Retirement of Park Ranger Division Mounted Unit Horse and Donation of the Horse to Private Citizen

Recommendation for Council Action:

The Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners (Board) respectfully requests City Council approve the retirement of "Trigger" from City service and grant permission to donate this horse to Juan Fregoso, a private citizen, so that he may live out the remainder of his life under the care of an experienced equestrian; (ii) Find that "Trigger" is surplus City equipment eligible for donation under Los Angeles Administrative Code (LAAC) 22.547 and request the City Council to approve the donation of "Trigger" to Juan Fregoso, a private citizen, as further detailed in attached Report No. 22-044.

Background:

Trigger is a 13 year old Quarter Horse gelding that has been with the Department of Recreation and Parks, Park Ranger Division (Division) since 2016. At the time he was donated to the Division, he had a pre-existing injury to his right, front leg. With proper veterinary care and shoeing, he was able to provide 5 years of service to the Division. He has recently begun showing signs of re-aggravation to his old injury and, as such, has become temperamental and shown signs of aggression. While RAP honors Trigger's service, staff believes that discharging this horse from the City service is the most responsible and prudent course of action at this time. The Division recommends that Trigger be donated as surplus City equipment to Juan Fregoso, a private citizen, in accordance with LAAC 22.547 as the cost to discard, recycle or transport the surplus equipment would otherwise impose a documented net financial cost to the City.

Mr. Fregoso has over 20 years' experience working with horses and owns horse property in Mira Loma, California. RAP Staff believes he has the experience and facilities required to properly care for Trigger with his medical and behavioral needs.
