Continued on Page B-2)

organizations and ordered by the Board of Fire Commissioners. The other station is located in the Studio City area.

The two Negro firemen transferred to Engine 46 were James P. Chichester and Reynaldo Lopez.

Chichester was recently transferred back to Station 14—one of the two all-Negro staffed sations and focal point of fire department segregation charges—at his own request because of the treatment he said he suffered at the hands of white firemen at Engine 46.

Lopez, meanwhile, was granted a leave of absence and returned to duty only several days ago. According to the informant,

According to the informant, Lopez had been accepted on a friendly basis by three white firemen since his return to duty.

Suddenly, the source says, the friendly firemen received phone calls from a division chief asking if they didn't want to be transferred to other stations. "You don't want to serve with n---s, do you?" the chief is alleged to have asked. The firemen reportedly said it didn't make any difference one way or the other.

It is reported that the firemen were "pressured" and then transferred to other stations without requesting to move. The source said the transfers were accepted "under protest."

Meanwhile, three new white firemen have been transferred to Engine 46, the source said, and Lopez is being given the "silent treatment," denied use of the coffee pot, and his privileges curtailed.

In another action, representatives of the Los Angeles County Conference on Community Relations met Tuesday night with civic groups and newsmen to formulate plans to demand a speedup of the integration process and document steps that have been taken in that direction.

Board Head Hits Lag in Integration

Says Alderson Hasn't Speeded Move; Calls for Fire Commission Action

Fire Commission President G. William Shea complained yesterday that racial integration within the city Fire Department has been going on at a "snail's pace" and urged commission action to speed the program.

Shea's comment followed the filing of a report by Fire Chief John Alderson in which the Ghief estimated that inte-gration of white and Negro firemen would take "at least five years of patience, educa-tion and careful guidance."

Alderson's report was pre-pared in response to a Fire Commission demand for specific answers to a list of questions covering progress made since the integration policy was adopted by a resolution of the Board of Commissioners and an engineer."

Basis of Complaint

Although the commissioners generally declined to comment on the Chief's report until they had more time to study it. Shea complained in a brief summary that Alder-son reported he had made no written orders in furtherance of integration and offered no specific steps for carrying out

the program in the future.
Chief Alderson countered that the original resolution had not specified that written orders be igned and the orders because of the orders because of the orders and the orders because of the order of the ord orders be issued and the present board's request for a report had not asked for an outline of his future plans. said he had been instructed by the previous board only to begin the "gradual" integration

of whites and Negroes.
"I don't think anyone can say that it has been non-gradual," She a commented wryly, "Maybe you could say ir has gone almost at a snail's

Finds Queries Answered

Shea granted that Alderson had answered all questions put to him, however, and de-clared that "the stage is set for us, within our powers, to determine what must be determine done."

Shea said he and Commissioner Roy Sheldon, as the board's committee on personnel, would get together im-mediately with Alderson to work out specific steps for

the integration program.
In his report Alderson said a total of 71 Negroes are still a total of 11 Negroes are still assigned to Stations 14 and 30. He said two Negroes were transferred from these sta-tions to Engine Co. 78 last December and 12 white fire-men who "were known to be unopposed to integration" were transferred into Engine Co. 78 the same day.

Asked why he regarded the results of this preliminary move toward integration as unsatisfactory, Alderson

stated:

Total Integration' Plan In 3 Weeks, Fire Bd. Orders

A plan for "total integration" of Negro firefighting personnel was ordered by the Board of Fire Commissioners at its regular meeting last week.

The order came in the form of a two-page directive—Resolution 283—which directed Chief John H. Alderson to come up with a total integration plan in three weeks, which spells out precisely how the program will work.

The resolution, submitted by Commissioner Victor Carter, latest appointee to the board, contained a four-point summary which laid down essentials the program must include.

Members of the department who have shared assignments with four Negroes previously transferred from the all-Negro stations No. 14 and 30, shall not be used in the new transfers.

Alderson is instructed to make use of firemen who have prior experience in mixed outfits in the armed forces in the integration plan.

It provides that at least two Negro firemen must be assigned to each platoon of the station to which transfers are made.

And the resolution concludes with a sharp statement of department policy regarding integration, which specifically forbids any discriminatory practices by officers of the Fire department, and calls for stern disciplinary action in cases of violation of the policy code.

NAACP President Thomas G. Neusom issued the following statement after learning of the order:

"Alderson is incapable of administering integration within the Los Angeles Fire department and anything short of his removal is a halfway measure."



Why So Few Black Firemen?

'Because Los Angeles Thwarts Their Hiring-as It Has for Years'

This week, in a remarkable confrontation, the U.S. Department of Justice is suing the city of Los Angeles and its Fire Department for discrimination in the hiring of min-

Although the battle goes back to the early days of the Fire Department, the current round began eight months ago. In July, 1972, the U.S. Justice Department sent the city a "consent decree" that ordered Los Angeles, in effect, to increase the hiring of minorities—and to do it fast—or the federal government would be forced to take action.

The City Council refused to sign the consent decree, and so the Justice Department filed suit. The case is scheduled to come to trial tomor-

Tow.

The question is why Los Angeles? Isn't this a city where everyone, equally qualified, is supposed to have an equal chance at city jobs? Isn't this a city that most residents think of as an "Equal Opportunity Employer"? So why is the U.S. government suing Los Angeles to eliminate discrimination?

It is hard to explain what went

It is hard to explain what went wrong with minority hiring, because most people simply don't know the truth—don't know the basic facts on which the government has based its suit against the city. Moreoever, those who are exposed to the information find it unbelievable.

The reason the federal government is suing the city is simply that the city the state of the late of the city of the late.

the city thwarts the hiring of black firemen—as it has for years.

The facts indisputably support this contention. For example, the number of blacks entering the Fire Department has been steadily dwindling in the past question contention. dling in the past quarter-century. Whereas 14 black firemen were hired in 1946 and 1947, only 18 were accepted in the entire period of 1948-53.

During the following years, even fewer were taken on. In a letter to the City Council's personnel committee, the California Department of H u m an Resources Development (HRD) pointed out that, of 2,435 firemen hired between 1954 and 1964, only 12 were black.

In 1954, the Fire Department em-

ployed 81 blacks; 18 years later, the number had fallen to 42.

What brought on this rapid de-cline in minority manpower? The trouble grows, basically, out of three interrelated policies:

—The city, primarily through its fire and personnel departments, maintained an openly segregated fire-fighting force from the early 1900s to the middle 1950s.

—Even after integration was ordered, white firemen carried on a campaign of hate, harassment and punishment against black firemen and their sympathizers. The department's hateful reputation lingers in the black community, discouraging

applications.

—The city has not, until very recently, conducted recruitment ef-forts to counterbalance the effects of segregation and hate.

Billy G. Mills is a Los Angeles city councilman. His collaborator, Arnett Hartsfield, retired after 20 years as a Hartsfield, retired after 20 years as a Los Angeles fireman, is now a practicing attorney and a candidate for the board of education. This article is adapted from their forthcoming book, "The Old Stentorians," which concerns black firemen have which concerns black firemen here. Mills has presented a copy of the manuscript to the U.S. attorney who is arguing the suit described in the article for possible evidentiary use in the proceedings.

The situation was not originally so bleak. The Fire Department, organized into a full-time operation in 1885, hired its first black man in 1897. Others were hired intermit-tently and integrated into the force; one black fireman was even promot-

ed to lieutenant in 1905.

At this point segregation began. The new lieutenant was an officer and required someone to command. So all the black and Mexican firemen were brought together to form an all-minority group platoon, and later, two all-black fire stations. One was Engine Company 30, the other Engine Company 14—both in the heart of the black community.

For the next 30 years the city's efforts to confine its black firemen to these two stations dictated the treatmen of black applicants by the Civil Service Department. Employment by them was limited to the number needed at the two stations. Similarly, promotional opportunities were limited to those ranks within each fire station, and a black could advance only as high as captain (station commander).

The fire and civil services departments colluded to control the situation, using otherwise respectable rules to accomplish this. (As late as 1961, black firemen were forced to sleep in a "Negro bunk," set aside from the others, and were not allowed to eat with the other men. In some stations, they were barred from eating in the dining room at

Then, in January, 1954, Mayor Norris Poulson ordered an end to the segregated stations. Fire Chief John Alderson was opposed to inte-gration and made no bones about it. An avowed believer in racial segre-gation, the chief said it had his "complete consent and approval," since segregation was "best for the morale and efficiency of the department and the benefit to the people of the city that the department serves.

The chief openly resisted integration—and so did many of his officers and men. His assistant, deputy and battalion chiefs carried the message of resistance into the stations. The firemen took it from there.

For the one black fireman per shift —they had been spread out over 17 of the 91 stations—integration was hell. Human feces were smeared over their pillow cases, water was poured into their boots, firecrackers were set off inside their jackets, spoons were beaten against pans next to their ears, shadows of blacks were cast on the walls with flash-lights, and derogatory references were made about their mothers.

When white firemen showed friendliness to blacks, they were called "nigger lovers," given the silent treatment and even formally disciplined and transferred to "hate

houses" as punishment.
Through the years the black firemen took it all. As one white fireman put it: "I never saw a black fire-man become arrogant, hostile or an-gry to the point that he might hurt somebody . . . they just completely absorbed it."

But the black community did not just "absorb it." Blacks who heard just "absorb it." Blacks who heard about all the horrors happening to fathers, sons, brothers and cousins simply stopped thinking about the Fire Department as a desirable place to work. While white firemen successfully recruited among their relatives and friends, the exper-ience of black firemen produced the opposite effect.

opposite effect.

Today, with such other fields to enter as professional sports, law, medicine, sales, business, teaching and engineering, young blacks find the Fire Department even less attractive. Why not take a job where fighting for equal treatment is unnecessary? cessary

In 1969, the city's Personnel Department admitted for the first time that its examinations for firemen put minority applicants at a disadvantage, particularly in matters having no significant relevance to

the fire-tighting function.

Prodded by state and local agencies, the department produced a new group of test questions that proved to be more "culturally fair." Beyound that, the department decreased the height requirement by an inch to 5 feet 7 inches (the previous requirement had aliminated vious requirement had eliminated 15% of all minority candidates, especially Mexican-Americans and Orientals). It also increased the experimental actions are provided actions.

Orientals). It also increased the exam's emphasis on physical agility — that portion of it was now assigned a 30% weight.

Moreover, the fire and civil service departments did something they had never done before: they actively campaigned to recruit more minority-group applicants. Firemen visited colleges, high schools, libraries and groups to tell about the forthcoming test revisions, public service announcements were aired about announcements were aired about them, and 7,000 posters and 100,000 brochures were distributed.

The result was just short of amazing: 481 blacks were among the 3,152 persons who took the test, or a total of 15%. (In the immediately preceding test, only 2% of those who took the physical agility test were black.) the physical agility test were black.)
After all the tests were over, 1,424 whites and 198 r nority-group members were adjudged qualified and waiting to be certified by the department for employment.

Then came a stunning blow to minority hopes.

When the consent decree was presented to the city, the chief engineer of Los Angeles maintained that because of certain "efficiencies" he had achieved, it would not be necessary to hire any more firemen "for the

However, during official discussions, the chief engineer modified his opinion somewhat and now says that some men on the present list will be hired. It is extremely unlike-

DESCRIPTION

Fire Station #14 is located at the northwest corner of South Central Avenue and East 34rd Street in the City of Los Angeles. The International Style reinforced concrete building varies in height from one to three stories. A concrete block wall surrounds a lot associated with the building on the north side. On the south elevation, newly installed landscaping screens the building from the neighboring property. The building retains all aspects of integrity.

The building is generally rectangular in shape and is composed of a series of one-, two-, and three-story volumes. The street-facing (east) elevation has a balanced, asymmetrical composition with a one-story volume containing the pedestrian entrance and a two-story volume for the fire truck entrance. A red brick veneer connects the two volumes visually. The pedestrian entrance is situated in a three-part metal frame assemblage that creates a strong graphic effect. A metal slab door is set in the south end. Above are two hopper-style windows. To the south are four hopper-style windows stacked vertically in each of the two remaining sections. Dividing the two-story volume between the first and second stories is a shallow, linear canopy. Perched on the edge of the canopy are individual metal letters in a modern font spelling out "Fire Station No. 14" in capital letters. The first story has two, non-original, roll-up style fire truck doors. On the second story the concrete is scored into a grid pattern with a ribbon of windows centered in the grid.

The north elevation is a flat plane with one-over-one, double-hung, steel sash windows. The windows are evenly distributed with some set individually and some grouped into fours. At the northwest corner, a blank three-story volume houses the hose tower. A flat roof with overhanging eaves caps the tower. On all four sides, just below the eaves are three vents with vertical slats.

The south elevation steps up from one story to two stories with window types that include one-over-one, double-hung sash as well as casements.

The only apparent exterior alteration is the replacement of the fire truck doors. The concrete block wall along the lot on the north side of the building is of no consequence to the integrity as it is easily reversible. The building permit records indicate demolition of a one-story salvage, drying, and oil room that stood at the rear of the building and corrections to the parapets.

SIGNIFICANCE

Fire Station #14 is eligible for listing in the National Register under Criterion A as it is associated with events that have made a significant contribution to the broad patterns of our history. It meets the registration requirements for fire stations outlined in the Multiple Property Documentation (MPD) Form for Historic Resources Associated with African Americans in Los Angeles. It is significant at the local level in the context of civic engagement. Constructed in 1949, Fire Station#14 is significant as one of two segregated fire stations in Los Angeles.

All-black fire stations were simultaneous representations of racial segregation and sources of community pride. The first African American member of the LAFD, Sam Haskins, was hired in 1888. Born a slave in Virginia, he was assigned to Engine Company #4. He died in the line of duty in 1895. George Bright became the second black fireman in Los Angeles when he was hired in 1897. By 1902, he had attained the rank of lieutenant and the department was faced with a dilemma – segregate crews or allow a black man to supervise white men. In 1924, the department decided to assign all of the black firefighters in the city to Fire Station #30 under Bright's supervision.

As more blacks joined the department, Fire Station #30 became crowded. The department's wrecker (heavy rescue) was assigned to Fire Station #30, simply because there was insufficient riding room for all the firemen on the engines and truck. Another station was needed. In 1936, Fire Station #14 was opened to black firemen creating two additional captain and engineer positions along with ten additional firemen positions. This, of course, meant that the white firemen were removed from the station. Angry, the white firemen trashed the station with garbage and fecal matter. The Battalion Chief ordered them back to clean up their mess. In 1949, a new Fire Station #14 was opened next to the old one, which was demolished.

Civil service regulations were regularly violated to maintain the segregated system and retain captain as the highest rank open to African Americans. By 1953, the NAACP was pressing for equality in hiring, transfers, and promotions in LAFD. An alternative put forth to integration was to convert Fire Stations #20 and #21 to all-black companies to open up promotional opportunities. The idea, however, was rejected in favor of full integration. African American members of the Los Angeles County and City Fire Departments founded the Stentorians organization in 1954. Their purpose was to band together to address discrimination. In 1956, all the fire stations were finally integrated, but not without conflict.

Although Fire Station #14 is not being nominated under Criterion C, it is important to note that it was designed by architect Earl T. Heitschmidt who worked extensively in southern California. Born in Portland, Oregon in 1894. Heitschmidt was educated at the University of Oregon and MIT. He worked

at various architecture firms in Portland, Boston, and New York before opening his own practice in Los Angeles in 1930. When Heitschmidt was an associate with the New York firm of Schultz & Weaver, the firm designed the Los Angeles Biltmore Hotel. Some of his more distinguished works include the Wrigley Mansion in Phoenix (1929-30), Columbia Square with William Lescaze (1937), Wrigley Field (1938), Park La Brea (1941-49), General Motors Training Center in Burbank (1953), Los Angeles Furniture Mart (1955), and Harvey Mudd College Master Plan in Claremont (1956).



Property boundary outlined in bold Source: Los Angeles County Tax Assessor


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


