The ethical solution to the problem that the City Council created would be to keep First Responders respectfully in their positions. Many, if not all, the men and women in these professions lay down their lives daily so that the residents of Los Angeles City can safely sleep at night. The families and friends of those on the frontlines await patiently daily to see if their loved ones will make it home at the end of their watch. The career path in Emergency Response is not an easy journey, nor is it one that many can handle, or as simple as filling out an application. It takes hard work, dedication, and years of physical and mental training. Qualifications include passing backgrounds and testing. In addition, there are requirements of acquiring certifications to comply with the standards to obtain the job. If a person seeking to become a Firefighter cannot pass a medical EMT class, typically six months in duration, they will not be qualified or ready to help the public in emergencies. A large percentage of candidates require taking classes more than once. If a recruit makes it through the hiring process, they move forward to a Drill Tower or Police Academy; there are high drop rates within that time frame. Once that process is complete, candidates move on to the field for a one-year probation period. There will be rookies that will walk away from the job during that time frame after seeing traumatic incidents. It takes a unique individual to have the skills, courage, and training to handle the weight of the job of a First Responder. City Council has spent its efforts eliminating skilled, seasoned, and highly valued professionals that the public counts on daily for help. The decisions and actions that the Council is making have been in response to political agendas and the financial gain of government funds for each county. This motion for those who refuse to vaccinate is irresponsible and tyrannical. Our Los Angeles City Emergency Responders should be Plan A at all costs, never should they become Plan B. The unconstitutional mandates that City Council is forcing upon First Responders, Los Angeles City employees (sworn and non-sworn), puts the public

in danger by not having high enough trained individuals on the field. The Council is overstepping its boundaries in its response to the Pandemic. The City Council should reevaluate and reconsider its position on firing any employee who wishes to exercise their rights and not vaccinate.
