RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

1. That the Board of Police Commissioners (Board) REVIEW and APPROVE this report.
2. That the Board TRANSMIT the attached grant application and award, pursuant to Administrative Code Section 14.6(a), to the Mayor, Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), Office of the Chief Legislative Analyst, and to the City Clerk for Committee and City Council consideration.
3. That the Board REQUEST the Mayor and City Council to:
 - A. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to retroactively APPLY for and ACCEPT the grant award of \$175,000 for the 2022 Community Policing Development (CPD) Microgrants Program from the United States Department of Justice, Community Oriented Policing Services; for the period of September 1, 2022, through August 31, 2023;
 - B. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to negotiate and execute the grant award agreement, subject to the review of the City Attorney as to form and legality;
 - C. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to execute a new contract or amend existing agreements with Journey Out for provision of wraparound services to human trafficking victims. The term of the contract will be from September 1, 2022 to August 31, 2023 for a sum not to exceed \$50,000, subject to review and approval of the City Attorney;
 - D. AUTHORIZE the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to spend up to \$175,000 in accordance with the grant award agreement;
 - E. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to submit grant reimbursement requests to the grantor and deposit grant receipts into Fund No. 339, Department No. 70;

- F. AUTHORIZE the Controller to establish a grant receivable and appropriate \$175,000 to an appropriation account to be determined, within Fund No. 339, Department No. 70, for the receipt and disbursement of the 2022 CPD Microgrants Program grant funds;
- G. AUTHORIZE the Controller to increase appropriations on an as needed basis for the 2022 CPD Microgrants Program from appropriation account number to be determined, Fund No.339, Department No. 70, to Fund No. 100, Department No. 70, account number and amount as follows:

Account No. 001092, Sworn Overtime: \$42,500

- H. INSTRUCT the City Clerk to place the following action relative to the 2022 CPD Microgrants Program on the City Council agenda on July 1, 2023, or the first meeting day thereafter:

Authorize the Controller to transfer appropriation from Fund No. 339, Department No. 70, account number to be determined, to Fund No. 100, Department No. 70, account number and amount as follows:

Account No. 001092, Sworn Overtime: \$42,500

- I. AUTHORIZE the Controller to transfer appropriations within Fund No. 339, Department No. 70, account numbers to be determined, for fringe benefits and related costs, upon submission of proper documentation by the LAPD, subject to CAO approval of the related costs incurred during the grant performance period; and,
- J. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to prepare the Controller's instructions for any technical adjustments, subject to the approval of the CAO, and AUTHORIZE and INSTRUCT the Controller to implement the instructions.

DISCUSSION

The United States Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services has awarded \$175,000 of the 2022 CPD Microgrants Program grant funding to the LAPD. The 77th Street Vice Human Trafficking Unit, in partnership with Journey Out, will develop and implement an innovative, comprehensive and results-driven approach to combat human trafficking on the Figueroa Track. The 77th Street Vice Unit will utilize an intelligence-based strategy to re-align its focus and enforcement endeavors toward human traffickers and move away from traditional enforcement activity against commercial sex workers. The goal of the program is to engage in impactful enforcement to improve the quality of life for the underserved communities of South Los Angeles that live adjacent to the Figueroa corridor, ensure results driven wraparound services to the victims of human trafficking through our Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) partnerships, and decrease violent crime in South Los Angeles by holding those truly accountable for the human trafficking problem.

Grant funds have been allocated to purchase \$20,233.78 in surveillance equipment; \$8,301.22 in supplies; \$11,465 for personnel to attend the North American Human Trafficking Conference; \$50,000 for wraparound services with Journey Out; and, \$85,000 in overtime for human trafficking surveillance and investigations. The surveillance equipment will only be purchased after meeting compliance with the department's technology policy.

The LAPD was not able to include reimbursements for related costs for sworn and civilian overtime in support of this program at the time of application. After the grant is accepted by City Council and Mayor, the LAPD will submit a budget modification to the grantor requesting to reprogram a portion of the overtime hours to reflect eligible related cost reimbursements for the use of sworn and civilian overtime.

Upon approval by City Council and Mayor, the Grants Section will accept the grant award on behalf of the Chief of Police in the Just Grants federal grant management system.

The 77th Street Vice Human Trafficking Unit, in partnership with Journey Out, will utilize an intelligence-based strategy to re-align its focus and enforcement endeavors toward human traffickers and move away from traditional enforcement activity against commercial sex workers. The goal of the program is to engage in impactful enforcement to improve the quality of life of community members who live and work adjacent to the Figueroa corridor, ensure results-driven wraparound services to the victims of human trafficking, and decrease violent crime in South Los Angeles by holding those truly accountable for the human trafficking problem.

Grant funds have been allocated to purchase \$20,233.78 in surveillance equipment; \$8,301.22 in supplies; \$11,465 for personnel to attend the North American Human Trafficking Conference; \$50,000 for wraparound services with Journey Out; and, \$85,000 in overtime for human trafficking surveillance and investigations. The surveillance equipment will only be purchased after meeting compliance with the department's technology policy.

On behalf of Attorney General Merrick B. Garland, it is my pleasure to inform you the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (the COPS Office) has approved the application submitted by CITY OF LOS ANGELES for an award under the funding opportunity entitled 2022 FY22 Microgrants -Community Policing Development Solicitation. The approved award amount is \$175,000.

Office for Civil Rights Notice for All Recipients

In the last two years, Los Angeles Police Department's (LAPD) 77th Street Area has experienced a disproportionate increase in violent crimes, causing fear for the residents. Between 2020 and 2022, there was a 93% increase in homicide, 23% increase in Robbery, 15% increase in Motor Vehicle Theft, 57% increase in Shots Fired, and 83% increase in Shooting Victims. A significant portion of the crime numbers occurred in the Figueroa Track, a streetwalking prostitution location made world famous by social media. All crimes adjacent to the Figueroa Track is assumed to be prostitution-related and are committed by human traffickers against other traffickers, commercial sex workers, prostitution customers, and the innocent citizens who either reside in the area or are passing through.

The proposed program's goal is to reduce Part I (violent and property crimes) in 77th by implementing a four-prong approach of a) Building trust and earning legitimacy; b) Investing in prevention and intervention programs; c) Targeted enforcement efforts and priorities; and d) Measuring results.

With the COPS Microgrant, the 77th Street Vice Human Trafficking Unit, in partnership with Journey Out, will develop and implement an innovative, comprehensive and results-driven approach to combat Human Trafficking on the Figueroa Track. The 77th Street Vice Unit will utilize an intelligence-based strategy to re-align its focus and enforcement endeavors toward Human Traffickers and move away from traditional enforcement activity against commercial sex workers. Through the FY FY22 Microgrants -Community Policing Development Solicitation, the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) is proposing the "Implementing Community Violence Intervention" (CVI) program in LAPD's 77th Street Area (77th). The LAPD is divided into four Bureaus and further into 21 geographical areas to effectively police the City of Los Angeles (City). South Bureau has a population of approximately 820,000 with a demographic composition of 56% Hispanic, 38% Black, 2% White, 2% Asian, 2% Other; with approximately 30% is below poverty level. The 77th is part of South Bureau with a population of approximately 175,000 and covers approximately 11.9 square miles. In 2021, 30% of LAPD's violent crimes occurred in South Bureau; 11% of which was in 77th, which covers approximately 2% of the City's area and 4% of the City's population.

The main audience benefitting from this COPS Microgrant will be the underserved communities of South Los Angeles who reside along Figueroa Street between Vernon Avenue and Imperial Highway. This section is known colloquially in the world of Human Trafficking as the "Figueroa Track" or "Figueroa Blade" and has the highest number of prostitution-related arrests in the City. It is a streetwalking prostitution location made world famous by social media and has become a plague affecting the quality of life of the residents. The HT victims will also benefit from development of investigative proficiency via training, surveillance and field work, which will yield state and federal filings on the criminals who are exploiting those victims.

Please describe how this Microgrant project will fulfill a specific public safety need. (max 250 words)

In the last two years, the 77th has experienced a disproportionate increase in violent crimes, causing fear for the residents. Between 2020 and 2022, there was a 93% increase in homicide, 23% increase in Robbery, 15% increase in Motor Vehicle Theft, 57% increase in Shots Fired, and 83% increase in Shooting Victims. The Figueroa Track is responsible for 17% of 77th Street Homicides, 10% of total violent crime, 8% of total Part I crimes, and 12% of shootings with hits. Year-to-date, the Figueroa Track has seen an increase in Homicides of 400%, Robbery of 48%, Shots Fired of 145%, Shooting Victims of 116%, Burglary of 37%, Grant Theft Auto of 21%, Burglary or Theft from Motor Vehicle of 76%, total Property Crime of 9%, and Part I Crimes of 13%. With the exception of property crimes, all crime adjacent to the Figueroa Track is assumed to be prostitution-related. A significant portion of these crimes are committed by human traffickers against other traffickers, commercial sex workers, prostitution customers, and the innocent citizens who either reside in the area or are passing through.

The proposed program's goal is to reduce Part I (violent and property crimes) in 77th by implementing a four-prong approach of: a) Building trust and earning legitimacy; b) Investing in prevention and intervention programs; c) Targeted enforcement efforts and priorities; and d) Measuring results.

What are the major activities that your agency will implement if funded? (max 250 words)

The proposed program will have a 4-prong approach:

1. Building trust and earning legitimacy. The 77th Vice Community Resource Office is responsible for building relationships within the community stakeholders by coordinating community-based programs, volunteer opportunities and disseminating community policing information. This office will inform the community about the proposed project's goals, objectives, and activities.
2. Investing in prevention and Intervention programs. The 77th will work with Journey Out, a non-profit organization whose mission is to help victims of commercial sexual exploitation and sex trafficking to leave a life of abuse and violence, overcome their fears, and empower them to reach their full potential and achieve their goals. They will be the main service provider for any prevention and intervention efforts as well as case management for HT victims.
3. Targeted enforcement efforts and priorities. The activities of the 77th Vice Unit will shift from an enforcement-based to an intelligence-based approach, targeting enforcement on the human traffickers rather than the commercial sex workers. The transition from a number-based success rubric to an impact-based model affords greater opportunities to protect HT victims and allow provision of needed wraparound services. The 77th Vice Unit will work with local, state and federal entities to successfully file charges against the human traffickers.
4. Measuring results. The LAPD will work with the TTA to identify performance measures to indicate and document process, success and lessons learned from the program.

How will the proposed activities assist your agency in implementing or institutionalizing community policing? (max 250 words)

The proposed program will further institutionalize community policing by:

- (1) Collaborative Partnerships: The LAPD will continue its relationship with Journey Out to provide wrap-around services to HT victims. The LAPD will continue to utilize existing LAPD community policing entities such as Senior Lead Officers assigned to the Figueroa Track, Community Relations Office, civilian Community Police Advisory Boards for 77th, and the Divisional Clergy Counsel. The LAPD will actively seek to establish relationships with the target community's businesses, schools, and residents who are stakeholders in the community. In addition, the LAPD will work with the District Attorney's Office of Los Angeles, the United States District Attorney's Office, and the Los Angeles City Attorney's Office for state and federal filings and prosecution.
- (2) Proactive Problem Identification: The LAPD is seeking to proactively counter the increasing crime trend in the target area. Since the current strategy of enforcement-based policing, target commercial sex workers (street walking prostitutes), in the Figueroa Track does not have a tangible effect in reducing crime, the LAPD is proposing to shift its policing into an investigation-based approach.
- (3) Align Organizational Structure: The proposed pilot program will place resources to support community partnerships and proactive problem-

Traditionally, LAPD divisional Vice Units are focused on enforcement-based strategies. These approaches yield significant arrest numbers and are a tangible indication of return on personnel investment. Unfortunately, they have not been a rubric for successfully impacting the Human Trafficking problem on the Figueroa Corridor. Plainly spoken, there are insufficient negative consequences for the Traffickers to discontinue victimizing commercial sex workers. Utilizing the internet, there is virtually an unlimited pool for them to prey upon. With the State of California's recognition that trafficked minors are victims rather than criminals, the Traffickers have moved significantly toward utilizing underage victims to work the Figueroa Corridor, knowing the consequences for those individuals are negligible. The Figueroa Corridor is ground zero for this activity as the majority of the traffickers are local gang members and the Corridor is the proving ground for new sex worker recruits.

With the COPS Microgrant, the 77th Vice Unit will focus on the Traffickers at the expense of tangible arrest results that are all too often held as indications of successfully combating the problem. The 77th Street Vice Human Trafficking Unit will develop and implement an innovative,

comprehensive and results-driven approach to combat Human Trafficking on the Figueroa Corridor in the City of Los Angeles. The 77th Street Vice Unit will utilize an intelligence-based strategy to re-align its focus and enforcement endeavors toward Human Traffickers and move away from traditional enforcement activity against commercial sex workers. The goal of the program is to engage in impactful enforcement to improve the quality of life for the underserved communities of South Los Angeles that live adjacent to the Figueroa corridor, ensure results driven wraparound services to the victims of Human Trafficking through our Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) partnerships, and decrease violent crime in South Los Angeles by holding those truly accountable for the Human Trafficking problem.

What are the final deliverables of the project? How do they contribute to the solicitation goals and requirements? (max 250 words)

Below are the proposed deliverables for the Implementing CVI in 77th:

- (1) Provide investigative training for 77th Vice Officers
- (2) Purchase surveillance equipment
- (3) 77th Vice to transition from enforcement-based policing to investigative-based policing in the Figueroa Track.
- (3) Develop a report that summarizes project, implementation, lessons learned, and ways the LAPD informed and engaged the 77th community; and present data such as number of arrest and reduction in crime.

These deliverables support the primary goal – to reduce Part I Crime in 77th. The grant funding provides the LAPD the capacity to implement the shift in policing outlined in this proposal and increase engagement between LAPD and the 77th Area community.

Project Reach and Impact

The proposed project will complement the efforts of the Los Angeles Regional Human Trafficking Task Force (LARHTTF), led by the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Office. The LARHTTF, of which LAPD is a part of, is a regional collaborative effort to respond to human trafficking in the Los Angeles County, which has an area of 4,753 square miles, consisting of 88 cities, and approximately 10 million people. In a report released by the County of Los Angeles, the LAPD is responsible for recovering 59% of the Commercially Sexually Exploited Children (CSEC) juveniles in all Los Angeles County; LASD recovered 28%, and Long Beach Police Department 13%. Hence, there is a need for a more targeted effort in the LAPD to address the human trafficking cases within its City limits.

Describe the potential impact of the project to the law enforcement field as a whole. (max 250 words)

The potential impact of the project to the law enforcement field as a whole will be the concept shift from a traditional vice enforcement strategy, targeting commercial sex workers and their customers, toward an intelligence-based enforcement strategy specifically targeting the Human Traffickers themselves. The successful prosecution of Human Traffickers will act as an example to all Vice units from various agencies to disregard their previous strategies and embrace the concepts outline in this proposed project. The benefit if this strategy is twofold: First, it will provide critical services for HT victims, helping them to make the difficult leap to leaving the lifestyle into which they have been immersed, and second, to hold responsible those who are victimizing the most vulnerable members of our society. The success of this project will create a paradigm shift in the attempted eradication of Human Trafficking for the purposes of streetwalking commercial sex work.

What specific outcomes does your agency expect to accomplish with this funding and how will the project team track or measure them? (e.g. What data will you gather in order to assist with evaluating the effectiveness of the program? Why did you choose that data?) (max 250 words)

The specific outcome anticipated to be accomplished with this funding is the successful arrest and prosecution of Human Traffickers. This basic measure will coincide with the ultimate gauge of success: a demonstrable increase in the quality of life in the underserved communities of South Los Angeles. With the training funded by this COPS Microgrant, the 77th Vice Unit will be able to successfully apply their newly acquired investigative skills into cases that will satisfy the stringent prosecutorial standards set forth by both state and federal prosecutors. The investigation teams will track investigative successes and compare them to the successes of the last five years in factually consistent cases. In addition, 77th Vice Unit will track and document successful interventions by the non-governmental organization (NGO) partners with specific scrutiny paid to the number of minor victims of Human Trafficking who are rescued from the lifestyle. This data is tangible and specific and will be a quality indicator of the accomplishment and effectiveness of the program.

Once the initial investments in training and equipment are made, the proposed project is sustainable since the 77th Vice personnel are all funded by the City. The grant-funded surveillance equipment will remain in the Unit for future use, and the specific investigative techniques gained through training provided will be perpetuated in the Unit by sharing the skills acquired from one Officer to the next. By consistent and persistent application of the skills developed via training and the utilization of the equipment provided by the grant, the 77th Street Vice Unit will refine their skill set over time and work tirelessly to meet the standards set forth by their state and federal prosecutorial partners. The relationships forged during this initial phase will persist long after the grant award ends.

The LAPD will provide fiscal and administrative oversight over the grant program. The LAPD Grants Section oversees and reports on over 30 active grants. A grants analyst will be assigned to the FY 2022 CPD – Microgrant Program to manage the administrative aspects of the grant including preparing and submitting financial and progress reports and ensuring all grant expenditures follow both the City and Department of Justice financial policies and guidelines.

The 77th Vice Unit, comprised of 10 sworn personnel, will be responsible for coordinating activities related to program implementation including gathering performance measures data. The 77th Area is headed by Captain Ahmad Zarekani, who will be the project director for this project.

Sergeant Christian Wecker is the Officer in Charge (OIC) of the 77th Vice Unit and will manage the day to day operations of the project. He will ensure that all equipment and training will be directed toward implementation of policy and procedure that will result in furthering the goals of the project. The OIC will liaise with the NGOs to ensure wraparound services will be provided to the HT victims.

Journey Out is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to help victims of commercial sexual exploitation and sex trafficking leave a life of abuse and violence, overcome their fears, and empower them to reach their full potential and achieve their goals. Journey Out will provide direct face-to-face, trauma and survivor informed, culturally and linguistically appropriate services to victims of human trafficking regardless of age, race,

He will oversee the day to day activities of the grant including coordinating training, purchasing equipment, coordinating investigative efforts with the different entities within LAPD, and coordinate proposed program activities with other agencies including service agencies to provide wrap-around services to the Human Trafficking Victims and District and City Attorney Offices for prosecution efforts.

Nayeli May is the Executive Director of Journey Out and brings 18 years of experience assisting survivors of domestic violence and homeless populations, working closely with law enforcement to assist those in crisis, including victims and survivors of commercial sexual exploitation.

The LAPD is requesting approximately 850 hours of overtime to be allotted. Human Trafficking investigations are labor intensive and require a significant amount of personnel hours to successfully meet the prosecutorial requirements of state and federal District Attorneys filing conditions. The program manager (77th Street Vice unit Officer in Charge) will be charged with the overall management of the program, ensuring that the objectives of the grant re achieved, the project progress is meeting the benchmarks in the timeline, and that monitoring and evaluation of the effectiveness is completed. The vast majority of the overtime allotted will be used by Vice investigators in the field, conducting actual intelligence-based investigations that will result in a reduction of Part I crime along the Figueroa Corridor. These investigations will ultimately yield a more positive quality of life for the community surrounding the Corridor and increase the already positive relationship between the Department and its citizen partners.

Budget Narrative

The Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) is requesting \$175,000 in funding through the FY 2022 COPS Community Policing Development: Community Violence Intervention to develop and implement the 77th Street Vice Human Trafficking Unit, an innovative, comprehensive and results-driven approach to combat Human Trafficking on the Figueroa Corridor in the City of Los Angeles. The 77th Street Vice Unit will utilize an intelligence-based strategy to re-align its focus and enforcement endeavors toward Human Traffickers and move away from traditional enforcement activity against commercial sex workers. The goal of the program is to engage in impactful enforcement to improve the quality of life for the underserved communities of South Los Angeles that live adjacent to the Figueroa corridor, ensure results driven wraparound services to the victims of Human Trafficking through our Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) partnerships, and decrease violent crime in South Los Angeles by holding those truly accountable for the Human Trafficking problem.

Training: \$11,465.00

The LAPD is requesting funding to send ten personnel working the 77th Street Vice Unit to the North American Human Trafficking Conference in Las Vegas, Nevada. This conference will explore advanced Human Trafficking investigation and prosecution skills, which will aid in successful investigations and ultimately convictions of Human Traffickers. By engaging in collaborative training, the Unit will empower victims with proven investigative techniques. GSA rates were used for lodging, with tax, and meals. Other expenses include luggage and local transportation.

Vice Unit will be moving away from seeking prosecution of commercial sex workers, but their relationships to the targeted Human Traffickers will remain critical. Journey Out will be responsible for call-outs generated by Human Trafficking investigations initiated by the Unit and will assist in providing lifestyle alternatives, shelter, clothing, and counselling. The providers from Journey Out are subject matter experts in surviving Human Trafficking and will provide the victims access to their expertise in seeking a way out of the toxic of circumstances they have been manipulated into by the Human Traffickers.

Other: \$85,000.00

The LAPD is requesting approximately 850 hours of overtime to be allotted. Human Trafficking investigations are labor intensive and require a significant amount of personnel hours to successfully meet the prosecutorial requirements of state and federal District Attorneys filing conditions. The program manager (77th Street Vice unit Officer in Charge) will be charged with the overall management of the program, ensuring that the objectives of the grant re achieved, the project progress is meeting the benchmarks in the timeline, and that monitoring and evaluation of the effectiveness is completed. The vast majority of the overtime allotted will be used by Vice investigators in the field, conducting actual intelligence-based investigations that will result in a reduction of Part I crime along the Figueroa Corridor. These investigations will ultimately yield a more positive quality of life for the community surrounding the Corridor and increase the already positive relationship between the Department and its citizen partners.
