THE WESTWOOD (PROPERTY BASED) BUSINESS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT'S  
2022 FISCAL YEAR ANNUAL PLANNING REPORT

Honorable Members:

The Office of the City Clerk has received the Annual Planning Report for the Westwood Business Improvement District's ("District") 2022 fiscal year (CF 14-1515). The owners' association of the District has caused to be prepared the Annual Planning Report for City Council's consideration. In accordance with the Property and Business Improvement District Law of 1994, California Streets and Highways Code Section 36650, an Annual Planning Report for the District must be submitted for approval by the City Council. The Westwood Business Improvement District's Annual Planning Report for the 2022 fiscal year is presented with this transmittal for City Council's consideration as "Attachment 1."

## BACKGROUND

The Westwood Business Improvement District was established on April 15, 2016 by and through the City Council's adoption of Ordinance No. 184241 which confirmed the assessments to be levied upon properties within the District, as described in the District's Management District Plan. The Council established the District pursuant to State Law.

## ANNUAL PLANNING REPORT REQUIREMENTS

The State Law requires that the District's owners' association shall cause to be prepared, for City Council's consideration, an Annual Planning Report for each fiscal year for which assessments are to be levied and collected to pay for the costs of the planned District improvements and activities. The Annual Planning Report shall be filed with the City Clerk and shall refer to the district by name, specify the fiscal year to which the report applies, and, with respect to that fiscal year, shall contain all of the following: any proposed changes in the boundaries of the district or in any benefit zones within the district; the improvements and

activities to be provided for that fiscal year; an estimate of the cost of providing the improvements and activities for that fiscal year; the method and basis of levying the assessment in sufficient detail to allow each real property owner to estimate the amount of the assessment to be levied against his or her property for that fiscal year; the amount of any surplus or deficit revenues to be carried over from a previous fiscal year; and the amount of an contributions to be made from sources other than assessments levied.

The attached Annual Planning Report, which was approved by the District's Board at their meeting on October 21, 2021, complies with the requirements of the State Law and reports that programs will continue, as outlined in the Management District Plan adopted by the District property owners. The City Council may approve the Annual Planning Report as filed by the District's owners' association or may modify any particulars contained in the Annual Planning Report, in accordance with State Law, and approve it as modified.

### FISCAL IMPACT

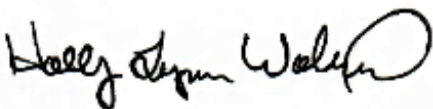
There is no impact to the General Fund associated with this action.

2022 Annual Planning Report

### **District Name**

This report is for the Westwood Business Improvement District (District). The District is operated by the Westwood Village Improvement Association (WVIA), a California non-profit corporation.

### **Fiscal Year of Report**

The report applies to the 2022 Fiscal Year. The District Board of Directors approved the 2022 Annual Planning Report at the October 21, 2021 Board of Director's meeting.

### **Boundaries**

There are no changes to the District boundaries for 2022.

### **Benefit Zones**

There are no changes to the District's benefit zone(s) for 2022.

### **2022 IMPROVEMENTS, ACTIVITIES AND SERVICES**

#### **Clean, Safe, Beautiful Programs: \$1,305,242.45 (73.19%)**

##### Safe Team Program

The Safety Program will provide security services for the individual assessed parcels located within the District in the form of walking and segway patrols. The purpose of the Safe Team Program is to prevent, deter and report illegal activities.

##### Clean and Beautiful Program

Sidewalk Cleaning: Uniformed, radio equipped personnel sweep litter, debris and refuse from sidewalks and gutters of the District. District personnel will pressure wash the sidewalks.

Trash Collection: Collector truck personnel collect trash from sidewalk trash receptacles as needed. District trucks are often called to dispose of illegal food vendors' inventory. They are also dispatched to collect stolen shopping carts and large bulky items illegally dumped in the District.

Graffiti Removal: District personnel remove graffiti by painting, using solvent and pressure washing. The District maintains a zero tolerance graffiti policy. An effort is made to remove all tags within 24 hours on weekdays.

Landscape Maintenance/Tree Lighting: Landscape maintenance and street tree trimming are important programs that work to attract increased customers to the District. Landscape maintenance includes weed abatement and median maintenance. A tree lighting program on existing street trees in the public right-of-way also increases the uniqueness of the District and increases the overall lighting within the District.

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The Affecting Homelessness Program funds a dedicated outreach specialist to connect those in need with services and housing.

### **Communication & Development : \$252,893.06 (14.18%)**

### **Management/City Fees and Slow Pay: \$225,319.03 (12.63%)**

The improvements and activities are managed by a professional staff that requires centralized administrative support. Management staff oversees the District's services which are delivered seven days a week. Management staff actively works on behalf of the District parcels to insure that City and County services and policies support the District. Included in this item are management labor, office expense and organizational expenses such as insurance and the cost to conduct a yearly financial review.

### **Total Estimate of Cost for 2022**

A breakdown of the total estimated 2022 budget is attached to this report as **Appendix A.**

### **Method and Basis of Levying the Assessment**

The Method and Basis for levying the 2022 assessment remains the same as listed in the Management District Plan. Annual assessments are based upon an allocation of program costs and a calculation of assessable footage for two (2) Benefit Zones. Assessments are determined by lot square footage, building square footage and street front footage. The assessment rates for 2022 are as follows:

Zone 1

Lot: \$0.2429 per square foot

Building: \$0.1036 per square foot

Frontage: \$22.5917 per linear foot

Zone 2

Lot: \$0.2053 per square foot

Building: \$ 0.0723 per square foot

Frontage: \$20.2432 per linear foot

**(There is a 5.0% CPI increase for 2022)**

**Surplus Revenues: \$180,059.00**

Savings of \$180,059.00 from 2021 assessments is primarily unallocated line items pertaining to a BID staff position that went unfilled for 12 months in 2021, and events and communications activities that could not take place in 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and Emergency Declaration shutdown orders. This surplus will be expended in 2022 in the categories for Clean, Safe, and Beautiful Communications/Development, and Management.

**Anticipated Deficit Revenues**

There are no deficit revenues that will be carried over to 2022.

**Contribution from Sources other than assessments: \$18,656.27**

General benefit funding totals \$6,656.27

Westwood Village Farmers Market Revenues and other contributions estimated totals \$12,000
