SUMMARY

The Board of Public Works (Board), on behalf of the Bureau of Sanitation (Bureau), requests approval to execute a personal services agreement with Arakelian Enterprises, Inc. DBA Athens Services (Athens), Recology Blossom Valley Organics – South (Recology), and Waste Management Recycling and Disposal Services of California, Inc. DBA Waste Management (Waste Management), collectively the Contractors, for the Curbside Organics Collection Program. The City collects approximately 1,762 tons per day of green waste and horse manure. Approximately 81 percent of the collected green waste and manure is process by contracted facilities and the remainder is processed by City facilities. In September 2016, Senate Bill 1383 Short Lived Climate Pollutant (SB 1383) was signed into law requiring the reduction of organic waste by 75 percent by 2025. SB 1383 mandates the collection of organic waste, including, but not limited to, green material, food material, food-soiled paper products, wood material, horse manure and bio solids from all generators through the State. The City facilities have limited contracted capacity for processing organic waste, including food waste. The Bureau anticipates the City will need to collect 3,000 tons per day as a result of AB1383. The collection of organics materials is a non-discretionary activity for the Bureau and the execution of these agreements is necessary to meet the City's adopted Zero Waste policy. The Mayor and Council have set goals for the City to achieve 90 percent diversion of material from landfills by 2025, 95 percent by 2035, and 100 percent by 2050. The City is implementing a number of programs to ensure the City is able to reach this goal, including recycling, single-use products phase-out, organics diversion and composting. The Bureau launched food waste collection programs, including commercial and residential food waste prevention, and a food waste collection pilot.

The Contractors were selected as a result of a Request for Proposals (RFP) in 2021 to expand the curbside collection program. The Bureau received eight proposals for the receipt, transport, processing and beneficial reuse of organic waste from the City of Los Angeles as indicated in the RFP. An evaluation panel of five Solid Resources staff evaluated the eight proposals based on the criteria established in the RFP. Three companies, Enviro-Pac, Storm Fisher and True North proposed technologies that would convert the residual municipal solid waste to energy and other by-products that could be beneficial if markets were available. These technologies could help the City to reach 95 percent diversion from landfills by 2035, however, the proposers do not have existing facilities that could receive and process the material by the start of the citywide implementation of the curbside organics collection program. The Bureau requested authority from the Board to utilize consultant assistance in evaluating Enviro-Pac's proposed technologies and site. The Board authorized the Bureau to utilize consultant support to negotiate with Enviro-Pac for the development of new Anaerobic Digestion facilities to process organic waste to energy and other beneficial byproducts. Anaergia Services, LLC (Anaergia) proposed the development of an organics processing facility at the City of Los Angeles Recycling and Transfer Station (CLARTS) to pre-process organic waste for subsequent transfer and processing at the Anaergia's Rialto Bioenergy Facility or alternatively, at the City's Hyperion Water Reclamation Plant and Terminal Island. The Board has authorized the Bureau to continue discussions with Anaergia for an organics processing facility at CLARTS.

Waste Management ranked first in the RFP process. Waste Management identified the Bradley East Transfer Station/Sun Valley Recycling Park and Waste Transfer Recycling transfer station for the preprocessing, transload and/or transfer of organic waste and the composting of materials at up to six facilities. The Bureau will deliver a minimum of 300 tons per day of material through Waste Management facilities. The proposal from Waste Management was found to satisfy the needs of the City and the committee recommends awarding a contract to Waste Management.

Recology ranked second in the RFP process. Recology has identified the Blossom Valley Organics – South (RBVOS) facility to compost organic waste delivered to the facility. The Bureau will deliver materials via CLARTS as well and transload and transfer options provided by Athens. The Bureau will deliver up to 1,500 tons per day of material to Recology. The proposal from Recology was found to satisfy the needs of the City and the committee recommends awarding a contract to Recology.

Athens ranked third in the RFP process. Athens has identified the Crown Recycling Services Material Facility, as well as three transfer stations, for pre-processing, transload and transfer of organic waste and the composting material at RBVOS and American Organics. The Bureau will deliver up to 1,500 tons per day of material to Athens. The proposal from Athens was found to satisfy the needs of the City and the committee recommends awarding a contract to Athens.

The Contractors will be paid a monthly service fee which is calculated by multiplying the tonnage delivered to the Contractor's disposal or transfer facilities according to the tip fee schedule in Section 11.2 of the respective agreements. For Waste Management and Recology, the tip fees will increase according to the Consumer Price Index for Water Sewer (CPI-WST) inflation factor. The CPI-WST will be capped at six percent in any year that the CPI-WST inflation factor exceeds six percent. For Athens, the tip fees will increase based on a weighted price index using the Employment Cost Index for Total Compensation by Occupational group and Industry for Private Industry Worker, Service Producing Industries, Trade, Transportation and Utilities, the Producer Price Index for Solid Waste Collection and the Producer Price Index for Transportation Industries. The weighted cost index inflation factor exceeds six percent. In addition, a transportation fuel charge will be added to the tip fee schedules to account for fluctuations in the diesel fuel price and will be calculated against a baseline fuel price of \$4.00 per gallon.

The Bureau estimates the cost for the first five year contracts for Athens is \$147,414,572 and \$687,031,879 over the potential 15 year term. The cost for the first five year contracts for Recology is \$54,026,752 and \$251,793,974 over the potential 15 year term. The cost for the first five year contracts for Waste Management is \$157,705,931 and \$734,995,195 over the potential 15 year term. The total potential cost for the services proposed to be contracted is \$1,673,821,048. Funding is provided by the Solid Waste Resources Revenue Fund and the Integrated Solid Waste Management Fund.

In accordance with Charter Section 1022, the Personnel Department determined there are City classifications that can perform the work being proposed for contracting. This Office determined that it is more feasible to contract for these services. In accordance with the Los Angeles Administrative Code Section 10.5(a), the proposed agreement requires Council approval as the term of the agreement will exceed three years.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

There is no direct General Fund impact for these agreements. Funding is provided by the Solid Waste Resources Revenue Fund and the Integrated Solid Waste Management Fund. The Solid Waste Resources Revenue Fund is not considered a full cost recovery fund as the services provided by this

fund are subsidized by the General Fund. Funding beyond the current year will be appropriated through the City's budget process. The agreements contain a Financial Liability Cause which limits the City's annual financial obligation to the amount approved in the corresponding year's budget.

FINANCIAL POLICIES STATEMENT

The recommendation in this report complies with the City's Financial Policies in that expenditures of special funds are limited to the mandates of the funding sources.
