ENV-2019-6976-CE At the Feb. 26, 2020, meeting of the West Los Angeles Sawtelle N.C., the Board of Directors voted 9-0-0, to support the proposed designation as Historic and Cultural Monument designation for the old "Chili Bowl" round building, request that the developer integrate the building in place into new construction projects, and authorize the Chair to submit Community Impact Statements in the future (recusal: J.Handal). Facts and background: 1. The Cultural Heritage Commission voted to support designation as a HCM on Feb. 6. 2. This building is the best, intact example of this design of a circular restaurant, which was part of the "Chili Bowl" chain. Only 2 remain in L.A., and the other is partially demolished. 3. The original diamond-shaped sign is intact, along with the original porch and steps, and windows and door locations. Very few renovations were made 4. This location remained open late during WWII aircraft production at the Douglas Aircraft Factory (now Santa Monica Airport). 5. This is a "programmatic" design, in which both the exterior and interior have unique characteristics that warrant preservation. 6. Staff report:

Adaptive re-use of old buildings adds charm and character to communities, and are an alternate to the same, bland mixed-use cubes that dominate architecture of new projects in West L.A. these days. 2.
