PROPOSED The project consists of the use and operation of a private swim school at a private residence in the RE15-1-H Zone. The private swim school will continue to operate towards the rear of the property at the existing swimming pool.

The school will be operated by one teacher and will serve three students per class, for a maximum total of 18 students with a maximum six sessions per day. The private swim school will operate 8:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. during the summer months (June 1 to August 31) and 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. as an after-school program during the spring and fall months (February 1 to May 31 and September 1 to October 15). The school will not operate from October 16 to January 31.

- **REQUESTED** 1) Pursuant to CEQA Guidelines, Section 15301 and Section 15323, an Exemption from CEQA, and that there is no substantial evidence demonstrating that an exception to a categorical exemption pursuant to CEQA Guidelines, Section 15300.2 applies;
 - 2) Pursuant to Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC) Section 12.24-U,24, a Conditional Use to permit the operation of a private school in the RE15-1-H Zone.

RECOMMENDED ACTIONS:

- 1) **Determine** based on the whole of the administrative record, that the Project is exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines, Section 15301 and 15323 and there is no substantial evidence demonstrating that an exception to a categorical exemption pursuant to CEQA Guidelines, Section 15300.2 applies;
- 2) **Approve** a **Conditional Use** to permit the operation of a private school in the RE15-1-H Zone.
- 3) **Adopt** the attached Findings.

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PROJECT ANALYSIS

Project Summary

The project is for the use and operation of a private swim school at a private residence in the RE15-1-H Zone. The school had operated at the site without permits since 2011 and ceased operations in 2018 after an Order to Comply and court injunction were imposed. The proposed school would serve a maximum of three students per class, for a total of 18 students with up to six sessions per day. The swim school will operate from 8:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. during the summer months (June 1 to August 31) and 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. as an after-school program during the spring and fall months (February 1 to May 31 and September 1 to October 15). The school will not operate from October 16 to January 31.




Figure 1. Aerial View of Subject Site.

Project Details

The proposed project is the continued use and operation of a private swim school at a 3,015 square-foot single-family residence on a hillside 16,064 square-foot lot. In the front yard, the single-family residence includes an oversized driveway, creating double-tandem parking spots for a total of four parking spaces. The project site fronts Laurelvale Drive which is classified as a Hillside Local Street. Laurevale is presently dedicated to 32 feet directly in front of the property and is improved with a 21-foot roadway.




Figure 2. Site plan including rear back yard with swimming pool for class operation.

As proposed, the private swim school known as "Swim to Bill" will have a maximum daily capacity of 18 students. There are no classes on Saturday or Sunday. The school will only operate seasonally and with limited hours depending on the season. During the summer months (June 1 – August 31), Swim to Bill will only operate during the morning from 8:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m., while in the spring/fall (February 1 to May 31, September 1 to October 15), Swim to Bill switches to an after-school program with classes operating between 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday-Friday with no classes during the weekend. The school will be closed from October 16 – January 31.

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Each block of classes includes one total session with each student undergoing a course that consists of nine classes. There will be two to three students per session. Each class will be 30 minutes in length with a 15 minute buffer in-between classes. The 15 minute buffer is intended to allow for students from the prior class to leave and students from the next class to arrive, so that as much parking can occur on-site as possible.

The entrance to the swim classes is along the northern portion of the property through the house's side yard. The residences' swimming pool will serve as the classroom during the swimming classes. Each class is 30 minutes in length. There will be a 15 minute buffer between classes to encourage drop off/pick-up to occur within the on-site driveway. Below is an example of the school's proposed summer schedule.

Background

Project Site

The project site is an interior lot that consists of one parcel with approximately 16,064 square-foot of lot area. The site has a frontage of 65 feet along the northwest side of Laurelvale Drive. The site is currently developed with as a single-family residence with an Accessory Dwelling Unit and backyard swimming pool. The project site includes parking for four (4) vehicles in the driveway.

Zoning and General Plan Land Use Designation

The project site is located within the Sherman Oaks – Studio City – Toluca Lake – Cahuenga Pass with a land use designation of Very Low Residential and is zoned RE15-1-H.

Surrounding Properties

The project site is located within a predominantly hillside single-family residential area. The surrounding properties to the east, north, and south are zoned RE15-1-H and is developed with one- and two-story single-family houses. The properties to the west, abutting the rear of the subject site, are zoned RE15-1-H, are located upslope and are undeveloped.

Streets and Circulation

<u>Laurelvale Drive</u>, adjoining the subject property to the east, is a Hillside Local Street, dedicated to a width of 32 feet, and is improved with asphalt roadway, concrete curb, and gutter. The street does not have sidewalks.

Relevant Cases

<u>Order Number: A-4658072</u> - On March 21, 2018, the Department of Building and Safety issued an Order to Comply for: the operation of a home occupation outside of the main dwelling unit, occupation is creating a greater volume of vehicle traffic than normal, and more than one home occupation client per hour and not only between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m.

Surrounding Properties:

No similar or relevant cases in the surrounding area.

Requested Actions

Conditional Use

Pursuant to LAMC Section 12.24-U,24, the applicant is requesting a Conditional Use to permit the use and operation of a private swim school at a single-family residence in the RE15-1-H Zone.

Public Hearing

A public hearing on this matter with the Hearing Officer was held virtually via Zoom on Tuesday, October 25, 2022 (see Public Hearing and Communications, Page P-1).

lssues

Traffic and Parking

Members of the public raised concerns regarding traffic and parking impacts from the operating of the swim school. Concerns were raised regarding Laurelvale Drive being too narrow to support the increase in traffic and the lack of sidewalks being a dangerous condition for students getting to and from the school. They cited instances where sanitation trucks and emergency vehicles had difficulty navigating up the street due to the variable 21 to 24-foot substandard roadway width.

Staff has worked with the applicant to propose a revision to the originally proposed class schedule to address concerns regarding traffic impacts within the surrounding neighborhood. As stated previously, Swim to Bill will operate a maximum of six classes per day, Monday through Friday. Classes are 30 minutes in length and were originally proposed to run from 8:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. during the summer and from 2:00 p.m. to 4:30 p.m. during the fall/spring with no breaks between classes.

The schedule has now been revised to include a 15 minute buffer between classes to facilitate drop-off/pick-up of students. In addition to the new time buffer, conditions have also been recommended to inform parents of the requirement to park in the driveway to further

minimize traffic impacts on Laureldale Drive. The revised schedule will maintain the originally

proposed three hour blocks of instruction to provide the applicant with enough teaching slots to meet high demand.

It is also important to note that classes are capped at a maximum of three students and according to the applicant, some classes include siblings/cousins/friends who carpool which further minimizes the amount of vehicle traffic to the site.

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<u>Noise</u>

Abutting neighbors have also raised concerns regarding excessive noise levels when classes are in session.

On May 9, 2019, Environment Science Associates (ESA) conducted a Noise Study to measure, and monitor noise levels both before and during classes to determine the increase in noise level over ambient conditions. The noise study was conducted at 2126 East Live Oak Drive as Swim to Bill was not permitted to operate at the subject site during this time period. The location was determined to have similar characteristics (hillside, single-family) as the subject site. ESA also analyzed 50 hours of video footage from swim instruction recorded at the subject site and determined that the operation was representative of what was observed on May 9, 2019.

Based on the measured noise levels recorded, the swim class resulted in a noise increase of 2.5 dBA over measured ambient levels. According to ESA, a 3 dBA increase is barely perceptible to the human ear. The report acknowledges that "instantaneous peak noise levels during the swimming instruction class could be heard over ambient conditions." However, on average, the increase is negligible. The report also compares other common occurrences in residential neighborhoods such as landscaping activities, which generally would register approximately 76 dBA, which would be a much more noticeable difference to ambient noise levels than a typical swim class. The report also states that noise measurements were taken within the property boundary and that noise increases experienced by neighboring properties would be further attenuated by increased distance and by fences/walls that separate the properties.

Swim to Bill intends to maintain existing conditions at the site. There are no plans to expand the rear yard or build another pool or request additional time slots. The intent of the applicant is to ensure code compliance and continue operating as a private swim school.

Conclusion

Based on the information submitted, the surrounding uses, input from the public, and the proposed project's compliance with the Sherman Oaks – Studio City – Toluca Lake – Cahuenga Pass Community Plan, staff recommends the City Planning Commission approve the requested Conditional Use for the use and operation of a private swim school, within the RE15-1-H Zone. Swim to Bill will be located within a single-family residence, and will provide an alternative educational opportunity in a residential setting. To reduce the impact of the school on the surrounding community, conditions have been recommended to limit hours of operation, create a 15 minute window for drop off/ pick to reduce parking, and to coordinate drop-off/pick-up to minimize neighborhood parking impacts.

CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL

Pursuant to Section 12.24-U,24.C, of the Los Angeles Municipal Code, the following conditions are hereby imposed upon the use of the subject property:

Entitlement Conditions

- 1. **Use.** The use of the subject property shall be limited to a private swim school, with a maximum enrollment of 18 students per day.
- 2. **Site Plan**. The use and development of the subject property shall be in substantial conformance with the attached plans labeled as Exhibit A, stamped, signed and dated by Department of City Planning Staff, attached to the subject case file, and except as modified by this action.
- 3. **Occupancy.** The applicant/operator of the swim school must be the principal resident on the site.
- 4. **Parking.** A minimum of four parking spaces (two-car tandem) shall be provided. Participants shall be required to utilize on-site spaces in lieu of parking on the street.
- 5. **Lighting.** Outdoor lighting shall be designed and installed with shielding, such that the light source does not illuminate any adjacent properties, the public right-of-way, or the above night skies.
- 6. All graffiti on the site shall be removed or painted over to match the color of the surface to which it is applied within 24 hours of its occurrence.

School Administration Conditions

7. All school administrators shall be provided a copy of the subject determination.

8. **Operational Limitations.**

- a. Instruction shall be limited to the following hours: 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. No instruction shall be permitted on Saturday and Sunday.
- b. There shall be a limit of a maximum of six classes per day. Classes shall be limited to a maximum of three students per class.
- c. Sessions/Class Schedule shall be permitted as follows:

- 9. **Traffic Management Program.** Student drop-off/pick-up activities shall be located on-site located on the double tandem driveway, subject to the following conditions:
 - a. As a condition of enrollment, the school shall inform parents, students, faculty and staff in writing of all rules regulating school drop-off/pick-up and parking.
- 10. **Trash.** The applicant shall be responsible for maintaining free of litter the area adjacent to the premises over which they have control, including any sidewalks bordering the site.

11. School Noise.

- a. **Public Address System.** No outdoor public address system shall be installed or maintained on the subject property. No paging system shall be installed which is audible outside the building in which it is located.
- b. No amplified music or loud non-amplified music is permitted outside.
- c. **Signs.** Signs shall be posted in the rear yard and along the northerly walkway advising parents and children to be mindful of adjacent neighbors and to keep noise to a minimum.
- d. Compressors and other equipment which may introduce noise impacts beyond any property line shall be enclosed or otherwise attenuated so as to be inaudible off-site.

12. **Review and Compliance.**

- a. A complaint log shall be kept by the school and include the complainant's name, date and time of complaint, phone number, email address, the nature of the complaint, the date and time of the response of the complaint, and a description of how the issue was responded to or resolved. Record of all complaints must be maintained on the premise. Information on how the public can report concerns or complaints shall be posted online on the school's website, and prominently at the school visible from the public right of way, 10 days prior to the beginning of each school year for public reference.
- b. If at any time during the period of the grant, should documented evidence be submitted showing continued violation(s) of any condition of the grant, resulting in a disruption or interference with the peaceful enjoyment of the adjoining and neighboring properties, the Director of Planning will have the right to require the applicant or school administration to file for a plan approval.

Administrative Conditions

- 13. **Approvals, Verification and Submittals**. Copies of any approvals, guarantees or verification of consultations, reviews or approval, plans, etc, as may be required by the subject conditions, shall be provided to the Department of City Planning for placement in the subject file.
- 14. **Code Compliance.** All area, height and use regulations of the zone classification of the subject property shall be complied with, except wherein these conditions explicitly allow otherwise.
- 15. **Covenant.** Prior to the issuance of any permits relative to this matter, an agreement concerning all the information contained in these conditions shall be recorded in the County Recorder's Office. The agreement shall run with the land and shall be binding on any subsequent property owners, heirs or assign. The agreement must be submitted to the Department of City Planning for approval before being recorded. After recordation, a copy bearing the Recorder's number and date shall be provided to the Department of City Planning for attachment to the file.
- 16. **Definition.** Any agencies, public officials or legislation referenced in these conditions shall mean those agencies, public offices, legislation or their successors, designees or amendment to any legislation.
- 17. **Enforcement.** Compliance with these conditions and the intent of these conditions shall be to the satisfaction of the Department of City Planning and any designated agency, or the agency's successor and in accordance with any stated laws or regulations, or any amendments thereto.
- 18. **Building Plans.** A copy of the first page of this grant and all Conditions and/or any subsequent appeal of this grant and its resultant Conditions and/or letters of clarification shall be printed on the building plans submitted to the Development Services Center and the Department of Building and Safety for purposes of having a building permit issued.
- 19. **Corrective Conditions.** The authorized use shall be conducted at all times with due regard for the character of the surrounding district, and the right is reserved to the City Planning Commission, or the Director pursuant to Section 12.27.1 of the Municipal Code, to impose

additional corrective conditions, if, in the Commission's or Director's opinion, such conditions are proven necessary for the protection of persons in the neighborhood or occupants of adjacent property.

20. INDEMNIFICATION AND REIMBURSEMENT OF LITIGATION COSTS.

Applicant shall do all of the following:

- a. Defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City from any and all actions against the City relating to or arising out of, in whole or in part, the City's processing and approval of this entitlement, including <u>but not limited to</u>, an action to attack, challenge, set aside, void, or otherwise modify or annul the approval of the entitlement, the environmental review of the entitlement, or the approval of subsequent permit decisions, or to claim personal property damage, including from inverse condemnation or any other constitutional claim.
- b. Reimburse the City for any and all costs incurred in defense of an action related to or arising out of, in whole or in part, the City's processing and approval of the entitlement, including but not limited to payment of all court costs and attorney's fees, costs of any judgments or awards against the City (including an award of attorney's fees), damages, and/or settlement costs.
- c. Submit an initial deposit for the City's litigation costs to the City within 10 days' notice of the City tendering defense to the Applicant and requesting a deposit. The initial deposit shall be in an amount set by the City Attorney's Office, in its sole discretion, based on the nature and scope of action, but in no event shall the initial deposit be less than \$50,000. The City's failure to notice or collect the deposit does not relieve the Applicant from responsibility to reimburse the City pursuant to the requirement in paragraph (ii).
- d. Submit supplemental deposits upon notice by the City. Supplemental deposits may be required in an increased amount from the initial deposit if found necessary by the City to protect the City's interests. The City's failure to notice or collect the deposit does not relieve the Applicant from responsibility to reimburse the City pursuant to the requirement in paragraph (ii).
- e. If the City determines it necessary to protect the City's interest, execute an indemnity and reimbursement agreement with the City under terms consistent with the requirements of this condition.

The City shall notify the applicant within a reasonable period of time of its receipt of any action and the City shall cooperate in the defense. If the City fails to notify the applicant of any claim, action, or proceeding in a reasonable time, or if the City fails to reasonably cooperate in the defense, the applicant shall not thereafter be responsible to defend, indemnify or hold harmless the City.

The City shall have the sole right to choose its counsel, including the City Attorney's office or outside counsel. At its sole discretion, the City may participate at its own expense in the defense of any action, but such participation shall not relieve the applicant of any obligation imposed by this condition. In the event the Applicant fails to comply with this condition, in whole or in part, the City may withdraw its defense of the action, void its approval of the entitlement, or take any other action. The City retains the right to make all decisions with

respect to its representations in any legal proceeding, including its inherent right to abandon or settle litigation.

For purposes of this condition, the following definitions apply:

"City" shall be defined to include the City, its agents, officers, boards, commissions, committees, employees, and volunteers.

"Action" shall be defined to include suits, proceedings (including those held under alternative dispute resolution procedures), claims, or lawsuits. Actions include actions, as defined herein, alleging failure to comply with <u>any</u> federal, state or local law.

Nothing in the definitions included in this paragraph are intended to limit the rights of the City or the obligations of the Applicant otherwise created by this condition.

FINDINGS

1. Conditional Use Findings.

a. That the project will enhance the built environment in the surrounding neighborhood or will perform a function or provide a service that is essential or beneficial to the community, city or region.

The proposed project is the use and operation of a private swim school at an existing single-family residence in the RE15-1-H Zone. The swim school has operated without permits at the site since 2011. The school received an Order to Comply on March 21, 2018 and subsequently filed for the instant application to formalize the use.

The conditional use authorization will allow the school to continue to perform a function and provide a service that is beneficial to the community, city, and region. The private school will provide an alternative education experience for students to learn the ability to swim in a small group setting. Swim lessons reduce the risk of drowning and improve water safety skills and are generally considered an essential skill for all people. Increasing swim lesson options will benefit the City and its residents. At the public hearing, many speakers spoke in support of the school and its instructor's positive contributions to the community through swimming education. Many parents spoke regarding their special needs students who rely on the quiet and calm residential nature of the class setting as opposed to the at times chaotic nature of public swimming pools, where swim lessons are often held.

This grant has incorporated numerous conditions designed to minimize impacts on the surrounding neighborhood. Class times are required to be staggered so that school traffic for drop-off and pick-up are not compounded. Class sizes have been limited to no more than three students per session to further minimize noise/traffic. Hours of operation are to be limited by season with summer classes operating from 8:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. and spring/fall classes operating from 12:45 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Instruction is to only occur Monday-Friday with no classes taking place on Saturday and Sunday. The project has also been required to provide four on-site parking spaces and parents/caretakers are required to park in the driveway to further minimize disruptions on Laurelvale Drive. These conditions, along with other operational limitations will ensure that the project can continue to provide its beneficial service to the community while limiting negative impacts on the surrounding neighborhood.

b. That the project's location, size, height, operations and other significant features will be compatible with and will not adversely affect or further degrade adjacent properties, the surrounding neighborhood or the public health, welfare, and safety.

The project's location, size, height, operation, and other significant features will be compatible with the surrounding neighborhood and will not adversely affect or degrade adjacent properties. The project site consists of one parcel approximately 16,064 square feet of lot area. The site has approximately 65 feet of frontage along north Laurelvale Drive. The site is developed as a single-family residence with a backyard swimming pool. The site also includes four parking spaces along a driveway accessible from Laurelvale Drive.

The project site is located within the Sherman Oaks – Studio City – Toluca Lake - Cahuenga Pass Community Plan with a land use designation of Very Low Residential

and is zoned RE15-1-H. The proposed project will not alter the physical development of the site. No new construction or enlargement of the residence or swimming pool are proposed. As such, the physical development of the site will continue to be compatible with the surrounding neighborhood.

The project site is located within a predominately single-family residential area. The northern adjoining property is zoned RE15-1-H and is undeveloped along a hillside. The surrounding properties to the south, west and east are zoned RE15-1-H and developed as single-family dwellings.

With regards to operation, the RE15 Zone permits the use of a private school through Conditional Use authorization pursuant to LAMC Section 12.24-U,24(c). As stated previously, the applicant is not proposing any alterations to the existing structure and pool. The subject site will retain the character of a one-family dwelling. The grant has included operational conditions that are intended to minimize impacts on the surrounding neighborhood. The use and operation of the private swim school will be subject to conditions regulating operating hours, parking and student enrollment caps to minimize impacts to the surrounding neighborhood. With regards to operating hours and parking, the school has been conditioned to provide a 15-minute buffer between the start of each class to facilitate on-site drop-off/pick-up of students. With regards to noise, no public address systems are permitted, signage reminding parents/students to keep noise levels to a minimum has been required, and hours of operation are to be limited by season with summer classes operating from 8:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. and spring/fall classes operating from 12:45 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. The grant also includes the requirement to include a complaint log and is subject to the requirement to file for a Plan Approval if documented evidence showing continued violations of any condition of the grant is observed. Thus, as conditioned, the project's location, size and height, operations, and other significant features will be compatible with and will not adversely affect the further degrade adjacent properties, the surrounding neighborhood or the public health, welfare, and safety.

c. That the project substantially conforms with the purpose, intent and provisions of the General Plan, the applicable community plan, and any applicable specific plan.

The project site is located within the Sherman Oaks – Studio City – Toluca Lake – Cahuenga Pass Community Plan, which is one of the 35 Community Plans that the Land Use Element of the General Plan is comprised of. The Community Plan designates the project site with a Very Low Residential land use designation with RE20, RA, RE15 and RE11 zones listed as corresponding zones. The project site is zoned RE15-1-H and is thus consistent with the following Community Plan goals and Policy:

<u>Goal 6</u>: Appropriate locations and adequate facilities for schools to serve the need of existing and future population.

<u>Policy 6-1.3</u>: Site schools in a manner which complements the existing single family and multiple family residential neighborhoods.

The Los Angeles Municipal Code permits the use of a private school within the RE Zone with the approval of a Conditional Use Permit. The approval of the Conditional Use Permit will not change the land use designation or zone of the project site and will not restrict or prohibit the use of the site for residential uses if the private school is no longer in operation. The project site is located within the established hillside residential neighborhood and is improved with a single-family dwelling with ADU and backyard

swimming pool. The backyard saltwater swimming pool will serve as an adequate facility for small group swim lessons in a non-institutional setting.

The private swim school will provide an alternative education experience for students to learn the ability to swim in a small group setting. Swim lessons reduce the risk of drowning and improve water safety skills and are generally considered an essential skill for all people. Increasing swim lesson options will better serve the needs of the existing and future population.

With the imposition of conditions, the school will be compatible with the existing land uses and community character. Conditions include requirements for drop-off/pick-up onsite and the stagging of school hours to reduce conflicts with the adjoining and surrounding properties. The existing single-family residence will not change in size or add any additional structures and will only continue to operate as a private swim school at a single-family residence.

Environmental Findings

- Determine based on the whole of the administrative record, that the Project is exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines, Section 15301, Article 19 (Class 1), Section 15323, Article 19 (Class 23) and there is no substantial evidence demonstrating that an exception to a categorical exemption pursuant to CEQA Guidelines, Section 15300.2 applies;
- **3.** Flood Insurance. The National Flood Insurance Program rate maps, which are a part of the Flood Hazard Management Specific Plan adopted by the City Council by Ordinance No. 172,081, have been reviewed and it has been determined that this project is located in Zone C, areas of minimal flooding.

PUBLIC HEARING AND COMMUNICATIONS

A public hearing was conducted on October 25, 2022 at 9:30 a.m., virtually via Zoom.

1. Attendees

The hearing was attended by the applicant, the applicant's representatives, and members of the local community.

2. Summary of Public Testimony

A public hearing for CPC-2018-2223-CU was conducted electronically via Zoom (due to concerns over COVID-19) on Tuesday, October 25, 2022 at 9:30 a.m. Planning staff conducted the hearing and summarized the range of comments in response to the Conditional Use entitlement request for the continued use and operation of a private swim school at a private residence.

The Representative, Stacey Brenner, stated that William (Bill) Marsh lives in the community. Mr. Marsh would like to continue his operation of a private swim school in his neighborhood, including being a beneficial service to his surrounding neighbors and community. At this time, Bill Marsh has been conducting classes off-site at client pools. This has not been ideal because he is unable to regulate variables that directly impact the effectiveness of his instruction such as water temperature and water composition. Bill Marsh has let parents know that they should park on-site as much as possible and parents are reminded to not block driveways if they do park on-street.

Below is a summary of the key points from public testimony during the public hearing:

- Many in support of the project described how beneficial the swim lessons have been in their own personal lives.
- There are no other surrounding high-quality services similar to Mr. William Marsh's program.
- Surrounding neighbors are in support of the project but would like to have a better use of parking.
- Noise and traffic congestion are becoming a concern with the very narrow substandard street.
- Concerned with the project's location and would like to see his business in a different location.
- Concerns with emergency and sanitary vehicle access along Laurelvale Drive.
- 3. Summary of Emails/Letters Received

CD 4 Letter. A letter was submitted on October 25th by Council District 4 to address multiple received documented concerns, from immediate neighbors, about the awareness of code enforcement complaints by the Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety (LADBS) on the proposed project. Council District 4 asked to be mindful of the aforementioned issues raised by neighbors about persistent quality of life grievances and respectfully asked that the Department of City Planning consider the collective feedback in making its recommendation to the Planning Commission.

4. Summary of Email's Received.

Staff received correspondence both for and against the project. Emails have been summarized below:

Opposed

- Laurelvale Drive is a narrow and winding neighborhood street and is almost impossible to pass with cars parked on the street.
- A residential neighborhood is not a proper venue for a commercial enterprise.
- Concerns regarding property values decreasing
- School attracts many people from outside the neighborhood, which leads to security and safety concerns
- Noise and confusion are a burden for neighbors

Support


- Bill has been a good neighbor
- Lessons have been conducted for several years with no known issues
- Have not noticed swim lessons causing parking/traffic problems
- Bill has provided an invaluable service with his swim lessons
- Teaches many kids from throughout the region
- Had a positive impact on many kids lives
- Swim lessons are more like yoga classes; rarely heard any splashing or noise and parents would come and go quietly.

Applicant Response from Hearing

- Wouldn't be applying if he didn't have the support of a majority of the neighbors up and down the street
- Some neighbors who oppose this application have asked that Bill teach their children how to swim.
- In 23 years of living here, there has never been a time when someone couldn't park. Concerns are mostly about not being able to park directly in front of their homes.
- Bill states that he will not teach 8 or 9 hours per day. He will only teach for 2-3 hours per day.
- Demand for classes is very high
- The ability to control the chemistry and water temperature in his pool is the most critical reason that he prefers to use his own pool.



The project consists of the continued use and operation of a private swim school at a private residence in the RE15-1-H Zone. The private swim school will continue to operate towards the rear of the property at the existing swimming pool.

The school will be operated by 1 teacher and will serve three students per class, for a maximum total of 18 students with a maximum six sessions per day. The swim school will operate 8:00 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. during the summer months (June 1 to August 31) and 2:00 p.m. to 6:15 p.m. as an after-school program during the spring and fall months (February 1 to May 31 and September 1 to October 15). The school will not operate from October 16 to January 31.

JUSTIFICATIONS FOR PROJECT EXEMPTION

Class 1 consists of the operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of use beyond that existing at the time of the lead agency's determination. The types of "existing facilities" itemized below are not intended to be all-inclusive of the types of projects which might fall within Class 1. The key consideration is whether the project involves negligible or no expansion of an existing use.

Class 23 consists of the normal operations of existing facilities for public gatherings for which the facilities were designed, where there is a past history of the facility being used for the same or

similar kind of purpose. For the purposes of this section, "past history" shall mean that the same or similar kind of activity has been occurring for at least three years and that there is a reasonable expectation that the future occurrence of the activity would not represent a change in the operation of the facility. Facilities included within this exemption include, but are not limited to, racetracks, stadiums, convention centers, auditoriums, amphitheaters, planetariums, swimming pools, and amusement parks.

The continued use of an existing swim school at a private residence qualifies for a Class 1 and Class 23 Categorical Exemption. The use is an existing facility, and its operation occurs within the site's swimming pool. The school was formerly cited for operating without permits.

EXCEPTIONS TO CATEGORICAL EXEMPTIONS

Planning staff evaluated the exceptions to the use of Categorical Exemptions for the proposed ordinance listed in "CEQA Guidelines" Section 15300.2 and determined that none of the exceptions apply to the proposed project.

(a) Location. Classes 3, 4, 5, 6, and 11 are qualified by consideration of where the project is to be located – a project that is ordinarily insignificant in its impact on the environment may in a particularly sensitive environment be significant. Therefore, these classes are considered to apply all instances, except where the project may impact on an environmental resource of hazardous or critical concern where designated, precisely mapped, and officially adopted pursuant to law by federal, state, or local agencies.

The Project site in an urbanized area in the City of Los Angeles. The project site is not located in a particularly sensitive environment and is not located on a site containing wetlands, endangered species, or wildlife habitats; therefore, this exception is not applicable. The project involves no physical construction/expansion of existing structures or swimming pools. The project is the continued operation of a private swim school within the RE15-1-H Zone.

(b) Cumulative Impact. All exemptions for these classes are inapplicable when the cumulative impact of successive projects of the same type in the same place, over time is significant.

This exception does not apply to the proposed project. The project involves the continued use of the site as a private swim school. There are no other projects of the same type in the same place. As such, no cumulative impacts are anticipated from the project. Any successive projects of the same type and nature would reflect a development that is consistent with the underlying land use designation and the LAMC, and thus would be subject to the same regulations and requirements, including development standards and environmental impacts. The impacts of each subsequent project will be mitigated if necessary, and thus will not result in a cumulative impact. Therefore, impacts under this category will be less than significant.

(c) Significant Effect. A categorical exemption shall not be used for an activity where there is a reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances.

This exception does not apply to the proposed project. The project site is comprised of approximately 16,064 square feet of lot area located in an urbanized hillside area within the City of Los Angeles. The project consists of the continued use of the single-family residence and its swimming pool to conduct private swim lessons. Classes are limited to a maximum of three students per class and 18 students per day spread out in over a period of approximately 6 hours. Classes will also be limited by seasonality with no classes during the winter. The site does not demonstrate any unusual circumstances, and the project will not generate significant impacts regarding traffic, air quality, water quality, or noise. On May 9, 2019, Environment Science Associates (ESA) conducted a Noise Study to measure, and monitor noise levels both before and during classes to determine the increase in noise level over ambient conditions. Based on the measured noise levels recorded, the swim class resulted in a noise increase of 2.5 dBA over measured ambient levels. According to ESA, a 3 dBA increase is barely perceptible to the human ear. The report acknowledges that "instantaneous peak noise levels during the swimming instruction class could be heard over ambient conditions." However, on average, the increase is negligible. The report also compares other common occurrences in residential neighborhoods such as landscaping activities, which generally would register approximately 76 dBA, which would be a much more noticeable difference to ambient noise levels than a typical swim class. The report also states that noise measurements were taken within the property boundary and that noise increases experienced by neighboring properties would be further attenuated by increased distance and by fences/walls that separate the properties. As such, there are no unusual circumstances that indicate this project would reasonably result in a significant effect on the environment.

(d) Scenic Highways. A categorical exemption shall not be used for a project which may result in damage to scenic resources, including but not limited to, trees, historic buildings, rock outcroppings, or similar resources, within a highway officially designated as a state scenic highway. This does not apply to improvements which are required as mitigation by an adopted negative declaration or certified EIR.

This exception does not apply to the proposed project. According to the California Scenic Highway Mapping System, the project site is not located on or near a portion of a highway that is either eligible or officially designated as a state scenic highway.

(e) Hazardous Waste Sites. A categorical exemption shall not be used for a project located on a site which is included on any list compiled pursuant to Section 65962.5 of the Government Code.

This exception does not apply to the proposed project. The project site is not listed as a hazardous waste site on EnviroStor, California's data management system for tracking hazardous waste sites. There are also no listed sites within the immediate vicinity of the project site. The subject property is currently developed with residential properties; hazardous waste and materials would not be expected to pose a significant constraint on sites long developed with such uses.

Additionally, the project site is not located withing a Hazardous Waste/Border Zone or Methane Hazard Site as designated by the City of Los Angeles. The surrounding neighborhood is primarily established with residential uses, and hazardous waste and materials would not be expected on or immediately adjacent to the project site. No industrial wastewater is generated on the project site and sanitary wastewater is discharged to the City Bureau of Sanitation. Therefore, this exception for a Categorical Exemption does not apply to this project.

(f) Historical Resources. A categorical exemption shall not be used for a project which may cause a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historical resource.

In addition to State and Federal databases of historic resources, SurveyLA has conducted a comprehensive survey of historic resources in the area of the project. No structures on the subject property or immediately adjacent to the project site have been identified as a historic resource. The subject property is not listed on any database of historic resources. Additionally, the project site is not located in a designated Historic Preservation Overlay Zone or identified or potential historic district. In addition, no demolition or construction is proposed. For these reasons, operation of the proposed project would not constitute a substantial adverse change in the significance of a historic resource as defined by CEQA, and this exception does not apply to the proposed project.

subject	Noise Measurements for a Swimming Instruction Class to Support a Conditional Use Permit in the City of Los Angeles

As requested by William Marsh ("Client"), ESA has prepared this Technical Memorandum in support of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for a Swimming Instruction Class located at a private residence in the City of Los Angeles, California. The purpose of this Technical Memorandum is to summarize the monitored noise levels that were recorded before and during a swimming instruction class on May 9, 2019.

Recorded Noise Monitoring Levels

ESA conducted a site visit on May 9, 2019 to record the noise levels before and during a swimming instruction class held at 2126 East Live Oak Drive in the City of Los Angeles. Noise levels were recorded before the class to measure the ambient noise levels and during the class to determine the increase in noise levels over ambient conditions.

ESA conducted one noise measurement at a single location during the site visit. ESA used an American National Standards Institute (ANSI) S1.4 compliant Larson Davis LXT1 Sound Level Meter (SLM). The sound meter was calibrated and operated according to the applicable manufacturer's specification. The microphone was placed at the southern corner of the property, at a height of approximately 5 feet above the local grade. The microphone was located approximately 5 feet from the edge of the pool and approximately 20 feet from center of the pool where the majority of the swimming instruction class activities took place. ESA staff observed the Client instructing three students during one session and observed two sessions over the course of one hour for a total of six students. Some minor overlap occurred as new students arrived and earlier students left the pool area. Photographs 1 and 2, below, show the location of the noise meter and the general pool area.

The noise measurement was taken from 2:15 pm to 3:15 pm. The first 15 minutes of the measurement period captured the existing ambient noise levels before the class began at 2:30 pm. Table 1, below, shows the calculated 15-minute average noise level (L_{eq}) for the ambient conditions and the 45-minute L_{eq} during the duration of the class. Figure 1, below, visualizes the noise levels over the duration of the measurement period.

Noise Outliers

ESA staff identified noise outliers that skewed the ambient and swimming instruction class noise levels. Noise outliers are considered to be single-event noise sources, such as noise from aircraft flyovers, motorcycles, emergency vehicle sirens, or other single-event noise sources that sometimes occur in a City environment that are unrelated to the purpose of the noise recordings but would nonetheless cause noise levels to be temporarily elevated. Based on ESA staff observations taken at the site, noise outliers were identified at 2:19 pm, 2:29 to 2:30 pm, and 2:51 pm. The minute data from these noise outliers were excluded from the averages for both the ambient and swimming instruction class noise levels.

Noise Level Results

As shown in Table 1, the average ambient noise levels during the 15-minute monitoring period were 57.8 dBA L_{eq} and average noise levels during the swim class were 60.3 dBA L_{eq} . This represents a noise increase of 2.5 dBA over measured ambient levels. Generally speaking, a 1 dBA fluctuation cannot be perceived and a 3 dBA fluctuation in sound levels is barely perceivable by the human ear.¹ Since noise levels constantly fluctuate over time, it is likely that instantaneous peak noise levels during the swimming instruction class could be heard over ambient conditions. However, on an equivalent or average noise basis, based on the measured noise levels recorded, the average swimming instruction class noise level shows an increase of less than the barely perceivable level of 3 dBA compared to the average ambient noise level.

For comparison, typical landscaping equipment such as a leaf blower and walk-behind lawn mower register sound levels at their source of 102.5 dBA and 97.0 dBA, respectively.² Accounting for noise attenuation equal to the distance of the sound level meter from the swim class activity (approximately 20 feet), the noise levels of the leaf blower and walk-behind lawn mower would be 76.5 dBA and 71 dBA. Therefore, typical landscaping activities would cause a much more noticeable difference in ambient noise levels than the noise levels measured during the swim class.

The noise measurement was taken within the property boundary, but any noise increases experienced by neighboring properties could be less when considering attenuation from a fence or wall separating the properties. A typical solid fence would act as a simple sound barrier that could reduce noise levels by 5 dBA or more assuming the barrier blocks the line-of-sight to the noise receiver.³ A fence that does not completely block the line-of-sight to the noise receiver, such as a fence with gaps or a fence that is not sufficiently tall enough to completely block the line-of-sight, would reduce noise levels by less than 5 dBA or would not reduce the noise levels if there is no line-of-sight blockage. For comparison,

Swim Class Footage Review

In addition to ESA's recorded noise levels and observations during the May 9, 2019 swimming instruction class, ESA staff also reviewed approximately 50 hours of previously recorded swimming instruction class video footage that took place in Studio City at 3477 Laurelvale Drive. The purpose of this video footage review was to confirm that the observed swimming class activities on May 9, 2019 were representative of the typical activity levels of the Client's classes. Based on ESA staff review of the approximately 50 hours of video footage of classes that

took place between April 17 and June 27, 2018, ESA has determined that the number of students and the level of activity observed on May 9, 2019 was typical and representative of the number of students and the level of activity shown on the swimming class video footage, which consisted of approximately three children at a time during business hours. Furthermore, the observed swimming class activities from the video footage took place within a similar location as ESA's noise monitoring conducted on May 9, 2019. Both locations were on a single-family residential property, surrounded by other single family residential neighbors, and located within a residential hillside community. Therefore, the recorded noise levels on May 9, 2019 are representative of the noise levels that occur during the Client's swimming instruction classes.






Photo 1: Meter Location



Dear Mr. Kitchens,

I am reaching out on behalf of Council District 4 regarding the Conditional Use Permit entitlement request for the operation of a boutique swimming school out of a private single-family residence at 3477 North Laurelvale Drive in Studio City in the RE15-1 zone.

The Council Office has received documented concerns from immediate neighbors about this residence and the Swim to Bill swimming school (School) associated with it. The School has been in operation since 2010 without the proper permits or approvals. To date, there have been at least five document code enforcement complaints as shown on the Los Angeles Department of Building and Safety (LADBS) online portal. Our constituents have shared complaints regarding: excessive and amplified noise from the School in an otherwise quiet residential neighborhood, lack of available parking along an exceedingly narrow street in a very high fire severity hillside area that terminates in a cul-de-sac on one end, a commercial business functioning (and later cited by the city) for years without proper permits, a lack of privacy for abutting neighbors, and a lack of compatibility with residential uses in the area.

According to Swim to Bill, classes are fully booked for the current year; all while the School had previous orders to comply issued by LADBS and has not yet received any use approval from Los Angeles City Planning, which is somewhat worrisome. We are mindful of the aforementioned issues raised by neighbors about persistent quality of life grievances and respectfully ask that you consider this collective feedback in your deliberative process.

Dear Mr. Kitchens:

I write this letter on behalf of neighbors in opposition to the application of William Marsh ("Applicant") for a Conditional Use Permit seeking to operate a commercial swim school from his backyard pool in his quiet residential neighborhood. The Applicant has unlawfully operated this school from his backyard for a number of years and only sought the CUP after neighbors repeatedly complained to the City about the noise, traffic hazards and potential fire and safety problems his commercial enterprise caused. Despite numerous violations, Orders to Comply and the imposition of fees, the Applicant simply decided to continue violating the law by running his business from his backyard. It was not until the Los Angeles Superior Court imposed an injunction in response to a lawsuit by neighbors, that the Applicant finally moved his business elsewhere. I urge you to deny his application: Applicant has been illegally operating for years, the use of a backyard pool for a commercial swim school is not permitted as a Home Occupation, and it is a nuisance to the neighborhood. CUP findings cannot be made.

I. **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

II. FACTUAL BACKGROUND

My clients Jed and Marisa Kubrin reside at 3501 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, California. They are co-Trustees of the Kubrin Living Trust, which holds title to the Kubrin Home. William Marsh ("Marsh") and his wife, Elisa, live next door at 3477 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, California (the "Marsh Property"). Marsh used to operate an unpermitted and unlawful outdoor swim school in the backyard of his home called "Swim to Bill." *See* Exhibit A, attached hereto, showing printouts from the Swim to Bill website.

In a typical year, before we obtained a Preliminary Injunction from the Los Angeles Superior Court, from February through October, Marsh operated his swim school from his backyard pool at the Marsh Property. (I understand that he has continued to run his school at a different pool; his website shows that his classes for 2022 were fully booked.) On most days, classes run from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm, with a short mid-day break. Each class is half an hour long and has up to three students. Thus, there are typically 6 children and their parents at the pool – the three in the class and the three who are preparing to begin the next class. The students are young children first being introduced to swimming in the pool next to plaintiffs' home. Typically, the students scream and cry through much of the introductory sessions and eventually begin shrieking with joy as their confidence grows and they play in the pool. Indeed, Marsh's website specifically notes that about 7 out of 10 students cry at first; he lets them cry because it is natural and eventually the cries turn to "shouts of joy."

Students and their parents enter the Marsh Property from a walkway and gate on the side of the Marsh Property that is adjacent to my clients' home. The only screening dividing the two properties is some small, sparse ficus trees.

Noise and traffic from the swim school are excessive and have prompted numerous complaints to the City of Los Angeles Department of Building Services ("LADBS") for violating Los Angeles Municipal Code §12.06, subdivision 16, which governs "home occupations." In 2016 and 2017, LADBS issued warnings and citations to Marsh on the following issues:

- The swim school is causing greater volume of vehicle traffic than is normal
- More than one client per hour and not only between the hours of 8:00 am to 8:00 pm
- Swim school activities are visible outside of the dwelling
- Conducting a home business outside of the main dwelling unit
- The home business does not meet all of the conditions and standards for running such a business

On April 17, 2017, my clients filed a complaint with LADBS on these same issues. LADBS Investigator Ruben Reyes investigated their complaint, found it had merit, and ordered Marsh to



comply. Marsh complied by moving his swim school to a different location, not at the Marsh Property, for the remainder of his 2017 season. In February 2018, however, Marsh once again began operating Swim to Bill from his home at the Marsh Property in defiance of the earlier orders. On February 27, 2018, the Kubrins again complained to LADBS. On April 18, 2018, Marsh applied for the Conditional Use Permit that is the subject of this hearing. Citing limited resources, LADBS chose to halt its investigation pending completion of Marsh's application for a Conditional Use Permit, which my clients and others obviously oppose. Marsh's position was that because he had *applied* for the CUP, he was permitted to run his unlawful business.

Because of the noise from the swim school, the Kubrins were unable to enjoy their own home. The noise forced them to remain indoors with windows and doors closed. Even inside their own home, they frequently had to play loud music to drown out the noise coming from the Marsh swim school. Their family – including their young son -- were unable to nap or rest while swim school was in session because of the noise. The noise is different from the typical neighborhood sounds of children playing, because it is nearly constant in the summer, beginning at 8:00 am, and is exacerbated by the number of children in and around the pool at any given time. We have audio recordings of the noise that we would be happy to share with you.

Marsh's unlawful swim school also created an invasion of my clients' privacy while in their own home: the walk-way to the backyard pool at the Marsh Property is directly adjacent to the Kubrins' home, and because it is not well-shielded, provides the constant stream of traffic a view into their house and yard. My clients complained about this lack of privacy to Marsh, who offered to place a wooden fence on his property line to provide additional privacy to them. He has not done so. In addition, when parents stay during lessons to observe the classes, they frequently walk up to the hillside at the back of the Marsh Property and talk to each other or on the phone, which, again, provides a clear view into the Kubrin home and yard and increases the noise and disruption of privacy.

Marsh's unlawful swim school also created traffic and parking problems on the "substandard" street. Because the street is very narrow, there is not enough room for cars to park on opposite sides of the street at the same time directly across from each other, and still permit residents ingress and egress to and from their driveways. Yet cars from the swim school frequently park directly across from each other, so that my clients and other residents have been unable to get by. These parked cars also create hazards for fire and other emergency vehicles that cannot access the street. Residents are frequently forced to sit in their cars and wait for swim school patrons to load children into and out of cars, change diapers, and the like.

The noise and traffic from Marsh's swim school created an intolerable situation for the Kubrins, to the point they were finally forced to retain my firm to file an action in Superior Court because LADBS would not enforce its own regulations and because Marsh simply ignored them. *See* Complaint, attached hereto as Exhibit B. On behalf of my clients, I obtained an injunction to prohibit Marsh from running his school pending resolution of the claims of nuisance and unfair business practices in violation of §17200 of the Business & Professions Code. *See* Order of the Los Angeles Superior Court, attached hereto as Exhibit C. The parties eventually



agreed to keep the injunction in place but to dismiss the lawsuit so that the issue could be resolved by this CUP proceeding instead.

III. <u>ARGUMENT</u>

The CUP application should be denied because the proposed swim school – which has been operating for years without permission – is not compatible with home occupation requirements, is not exempt from CEQA and could not comply with parking or fire safety regulations. It is opposed by neighbors and is significantly distinguishable from another residential commercial swim school on which the Applicant relies. Applicant asserts this is a simple administrative matter, that he should get the permit to allow him to do what he has been doing all along, but he has been running an unlawful home occupation with serious safety implications and has repeatedly flouted the law.

A. The proposed use – an outdoor commercial swim school in the backyard in a residential neighborhood – is de facto incompatible with home occupation regulations and cannot be conditioned to ensure compatibility.

First, the swim school cannot be made compatible with the home occupation statute, no matter what conditions are placed on it. The Los Angeles Municipal Code sets the following requirements for a home occupation, in relevant part:

- Activities may not be visible from outside of the dwelling unit;
- "The use shall be conducted within the main dwelling unit, except for truck gardening, and only by persons residing within the dwelling unit;"
- Visitors' parked cars cannot displace the use of required parking spaces;
- "The home occupation shall not generate greater vehicular or pedestrian traffic that is normal for the district in which the home occupation is located;"
- The use cannot cause a "public nuisance or disruption to the residential character of the neighborhood;"
- "No more than one client visit or one client vehicle per hour shall be permitted."

Los Angeles Municipal Code §12.05A(16).

As evidenced by the CUP application itself, there is no way for the proposed use to comply with these. Because the pool is in the backyard, obviously the use is conducted outside of the main dwelling and there is no way to change that. Because there are three students per half hour lesson, there are at least six clients and client vehicles every hour. Those six cars per hour are significantly greater than the normal vehicular traffic for this quiet residential cul-de-sac street. The Applicant proposed that he and his wife would park in the street and use their required parking spaces for clients, but that would violate the requirement that their spaces not be displaced.

And of course, perhaps most significantly, the use by necessity causes a public nuisance and disruption to the residential character of the neighborhood. To be clear, this is more than just the noise of some neighborhood kids splashing in a backyard pool in the summertime. A quick review of Marsh's website from 2018¹ shows just what a booming business this is:

The website plainly shows that from June 18-28, for example, there were lessons every half hour for 5 hours -10 lessons each day. Because the sessions are fully booked, according to the website, that means there are 3 kids in each half hour session, or 30 kids each day, over a 9-day session. That is 30 extra cars on the "substandard hillside limited street," and screaming and crying in the backyard for much of the day.

¹ I visited his website in connection with the lawsuit and this screenshot is from then. That was the last time he offered the school in his backyard; since the injunction he has been teaching elsewhere. His current website shows that the 2022 season was sold out. *See* Exhibit A.



The Applicant has claimed that he makes about \$100,000.00 per year from his swim school. This further illustrates that his backyard swim school is far more than just a few kids splashing around:

- If Marsh makes \$100,000.00 teaching swim lessons, as he claims,
- and he charges \$450 per session,
- then more than 222 kids come through his classes each season.
- If each kid has at least one parent, that is 444 people.
- 9 sessions per kid x 444 people = 3,996 people coming and going from this private home over the course of a season from February to October

In addition, neighbors who live to the north of Marsh experience the brunt of the noise and traffic/parking congestion. Homes on the south side of the Marsh property are separated from the Marsh home by wooded hillside and by Marsh's immediate neighbor to the south. In addition, the pool is partially blocked by the Marsh house itself. Cars tend to park to the north of Marsh's home because the trail to the back of the house is along the north side of his property, directly abutting the Kubrins' property. Thus, the northern neighbors have more complaints. For example,

- Cindy Gottlieb, 3530 Laurelvale, lives a few houses up the hill from Marsh, and can hear children screaming. Once the screams were so "strident" she was concerned a child was being tortured and went to investigate. She also reports parking and traffic issues; a trash truck was recently unable to pass through the street because of Marsh clients parked there. Another time a parent ignored requests to move and blocked the street while picking up a child.
- Danielle Knight, 3506 Laurelvale, also reported being able to hear screams from the pool. She stated the 3 to 6 additional cars in the street were a problem, and she was concerned about her property values. She is also concerned about safety issues, as "sometimes the children are not properly supervised and they dart into the street."
- Mark Macalupo, 3523 Laurelvale has "serious concerns about emergency vehicles having access" because of the additional cars on the street. He had initially written a letter in support of Marsh, because he is a good swim teacher, but has since realized the problems to the neighborhood.
- Miguel Soltero, 3509 Laurelvale, is concerned about the noise, privacy issues, extra cars and property values.
- Nadim Bakhos, 3514 Laurelvale, reported being "barely able to make it through" the street at times because of the extra parked cars. He noted that parking on the street had become more limited for residents. He was especially concerned about safety, after "a 3-year old almost jumped in front of [his] car."



See Written complaints from neighbors, attached hereto as Exhibit D. Thus, because the swim school in the backyard of this residential neighborhood is de facto incompatible with the home occupation requirements, and cannot be conditioned to meet these requirements, the CUP should be denied.

B. <u>The CUP findings asserted by Marsh cannot be made</u>.

Next, and largely for the same reasons, CUP findings cannot be made because the evidence shows that the proposed use is not compatible with and will adversely affect the neighborhood and its residential character.

As described above, there is significant neighborhood opposition to Marsh's swim lessons in the back yard. Additional letters of opposition are attached to this letter as Exhibit D. In the face of this opposition, findings cannot be made either that the proposed use is beneficial to the neighborhood or that the use will enhance the environment or be compatible with the neighborhood or the community plan.

The main concerns are traffic and parking, accessibility for emergency vehicles, as well as the noise itself. Neighbors are also justifiably concerned about their property values and the need to disclose this swim school to prospective buyers. *See* Letter from Real Estate agent, attached hereto as Exhibit E.

Laurelvale Street is a "local" street, which requires a 60-foot right of way, inclusive of the 36-foot roadway and 24-foot sidewalk (12 feet on each side). Laurelvale, however, is only about 30 feet wide, as measured using <u>https://navigatela.lacity.org/navigatela/</u>, and has no sidewalks. It is therefore considered a "substandard hillside limited street," which is defined by LAMC §12.03 as "A Street which does not meet the minimum requirements of a Standard Hillside Limited Street as defined in Section <u>12.03</u> of this Code (public or private) with a width less than 36 feet and paved to a roadway width of less than 28 feet, as determined by the Bureau of Engineering."²

Practically this means that if a car is parked on each side of the street, it is difficult for another vehicle to get through. Emergency vehicles have a hard time accessing the street even when there are not extra cars parked there and kids darting in and out of cars. Laurelvale is also a cul-de-sac, so that cars must turn around to get out – there is only one point of ingress and egress.

The extra vehicular traffic from the swim school thus causes a significant problem for both residents and emergency vehicles. On this basis, findings cannot be made that the proposed use will not adversely affect the neighborhood or the public health, welfare and safety.

² I should note that in his CUP application, Marsh asserts Laurelvale is a standard local street. He offers no support for this; it is not true.



In addition, though the Applicant seeks the CUP for a "school," his swim school is not what was intended to be permitted by a CUP in a residential zone. Schools generally are allowed by conditional use in residential zones because they benefit the community and bring kids together in a place that requires them all to be together. The proposed use here is just a business that can occur anywhere (as evidenced by the Applicant's ability to run his school elsewhere while the injunction is in place). The applicant only wants it at his house to save money on renting a facility or driving to client's homes. He is externalizing the costs onto the neighbors so he can reap the profits.

For these reasons, findings cannot be made.

C. <u>CEQA Class 23 exemption does not apply</u>

Next, the Applicant asserts he is exempt from CEQA regulations under the Class 23 exemption. This exemption does not apply here.

Class 23 is intended for the normal operations of existing public facilities, using those facilities for the purpose for which they were designed. Examples are racetracks, stadiums, and public pools. *See* 14 Cal. Code Regs. §15323. A pool in someone's back yard is not public, nor was a backyard pool designed for the purpose of running a commercial enterprise.

In addition, though the applicant repeatedly refers to the "past use" of his backyard pool for a commercial swim school as support for granting the CUP under this exemption, *in fact his school was illegal*. It would be improper to exempt him from regulations based on an illegal past use, which would incentivize applicants to use properties for unlawful purposes and then rely on that past history to obtain permits. The Applicant plainly should not get any credit for his past unlawful use.

In any event, even if Class 23 did apply, there are exceptions to the categorical exemptions. Under §15300.2(a), for example, the exemption might not apply if the project is to be placed in a "particularly sensitive environment." As discussed in detail below, the Laurelvale neighborhood is considered a "Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone," which would be categorized as particularly sensitive. Similarly, §15300.2(c) is an exception for the "reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances." Again, the operation of a commercial enterprise with increased traffic on a substandard street in a high fire zone may well qualify as an unusual circumstance.

Thus, the Class 23 exemption does not apply because this illegal backyard swim school is not the type of project for which the class is intended and because exceptions apply.

D. The proposed use cannot meet either residential parking requirements or <u>school use parking requirements</u>.

The application should also be denied because the parking situation is not only dangerous and a nuisance, but it also cannot meet the requirements either for a school or a residence.



The Applicant asserts that his patrons can simply park in the street or, if needed, he and his wife can park in the street and two cars can park in their driveway. This proposal has a few problems. First, as discussed above, for a home occupation, visitors' cars cannot displace the use of required parking spaces, and the dwelling is required to have two covered spaces available at all times for the residents. LAMC §12.21A.4(a). Next, though the residential parking may be tandem in the driveway, the commercial parking may not. *See* LAMC §12.21A.5.

Nor, if the swim lessons are classified as a "school" under §12.24U.24(c), as the Applicant requests, may the students be required to park on the street. Schools are required to provide onsite parking. In any event, as discussed above, the street is substandard, so parking on the street presents a problem.

E. <u>The Proposed use presents a fire safety hazard</u>.

As mentioned above, Laurelvale is considered a "Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone," which is the highest of three zones for assessing where the threat of wildfire is the greatest. *See* Letter from Fire Department, attached hereto as Exhibit F. This threat is exacerbated by the substandard street, which does not leave much room for emergency vehicles to access the street. In addition, because the street is a cul-de-sac, the risk is higher and accessibility lower.

The extra vehicular traffic created by the Applicant's swim school therefore creates a much higher risk of fire danger. As some of the neighbors have pointed out, the swim school patrons' cars sometimes block the road, making it difficult to get by. When cars are parked on both sides, as they often are at the beginning and end of each lesson, there is not enough space to travel past them. These create an increased risk of fire hazards in a high risk area.

F. Allowing this use, which is distinguishable from the only other permitted <u>neighborhood swim school</u>, would set a terrible precedent.

Finally, the proposed use here is factually distinguishable from the Jim Herrick swim school, which to my knowledge is the only other permitted backyard swim school and which is not a valid comparison. The Applicant relies heavily on the Herrick school in his application, but there are significant differences that make this reliance inappropriate.

First, the Herrick property is on a "collector" street, which provides linkages between local and arterial streets. It is about 66 feet wide, with one full lane in each direction. As set forth in detail above, Laurelvale is narrow, is in a quiet residential area and is also a cul-de-sac, so that cars must turn around to get out – there is only one point of ingress and egress. In other words, the Herrick property is on a much more travelled and less secluded street. It is closer to commercial activities and has less of a quiet residential tenor than Laurelvale. In fact, the Herrick application specifically noted that ambient noise from the freeway and other streets helped to cover operational noise from the swim lessons. (This is obviously not the case for the Applicant here, despite his assertion in his application.)

In addition, the Herrick property has room for off-street parking, which was a requirement of the CUP in that case. Herrick has both a front and back location for dropping off students, which also eases the congestion. The Herrick property is not located in a High Severity Fire Hazard Zone.

In addition, the Herrick property has a block wall, a 2-foot-wide planter with Fern Pines, and coverings for the pool, all of which act to filter much of the noise. As discussed above, my clients' property is separated from the pool and walkway area only by some ficus trees and an unfulfilled promise by Marsh to build a wooden fence (which would make little difference anyway).

The Herrick CUP was granted in part because Herrick had shown "substantial compliance with the conditions of the previous discretionary actions." Marsh, on the other hand, repeatedly refused to comply with LADBS rules and forced us to sue to get him to comply. This significant difference from Herrick should weigh heavily against granting the CUP.

Finally, Herrick got his CUP because of the lack of any detriment to or opposition from adjoining property owners. The neighbors in that case not only did not object but fully supported the school because there were no noise or traffic problems like my client and other neighbors have on Laurelvale. No one attending the hearing opposed it and no one wrote letters in opposition or lodged any complaints against Herrick. Plainly, this is a different case.

G. <u>The Applicant has demonstrated that he is unable to comply with conditions</u>.

Even if it were possible to grant permission for the swim lessons in the backyard with conditions – and, for all the foregoing reasons, my clients and I strenuously assert it is impossible – the Applicant has shown that he is unable or unwilling to comply with any such conditions.

As an initial matter, he ran this school for a number of years with no regard for the law. He ran an unpermitted, unlicensed, unauthorized commercial enterprise from his home without making any effort to discover the regulations or comply with them. Indeed, the Applicant only sought to obtain this CUP in response to my clients' repeated complaints and the City's repeated notices of violation and orders to comply.

Perhaps more troubling, however, is that once the Applicant was aware he was violating the law - he simply continued to do so. He did not care that he was running an unauthorized business in violation of the Los Angeles Municipal Code. He was only interested in whether he could get away with it. The Applicant's knowing disregard for the law forced my clients, at their personal expense, to file their lawsuit in Los Angeles Superior Court and obtain judicial intervention requiring him to cease violating the law.

The Applicant's disregard and disdain for the law indicate that he cannot really be trusted to comply with conditions placed on his proposed use (to the extent such use could be made to


comply). I therefore request that for this reason, as well as all those set forth above, you deny his application.

begin the next class.

10. The students are young children first being introduced to swimming in the pool next to
plaintiffs' home. Typically, the students scream and cry through much of the introductory
sessions and eventually begin shrieking with joy as their confidence grows and they play in the
pool.

1	11. Students and their parents enter the Marsh Property from a walkway and gate on the side					
2	of the Marsh Property that is adjacent to the Kubrin Home. The only screening dividing the two					
3	properties is some small, sparse ficus trees.

sounds of children playing, because it is nearly constant in the summer, beginning at 8:00 am,
 and is exacerbated by the number of children in and around the pool at any given time.
 Marsh's swim school also creates an invasion of the Kubrin's privacy while in their own
 home: the walk-way to the backyard pool at the Marsh Property is directly adjacent to the Kubrin
 Home, and because it is not well-shielded, provides the constant stream of traffic a view into the

6 Kubrin Home and yard.

7 20. The Kubrins complained about this lack of privacy to Marsh, who offered to place a
8 wooden fence on his property line to provide additional privacy to the Kubrins. He has not done
9 so.

10 21. In addition, when parents stay during lessons to observe the classes, they frequently walk
11 up to the hillside at the back of the Marsh Property and talk to each other or on the phone, which,

Marsh's swim school also creates traffic and parking problems on the "substandard"

directly across from each other, so that the Kubrins and other residents have been unable to get

24. The noise and traffic from Marsh's swim school have created an intolerable situation for
the Kubrins.

To Plaintiffs and Others Filing First Papers. If you are filing a first paper (for example, a complaint) in a civil case, you must complete and file, along with your first paper, the *Civil Case Cover Sheet* contained on page 1. This information will be used to compile statistics about the types and numbers of cases filed. You must complete items 1 through 6 on the sheet. In item 1, you must check one box for the case type that best describes the case. If the case fits both a general and a more specific type of case listed in item 1, check the more specific one. If the case has multiple causes of action, check the box that best indicates the primary cause of action. To assist you in completing the sheet, examples of the cases that belong under each case type in item 1 are provided below. A cover sheet must be filed only with your initial paper. Failure to file a cover sheet with the first paper filed in a civil case may subject a party, its counsel, or both to sanctions under rules 2.30 and 3.220 of the California Rules of Court.

To Parties In Rule 3.740 Collections Cases. A "collections case" under rule 3.740 is defined as an action for recovery of money owed in a sum stated to be certain that is not more than \$25,000, exclusive of interest and attorney's fees, arising from a transaction in which property, services, or money was acquired on credit. A collections case does not include an action seeking the following: (1) tort damages, (2) punitive damages, (3) recovery of real property, (4) recovery of personal property, or (5) a prejudgment writ of attachment. The identification of a case as a rule 3.740 collections case on this form means that it will be exempt from the general time-for-service requirements and case management rules, unless a defendant files a responsive pleading. A rule 3.740 collections case will be subject to the requirements for service and obtaining a judgment in rule 3.740.

To Parties in Complex Cases. In complex cases only, parties must also use the *Civil Case Cover Sheet* to designate whether the case is complex. If a plaintiff believes the case is complex under rule 3.400 of the California Rules of Court, this must be indicated by completing the appropriate boxes in items 1 and 2. A defendant may file and serve no later than the time of its first appearance a joinder in the plaintiff's designation, a counter-designation that the case is not complex, or, if the plaintiff has made no designation, a designation that the case is complex.

The following critical provisions of the California Rules of Court, Title 3, Division 7, as applicable in the Superior Court, are summarized for your assistance.

APPLICATION

The Division 7 Rules were effective January 1, 2007. They apply to all general civil cases.

PRIORITY OVER OTHER RULES

The Division 7 Rules shall have priority over all other Local Rules to the extent the others are inconsistent.

CHALLENGE TO ASSIGNED JUDGE

A challenge under Code of Civil Procedure Section 170.6 must be made within 15 days after notice of assignment for all purposes to a judge, or if a party has not yet appeared, within 15 days of the first appearance.

TIME STANDARDS

Cases assigned to the Independent Calendaring Courts will be subject to processing under the following time standards:

COMPLAINTS

All complaints shall be served within 60 days of filing and proof of service shall be filed within 90 days.

CROSS-COMPLAINTS

Without leave of court first being obtained, no cross-complaint may be filed by any party after their answer is filed. Cross-complaints shall be served within 30 days of the filing date and a proof of service filed within 60 days of the filing date.

STATUS CONFERENCE

A status conference will be scheduled by the assigned Independent Calendar Judge no later than 270 days after the filing of the complaint. Counsel must be fully prepared to discuss the following issues: alternative dispute resolution, bifurcation, settlement, trial date, and expert witnesses.

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FINAL STATUS CONFERENCE

The Court will require the parties to attend a final status conference not more than 10 days before the scheduled trial date. All parties shall have motions in limine, bifurcation motions, statements of major evidentiary issues, dispositive motions, requested form jury instructions, special jury instructions, and special jury verdicts timely filed and served prior to the conference. These matters may be heard and resolved at this conference. At least five days before this conference, counsel must also have exchanged lists of exhibits and witnesses, and have submitted to the court a brief statement of the case to be read to the jury panel as required by Chapter Three of the Los Angeles Superior Court Rules.

SANCTIONS

The court will impose appropriate sanctions for the failure or refusal to comply with Chapter Three Rules, orders made by the Court, and time standards or deadlines established by the Court or by the Chapter Three Rules. Such sanctions may be on a party, or if appropriate, on counsel for a party.

This is not a complete delineation of the Division 7 or Chapter Three Rules, and adherence only to the above provisions is therefore not a guarantee against the imposition of sanctions under Trial Court Delay Reduction. Careful reading and compliance with the actual Chapter Rules is imperative.

Class Actions

Pursuant to Local Rule 2.3, all class actions shall be filed at the Stanley Mosk Courthouse and are randomly assigned to a complex judge at the designated complex courthouse. If the case is found not to be a class action it will be returned to an Independent Calendar Courtroom for all purposes.

***Provisionally Complex Cases**

Cases filed as provisionally complex are initially assigned to the Supervising Judge of complex litigation for determination of complex status. BACKGROUND

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Plaintiffs Jed Kubrin and Marisa Kubrin ("Plaintiffs") brought suit against their neighbor, 14 Defendants William Marsh and Elisa Marsh ("Defendants") for unlawfully operating a 15 swimming school in the pool in their backyard. (Compl. ¶¶ 5, 9.) Plaintiffs allege the school 16 leads to excessive noise, as dozens of very young children and their parents converge on the pool 17 throughout the day. (Compl. ¶ 18.) Plaintiffs also allege that it creates hazardous parking, as their 18 neighborhood is unfit for the number of cars that arrive. (Compl. ¶ 22.) Plaintiffs allege that 19 Defendants were previously sanctioned in 2017 by the Los Angeles Department of Building 20 Services for unlawfully operating a home occupation, and that Defendants ceased operating the 21 school at their home for the remainder of the year. (Compl. ¶ 12-15.) Defendants began 22 operating the school again this year, however, necessitating this suit. (Compl. ¶ 16.) 23

The complaint, filed April 27, 2018, alleges causes of action for: (1) nuisance; (2) unfair business practices; and (3) injunctive relief.

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Plaintiffs seek a preliminary injunction barring Defendants from operating the swim school for the duration of the suit.

LEGAL STANDARD

"[A] court will deny a preliminary injunction unless there is a reasonable probability that the plaintiff will be successful on the merits, but the granting of a preliminary injunction does not amount to an adjudication of the merits." (Beehan v. Lido Isle Community Assn. (1977) 70 Cal.App.3d 858, 866.) "The function of a preliminary injunction is the preservation of the status quo until a final determination of the merits." (Id.)

"Trial courts traditionally consider and weigh two factors in determining whether to issue a preliminary injunction. They are (1) how likely it is that the moving party will prevail on the merits, and (2) the relative harm the parties will suffer in the interim due to the issuance or nonissuance of the injunction." (Dodge, Warren & Peters Ins. Services, Inc. v. Riley (2003) 105 Cal.App.4th 1414, 1420.) "[T]he greater the ... showing on one, the less must be shown on the other to support an injunction." (Id. [quoting Butt v. State of California, (1992) 4 Cal.4th 668, 678].) The burden of proof is on the plaintiff as the moving party "to show all elements necessary to support issuance of a preliminary injunction." (O'Connell v. Superior Court (2006) 141 Cal.App.4th 1452, 1481.) 17

Preliminary injunctive relief requires the use of competent evidence to create a sufficient factual showing on the grounds for relief. (See, e.g., Ancora-Citronelle Corp. v. Green (1974) 41 Cal.App.3d 146, 150.) Injunctive relief may be granted based upon a verified complaint only if it contains sufficient evidentiary as opposed to ultimate facts. (CCP §527(a).) For this reason, a pleading alone rarely suffices. (Weil & Brown, Cal. Practice Guide: Civil Proc. Before Trial (The Rutter Group 2016) ¶¶ 9:579-580.) A plaintiff seeking injunctive relief must also show the absence of an adequate damages remedy at law. (CCP $\S526(a)(4)$.) 24

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1	A preliminary injunction ordinarily cannot take effect unless and until the plaintiff
2	provides an undertaking for damages which the enjoined defendant may sustain by reason of the
3	injunction if the court finally decides that the plaintiff was not entitled to the injunction. (See
4	CCP §529(a); City of South San Francisco v. Cypress Lawn Cemetery Ass 'n (1992) 11

6	DISCUSSION
7	A. Probability of Success
8	Nuisance
9	Plaintiffs argue first that they will likely succeed on their cause of action for nuisance.

11	nuisance. First, the plaintiff must prove an interference with his use and enjoyment of his property. Second, the invasion of the plaintiff's interest in the

18	Plaintiffs provide declarations detailing the amount of noise they experience from
19	Defendants swim school (Jed Kubrin Decl. ¶¶ 3, 5-6, 13-14, 20; Marisa Kubrin Decl. ¶¶ 10, 13,
20	15), the amount of time they spend indoors as a result (Jed Kubrin Decl. $\P\P$ 7-8), their inability to
21	have guests at their home (Jed Kubrin Decl. ¶ 9), their fears as to the impact on the value of their
22	property (Jed Kubrin Decl. ¶ 15), the lost privacy as swim students and their parents look into

In opposition, Defendants summarily argue that the foregoing is insufficient, because nuisance requires an objective standard, with both the substantiality of the damage and the unreasonableness of the invasion judged by the reasonable person standard. (*Mendez v. Rancho Valencia Resort Partners, supra,* 3 Cal.App.5th at 263.) Defendants argue that Plaintiffs' evidence, which relates only to their own impression of the nuisance, is therefore insufficient.

In reply, Plaintiffs respond by submitting letters from five neighbors and a real estate
broker attesting to the nuisance. The Court does not consider this evidence, because it was
submitted for the first time on reply, and Defendants have not had an opportunity to respond to
it. (See San Diego Watercrafts, Inc. v. Wells Fargo Bank, N.A. (2002) 102 Cal.App.4th 308, 312313.) Nevertheless, the Court concludes Plaintiffs' declarations filed in support of their motion
are sufficient to carry Plaintiffs' burden as to the first prong of the preliminary injunction test.
Whether an act is objectively damaging and unreasonable, such that liability for nuisance may be
imposed, is a question of fact. (Mendez v. Rancho Valencia Resort Partners, supra, 3
Cal.App.5th at 263-64.) The Court concludes a jury could conclude, based on Plaintiffs'
testimony alone, that Defendants were liable for nuisance, and Plaintiffs have therefore
demonstrated a probability of prevailing on their first cause of action.

Violation of Bus. & Prof. Code § 17200

Plaintiffs' motion does not address Plaintiffs' probability of success as to their second cause of action, for unlawful, unfair, or fraudulent conduct in violation of Bus. & Prof. Code § 17200. Nevertheless, in opposition, Defendants argue they cannot succeed because it is not even clear whether Plaintiffs are alleging unfair, fraudulent, or unlawful conduct.

Because Plaintiffs do not address this argument in the motion, the Court need not address it either. As a brief aside, however, the Court notes that it is abundantly clear that Plaintiffs are asserting Defendants have engaged in unlawful behavior. As Defendants' own evidence attests, Defendants have already been cited for violating LA Municipal Code § 12.05, subd. 16. (Marsh

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Decl. ¶ 10.) There is no apparent dispute that Defendants remain in violation of that provision. Instead, Defendants focus on the fact that they have applied for a conditional use permit to allow them to engage in the prohibited conduct. (Marsh Decl. ¶ 10.) While Defendants argue that the City of Los Angeles has agreed not to cite Defendants for another violation of the code while the conditional use permit is pending (Marsh Decl. ¶ 10), that does not alter the fact that Defendants have previously engaged in unlawful conduct, and that until a conditional use permit is approved, Defendants are continuing to engage in unlawful conduct.

B. The Balance of Harms Favors Granting the Preliminary Injunction

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Before a court will grant a preliminary injunction, the moving party must establish at least some probability of success on the merits. (Butt v. State of California (1992) 4 Cal.4th 668, 678.) "If a moving party is able to make such a showing, a court will then "examin[e] all of the material before it in order to consider 'whether a greater injury will result to the defendant from granting the injunction than to the plaintiff from refusing it,....' [Citations.]" (Take Me Home Rescue v. Luri (2012) 208 Cal.App.4th 1342, 1353.)

In this case, the Court finds that the balance of harms weighs in favor of granting the preliminary injunction. Plaintiffs argue they will continue experiencing excessive noise and parking impediments for the duration of the case, absent a preliminary injunction. Defendants argue that, if the business is shut down, Defendants will lose approximately \$48,600 in income 18 this year, and another \$100,000 in income if the injunction were to last for the entirety of 2019. 19 As Plaintiffs persuasively argue, however, until a conditional use permit is issued, Defendants 20 have no right to engage in this business from their home. Moreover, Defendants do not dispute 21 that, after their previous citation for violating the municipal code, Defendants were able to 22 relocate to a different pool to complete their lessons for the 2017 season. (Jed Kubrin Decl. ¶ 25.) 23 Nothing in the opposition suggests any particular reason Defendants could not pursue this option 24 1 25 1 2 1 2 1 8 again.

CONCLUSION AND ORDER

For the foregoing reasons, the Court grants Plaintiffs' request for a preliminary

|| injunction.

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CCP §529(a) provides:

On granting an injunction, the court or judge must require an undertaking on the part of the applicant to the effect that the applicant will pay to the party enjoined any damages, not exceeding an amount to be specified, the party may sustain by reason of the injunction, if the court finally decides that the applicant was not entitled to the injunction. Within five days after the service of the injunction, the person enjoined may object to the undertaking. If the court determines that the applicant's undertaking is insufficient and a sufficient undertaking is not filed within the time required by statute, the order granting the injunction must be dissolved.

Defendants request that a bond in the amount of \$250,000 be required, based on the approximately \$50,000 in income Defendants will lose this year, \$100,000 in income Defendants will lose next year, and \$100,000 in attorney's costs likely to be incurred. In reply, Plaintiffs request only a nominal bond of \$1,000 be imposed, due to the exceedingly high likelihood they will succeed in their suit. The Court will order Plaintiffs to post a bond in the amount of \$150,000.

The Court further notes that in reply, Plaintiffs represent that Defendants classes run in 9day increments, with the current session set to conclude on June 28. The Court is inclined to make the preliminary injunction effective June 29, 2018, in order to allow Defendants time to finish the current round of lessons, and, should they so choose, to arrange for future lessons to occur at a new location.

Plaintiffs are ordered to provide notice of this order.

I am concerned that if a swim school is permitted, emergency vehicles will not be able to make it up the street. We have several elderly residents and we live in a high risk fire zone. This could lead to a catastrophe.

Our very narrow street does not have sidewalks, and during the time his school was operating illegally, very young children would often pop out from between parked cars with no notice, and I am afraid that continued operation will lead to a tragedy. Attempting to talk with them about the problems it was causing was met with a blank refusal of any attempt of mitigation, such as spacing out sessions or asking clients to park more carefully.

Also, his house is a house. It is not a school, nor is it currently a commercial establishment. It does not meet ADA requirements. His pool does not have a lift for disabled access. It does not have a ramp for disabled access. There are innumerable other regulations that commercial establishments should follow for the safety of their customers that are not possible at this location without either complete renovation/demolition that are impractical/impossible at this location.

Lastly, I would imagine that a permitted swim school would lower our property values. For most of us, our home is our greatest asset. If approved, we would have to disclose that there is a permitted swim school on our street, which would greatly affect the sale price.

While I'm sure that Bill is a terrific swim instructor, I do not believe that Laurelvale Drive is the appropriate or safe place for a swim school. It's a quiet, residential neighborhood, that those of us who bought houses in, did so because it's a quiet, residential neighborhood. If Bill wishes to live in a commercially zoned neighborhood, he is welcome to do so, but I do not wish to do so. I urge the council to listen to the neighbors, listen to the zoning, look at the laws, and pay attention to the facts which are this - it's a residential pool, it's not a school. Schools have sprinklers, ADA access, bathrooms, parking, and so on. Residential homes Don't. There's a difference between having a swim instructor come to your house and give a lesson to you and few friends for a week or so, and running 9 hours of lessons, 6 days a weeks, for 9 months of the year at his house.

Re: William Marsh Swimming School "Swim to Bill"

I am a resident home owner at 3530 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, Ca. I have owned and lived in this address over 30 years (since August 1986).

A couple years ago Bill Marsh, a resident and presumably home owner at 3477 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, a property the includes a swimming pool, began holding swimming classes for children. Laurelvale is a street that rises (using a map-grid basis) from low in the west to high in the east. The rise is quite steep. Sound travels uphill.

I have heard, during morning sessions of this swim school, the sound of children screaming. On one occasion the sound was so strong and the tenor of the screaming so strident that I was genuinely concerned that a child was being tortured. I walked downhill to the property from which the sounds of torture were coming and discovered, in the backyard of the property, a swimming pool with three or four adults present and one or two children also present. One child was being held in the water by an adult. I did not see any signs of harm to the child.

Laurelvale is a narrow street and it is permitted to park vehicles on both sides of the street. When two vehicles are parked across from each other it leaves barely enough room for a single third vehicle to pass between the two parked vehicles. If either (or both) of the parked vehicles are either a) too wide, b) have protrusions that are wider than the parked vehicle, or c) either vehicle is parked more than 12 inches away from the curb, it is impossible to pass between the parked vehicles.

On one occasion in the month of May, 2018, I was driving home when a personal passenger vehicle was stopped in the middle of the street, between two cars parked on each side. The driver of the vehicle was a woman. The vehicle was in front of the Marsh house. I asked the woman to please move her vehicle. She ignored my request, got out of her automobile (leaving it stopped in the middle of the street) and then moved to the rear of her vehicle where she located and then assisted in loading a young child into the rear seat of the vehicle. She buckled in the child, closed the rear door of the vehicle, then climbed into her vehicle and backed up into an available parking space that was available immediately behind the vehicle parked on the north side of the street.

On Wednesdays our trash is picked up. Three trash trucks must navigate this narrow street to pick up trash. On occasion, a trash truck will be unable to pass because of vehicles parked in front of the Marsh house. The trash truck honked its horn insistently for over 3 minutes. I knocked on the door of the Marsh house and when nobody answered the door I walked into the back yard (around the side of the house) and saw people in the swimming pool I asked them to have the car moved. The car was then move and the trash truck was able to continue on its route.

On many occasions I have heard the sound of children screaming while participating in the swim school activities.

The sound of screaming children is annoying. The disruption of traffic is also annoying.

Laurelvale is a dead-end street, in the hills of Studio City. Because of the hilly nature of the terrain sounds are contained within the hills located on both sides of the street. The hills also block noise from the city to the north. The area is physically attractive and the residents are mostly quiet and the neighborhood is peaceful.

In the event of an emergency, such as a medical emergency requiring the presence of an ambulance or a fire calling for a fire truck, the blocking of the street of Laurelvale, for which there is no outlet (I.e., a "dead-end" street) could result in a mass tragedy including possible death and/or loss and destruction of houses.

Hello Jed,

By now a few stakeholders, including yourself, have brought to my attention, as well as to that of other residents on our street, the possibility of a swimming school being permanently and officially implemented on our Street. Needless to say some of us were baffled and blindsided. The following are some of my concerns and comments regarding the matter. The following are some comments that I would like being taken into consideration and addressed.

From a transportation/traffic angle, one that I am familiar enough with having worked since the year 2000 for both the County of Los Angeles and, currently, the City of Los Angeles as a Transportation Engineer, typically schools wreak havoc on any street due to the impact first and foremost on the parking situation and loading and unloading of students. Specific loading zones and parking restrictions have usually to be implemented to suit the needs of a school. On the days I happened to be home and swimming lessons were taking place (tho I originally thought someone had a large party), parents were parking all the way up to at least my house. Most were large SUVs and our street is substandard with about 24' curb to curb. I was barely able to make it thru, and I drive a mid size sedan. Also a lot of driveways on our street are narrow and substandard (most homes on the street were mostly built in the 1950s). My fear is that, once the school in question is made permanent, residents will be unable to get in and out of their driveway due to cars parked too close and will call the city and ask for red curb around their driveway (we got dozens of such calls every month while I was in the Hollywood Wilshire District). In 99% of the cases the City will deny and ask them to enlarge their driveway. Only in 1% of the cases the driveway cannot be enlarged. Once denied, some residents will take matters in their own hands and start painting the curb red around their driveways. As you know, someone already took matters in their own hands and painted red curb in front of their house. You get my drift here. Other potential traffic impact problems is that with the presence of such school, parking on the street will get more limited for us residents (preferential parking as of now is not an option as the city implements that for an area not just a block, and no immediate area seems to have one). The city would install any parking restriction granted we submit a petition with 2/3 signatures from the stop sign all the way to the end. Now we all have to abide by the restriction we asked for whether it restricts parking for an hour or two. Unless it is preferential parking, even us the residents will have to abide by any parking restriction, while currently we have no restriction and the freedom not to worry about one.

In addition, if we have a speeding problem on the street, speed humps (the most common tool the City uses to deal with speeding on local and minor streets) are not an option in our street for 2 reasons: grade possibly over 8 % and the average daily traffic is under 500 (500 to 2000 is the range set by the city, and I have yet to see a cul de sac that carries over 500 vehicles per day). What I am trying to say thru all this is that we have a great street to be in, but if we invite trouble, the options are not great due to the grade and alignment of our street.

Being in my field, I am also sensitive to accidents. To give you an example, I was summoned along 5 other engineers last Spring for a grueling deposition about a stretch of Franklin we had all worked on. It is a 25 mph and one lane in each direction. A jogger was hit by a car going at 40 mph which resulted in permanent brain injury. The driver was first sued and the family got \$ 2.5 millions out of him. Then the family turned around and sued the city and every name that had appeared on any plan or email in the last 10 years on that stretch of Franklin was summoned for a deposition by the nastiest of lawyers. The City ended up settling out of court for \$12 millions. While driving down the street the day the swimming sessions were going, a 3-year old almost jumped in front of my car and I was going at 5 mph believe me. The risk of bodily injury is higher for all of us now that a school might be going. The website of "Swim to Bill" specifies that all prospective students are up to 2 years old only !!!!!!!

Another concern, if school in question becomes official, has to do again with parking. Emergencies can happen to all of us, regardless of age. With parents parking their big size SUVs on both sides of the street, an emergency vehicle will not be able to make it thru. The City will be sued and will come and install a double yellow center line with **Tow Away No Stopping Any Time** on one side of the street (actual scenario that I have seen happening in the City). Now we have lost half the parking on the street.....

We have all invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in renovations on all these old decaying homes we bought. In fact, some of us joke that we are a contractor's dream street. We have also just started enjoying the fruits of our labor. We did not originally sign in for that type of school/development on this street. In fact, most of us put up with grueling restorations because of the quiet and secluded nature of our street. A true paradise with mostly great families. While I could not be 100% sure not being a realtor myself, but I am suspecting allowing a school to proceed will change the nature of our quiet street and the possibility of home values taking a hit in the process might be real (A realtor has to weigh in on this).

The most baffling part is that the **Swim To Bill** people were proceeding with their plans and expanding their enrollment without any warning or regards as to the impact on the rest of us. The City of L.A. has 4 million plus residents and that is why laws and ordinances are in place, to regulate and monitor. We are not in a third world country.

Again the potential traffic and parking impact of a school going on our street is real and needs to be addressed.

To whom it may concern:

I own one of the houses that's in closest proximity to 3477 Laurelvale Dr, and I'm concerned about the impact on the neighborhood and my home value should a permit be granted to operate a private swim school at that residence.

Having owned my house (3506 Laurelvale Dr) for over 7 years, year after year I've experienced the parking and traffic problems that result from the swim school at 3477. The street is narrow, and it's a cul de sac. During periods when the classes are offered, there are between 3 and 6 additional cars on the street, some of which are driven by inconsiderate parkers. Although a few years ago our neighbor who operates the school agreed to require his clients to park on the same side of the street as his home (my house is on the opposite side), the additional cars still result in inconveniences for residents who live close and difficulties especially for the neighbors who live on that side of the street and wish to park in front of their homes.

Furthermore, the activity creates much noise and safety risks. Children are of course noisy by nature, and during the swim sessions, if the windows at my home are open, the excited screaming of the children can be heard in the house. My neighbors across the street, the Kubrins at 3501 Laurelvale, definitely are in a worse situation given how close the pool is to their property. My understanding is that the Kubrins hear the class from inside their house even with all windows closed. No one in a residential neighborhood should have to suffer this situation. Additionally, sometimes the children are not properly supervised and they dart into the street; no one on our street wants the risk of personal injury caused by the cluster of activity near 3477.

The impact of this school on my property value is also a concern. After speaking with real estate professionals and others experienced with this type

of situation, I'm convinced that if a swim school was permitted to legally operate at 3477, the value of homes on our street (especially those that are nearest to the proposed school) would be adversely affected.

For all of these reasons, and also because our street is located in a "very high" fire hazard zone, I oppose the granting of the permit.

As a seller of your personal residence you would be required to disclose to a potential buyer any material fact (Blight) you are aware of that may adversely affect the value of your property.

Most common forms of General blight are urban decay, high crime rates, tagging and graffiti and they all affect neighborhood pricing but have less impact on an individual home in the areas affected. Remedial blight such as damage to a roof or a foundation, a bee infestation, rats, termites, mold etc. will also affect value but for the most part are problems that can be corrected.

Valuable residential neighborhoods command the higher prices they enjoy based on the peace, quiet, and security they offer and if pervasive Noise is disclosed, it will damage an eventual sale.

While barking dogs or raucous party holders can be a problem, they are usually transitory in nature and can be handled with diplomacy. Homes near a Freeway, or on a busy street are generally worth considerable less than those that are not. A \$29" Inspection fee has been instituted to recover the cost associated with the initial brush inspection, which is conducted by a team of Fire Inspectors during the months of May and June to identify hazards. Property owners that are not in compliance with the Brush Clearance Ordinance shall be issued a Notice of Non-Compliance and billed \$29" for the inspection. Inspection billing will begin during the month of July 2020, and must be paid by the dates specified on the bill. Failure to submit payment will result in an assessment of a 200% penalty.

However, the Ordinance provides an opportunity for the property owner to AVOID THE 529* INSPECTION FEE by maintaining their property in accordance with the provisions we forth on LA.M.C.Section 57.322, et seq. IN ORDER TO AVOID ASSESSMENT OF AN INSPECTION FEE, INVOLUTION CLEARANCE SHALL BE CONDUCTED AND COMPLETE COMPLIANCE IS REQUIRED AS DEFINED IN LA.M.C.Section 57.322 by April 30, 2020, If compliance is not complete by April 30, 2020, property owners are subject to the 529* fee if their property fails the inspection.

Noone used to park on the street but over the years different people moved in with more cars and over the last 2 years cars and other vehicles are parked on both sides of the road making it very difficult to drive down and up the street. On Wednesdays, trash day, some of the trucks can't get between vehicles and owners of these vehicles often do not come out and move them!!! so the trucks have to reverse back down the hill. We have old neighbours, who have had to call emergency services over the years and there is no way the big fire truck could get up with the parking as it is now.

I remember when there was swimming going on down the hill before, and there was a constant stream of cars parking and unloading children and bags of stuff, people leaving doors hanging open. There is NOT 'lots of parking'. There is now not enough room for the present residents to park the way they are doing.

And why on earth should someone suggest that we the residents should move if we do not like living near what amounts to a public swimming pool?!? as one of the swim parents suggested. How patronising.

The zoom meeting would have worked better if some of the residents had been allowed to alternate with the swim parents.

I hope we residents get a fair say in this situation after the patently biased presentation yesterday.

I found out a few years ago that you can have a business at your house but it is suppose to be one client at a time and it's suppose to be indoors. The city told me that they support kids learning to swim for the benefit of the community and safety so there is a variance/permit that I can apply for to be able to teach in my pool again. I made the application in 2018 but covid has delayed the process for all these years. Anyway I just got the date for my hearing and it's going to be October 25 on a zoom meeting. You should be getting a flyer in the mail about it but I wanted to let you know what it is. The city often grants schools a "CUP" Conditional Use Permit which is what it sounds like. 

I just wanted to thank you profusely for saving my oldest son's life when he was 18 months old. I'm not sure if you remember the exact scenario, but we enrolled Shaya when he was 17 months with you since my in-laws had a pool that was not fenced. My precocious child was already able to unlatch their sliding glass doors and this became a huge stress when we would visit my ailing father-in-law.

Shaya took your class for two weeks to become water safe. Less than a month after your class he fell in the pool when there were a lot of people at the house. Before anyone could get to him, Shaya was able to turn and kick his little body to the side and grab the ledge. Everybody at the party freaked out, except for me. I had so much confidence in your classes and they were worth every penny.

Both of my children still ask to come see you constantly. They have such fond memories of swimming to Bill (even though they both cried in the beginning!) And I have fond memories of sitting in the peace of your back yard and reading a book while the kids were with you. If it weren't for you, I don't know that they would have been water-safe at such a young age. I'm not sure my husband and I would have ever been able to relax around a pool. We have since joined a club because my kids want to spend their entire summers in the pool and I can actually sit in the shade instead of staying in the water the whole time.

I understand there is a hearing for Bill Marsh's permit application and I would like to share my endorsement of him and his program.



Bill's work is prolific, he has the ability to teach ALL children - all races, ethnicities, across neurodiversity on any spectrum that has been presented to him. You need only read a small handful of what his clients are saying - the clearly observable impact on their children is utterly consistent. In terms of value, Bill refuses to price people out of an attainable range, because he wants it to remain accessible for as many as he can service. Given the impact, his commitment to remaining accessible to the broader community, speaks for itself. FOSS lessons do not begin to compete with Bill's results, yet he prices his work for families.

The thing is, the environment matters. It matters to a businesses' bottom line, and also to what is able to be created. In his home, Bill has cultivated a space that is based in child psychology - learned from some of the best progressive schools in LA - complete with small cabins, magical fountains, flora, devices designed and hand made with small children and their developmental needs in mind... all elements that add to their experience of safety in the space. It is travesty to think that this small wonder - which produces SO faithfully, empowerment and growth for young children - it is a travesty to think it would go wasted. From a business standpoint, I cannot see how it could be recreated elsewhere. The cost would be prohibitive. What he is doing in his home, is partially possible because it IS his home. That includes the dynamic it creates among peers, when they are ALL in a new space. Part of the dynamic that Bill cultivates is based, as we say in education, "in place."

The idea that a neighbor, who chose to blast pornographic content at full volume and aim it AT the small preschool children Bill was supporting, the idea that person is directing an attack on Bill's ability to use his home in service of others... I am shocked that it has gotten this far in a place like LA. I have myself had Bill teach my daughters to swim. Why? Because there is NOTHING in my entire state like what he is able to do with kids in just 10 days. Their relationship to water is forever changed. The idea that he not be ENCOURAGED to continue, is amazing to me. I would think a city would be featuring him and his work as a small business in a local newspaper, not trying to shut him down.

I am extremely grateful we had the ability to visit Bill's pool & for the girls to experience the magic of "Swim to Bill." Parents silently sit on the side and observe their children transform. Although I understand what the caller was saying about the narrow street - I live on one myself. I really don't understand the complaint of traffic. There are 3 kids in a class and the class coming up is also has 3 kids. That leaves 6 cars at any time. Bill is really aware of the neighbors and cares about them as well. He encourages the parents to be respectful - that is who he is and what he is about. It is what makes his program work.

My son and I had a song we sang about swimming through your fears and tears - to the joy of swimming. That joy has lived on and grown. My son Loves to Swim. Over Labor Day Weekend this year, he saved a friend, who did not learn to swim when he was 3. Hi Correy,

William Marsh here. Thank you so much for overseeing the hearing last week. I can't imagine the amount of emails that you must have to field in a day. I was hoping I was going to be able to speak at the hearing but it closed up quickly. I want you and the public to know that what Kubrin and Schatt were saying was true. I wouldn't even support this application. If I felt that my neighborhood genuinely opposed me teaching kids at my house, I wouldn't be applying for a CUP. I have overwhelming support from the vast majority of my neighbors up and down the street. You should know that while Kubrin and Schatt oppose my application, they both asked me to teach their children in my pool as recently as a couple of months ago.

You do this every day, so I'm sure you see validity on both sides and you have make sense of what is the best outcome. I wanted to make a couple of points simply fact of science and math.

- 1. There is space for over 70 cars on our street. In 23 years of living here there has neverever been a time where someone couldn't park. NEVER. I'd bring the curse of every know god down on me if that isn't an absolute fact. Even when someone is having a big party, we can always park. When Schatt, Kubrin and Nadeem said they have concerns about parking, they mean in front of **their** own houses. They don't want anyone to park in front of **their** houses. Nadeem keeps cones out in front of his house to ensure that no one can park there. [See the pics.] Schatt uses his garbage cans for the same purpose but sometimes prefers cans and cones.
- 2. To address claims that there is traffic for 9 hours a day. It is not physically possible for me to teach 8 or 9 hours a day. I can't do it and never have. I can't imagine being able to be a good teacher and do that. The most I've ever been able to teach in one session is 4 hours. In the month of June I can do 2-3 hours in the morning and then 2 hours in the afternoon only because the demand is soooooo high and kids need to be safe but it's tough on me and I can't sustain it for more than two sessions in a row. It's not possible to teach between the hours of 11- 2 because kids are napping and 9 months of the year mornings are out because of school. I don't make exceptions because kids need naps and school. Also, I teach an 8 day course so in two weeks that is only 8 days out of 14 and only 2-3 hours a day.
- 3. The ability to control the chemistry and the water temp in my pool is the most critical reason that I need to use my pool. These are principle elements in getting kids to swim within a short several day span. I'm not making this up to beef up my case. Shivering kids with burning eyes are not going to be happy learning to swim.
- 4. If I could buy a commercial building and put a pool in, I would. It's cost prohibitive and for my business model it doesn't work. The only way that works is to have 1-2 million dollars for a building, then another 3-500 for a pool. Then to pay for it you need volumes of kids coming and going all day. To do that you need many teachers and a very low wage and many kids in the pool at the same time. Obviously some do this but I have to say it is not a very effective way to teach children to swim. If I did this I would be spending my time running a facility rather than getting kids safely swimming
- 5. Kubrin is going to send you a recording of a 22 month old child names Leah. I normally start with age 2 but I made an exception because the parents had a pool and were

desperately worried. We had great success with their twin boys and they wanted to get her swimming early. I said we could try. She cried like hell for 2 days and I stopped her lessons. [See attached letter and you can match the date with Kubrin's recording]

6. To put an end to the debate of how disruptive my classes are I recorded several weeks of lessons. Uninterrupted and unedited. It's laborious and boring but you make up your own mind. This is exactly what it looks like when I'm teaching in my back yard. I have many more hours if you need more footage.

That's all Correy. I wish I could have said these things publicly but I know you've got a lot going on handling these cases and have to keep it moving.



I wanted to write you an email affirming what happened with Leah's lessons earlier this month.

We signed up Leah, our 22-month-old daughter, up for swimming classes for the 9-day May 7-17th session at 4:30. Although she was clearly making great progress, after only (2) half-hour sessions (Bill actually ended each of these two sessions a few minutes earlier for Leah than the other kids), we happily heeded your request to withdraw her from the class because her crying was unusually loud. She therefore only attended class on May 7th and 8th, for less than 30 minutes on both days.

Our twin sons (now 4.5 years old) greatly benefited from taking your classes two summers ago. Although our own home swimming pool has an automatic safety cover, we're well aware that drowning is the leading accidental cause of death among children 4 or under. This could lead to a catastrophe.

Our very narrow street does not have sidewalks, and during the time his school was operating illegally, very young children would often pop out from between parked cars with no notice, and I am afraid that continued operation will lead to a tragedy. Attempting to talk with them about the problems it was causing was met with a blank refusal of any attempt of mitigation, such as spacing out sessions or asking clients to park more carefully.

Also, his house is a house. It is not a school, nor is it currently a commercial establishment. It does not meet ADA requirements. His pool does not have a lift for disabled access. It does not have a ramp for disabled access. There are innumerable other regulations that commercial establishments should follow for the safety of their customers that are not possible at this location without either complete renovation/demolition that are impractical/impossible at this location.

Lastly, I would imagine that a permitted swim school would lower our property values. For most of us, our home is our greatest asset. If approved, we would have to disclose that there is a permitted swim school on our street, which would greatly affect the sale price.

While I'm sure that Bill is a terrific swim instructor, I do not believe that Laurelvale Drive is the appropriate or safe place for a swim school. It's a quiet, residential neighborhood, that those of us who bought houses in, did so because it's a quiet, residential neighborhood. If Bill wishes to live in a commercially zoned neighborhood, he is welcome to do so, but I do not wish to do so. I urge the council to listen to the neighbors, listen to the zoning, look at the laws, and pay attention to the facts which are this - it's a residential pool, it's not a school. Schools have sprinklers, ADA access, bathrooms, parking, and so on. Residential homes Don't. There's a difference between having a swim instructor come to your house and give a lesson to you and few friends for a week or so, and running 9 hours of lessons, 6 days a weeks, for 9 months of the year at his house.

I am a resident home owner at 3530 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, Ca. I have owned and lived in this address over 30 years (since August 1986).

A couple years ago Bill Marsh, a resident and presumably home owner at 3477 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, a property the includes a swimming pool, began holding swimming classes for children. Laurelvale is a street that rises (using a map-grid basis) from low in the west to high in the east. The rise is quite steep. Sound travels uphill.

I have heard, during morning sessions of this swim school, the sound of children screaming. On one occasion the sound was so strong and the tenor of the screaming so strident that I was genuinely concerned that a child was being tortured. I walked downhill to the property from which the sounds of torture were coming and discovered, in the backyard of the property, a swimming pool with three or four adults present and one or two children also present. One child was being held in the water by an adult. I did not see any signs of harm to the child.

Laurelvale is a narrow street and it is permitted to park vehicles on both sides of the street. When two vehicles are parked across from each other it leaves barely enough room for a single third vehicle to pass between the two parked vehicles. If either (or both) of the parked vehicles are either a) too wide, b) have protrusions that are wider than the parked vehicle, or c) either vehicle is parked more than 12 inches away from the curb, it is impossible to pass between the parked vehicles.

On one occasion in the month of May, 2018, I was driving home when a personal passenger vehicle was stopped in the middle of the street, between two cars parked on each side. The driver of the vehicle was a woman. The vehicle was in front of the Marsh house. I asked the woman to please move her vehicle. She ignored my request, got out of her automobile (leaving it stopped in the middle of the street) and then moved to the rear of her vehicle where she located and then assisted in loading a young child into the rear seat of the vehicle. She buckled in the child, closed the rear door of the vehicle, then climbed into her vehicle and backed up into an available parking space that was available immediately behind the vehicle parked on the north side of the street.

On Wednesdays our trash is picked up. Three trash trucks must navigate this narrow street to pick up trash. On occasion, a trash truck will be unable to pass because of vehicles parked in front of the Marsh house. The trash truck honked its horn insistently for over 3 minutes. I knocked on the door of the Marsh house and when nobody answered the door I walked into the back yard (around the side of the house) and saw people in the swimming pool I asked them to have the car moved. The car was then move and the trash truck was able to continue on its route.

On many occasions I have heard the sound of children screaming while participating in the swim school activities.

The sound of screaming children is annoying. The disruption of traffic is also annoying.

Laurelvale is a dead-end street, in the hills of Studio City. Because of the hilly nature of the terrain sounds are contained within the hills located on both sides of the street. The hills also block noise from the city to the north. The area is physically attractive and the residents are mostly quiet and the neighborhood is peaceful.

In the event of an emergency, such as a medical emergency requiring the presence of an ambulance or a fire calling for a fire truck, the blocking of the street of Laurelvale, for which there is no outlet (I.e., a "dead-end" street) could result in a mass tragedy including possible death and/or loss and destruction of houses.

Hello Jed,

By now a few stakeholders, including yourself, have brought to my attention, as well as to that of other residents on our street, the possibility of a swimming school being permanently and officially implemented on our Street. Needless to say some of us were baffled and blindsided. The following are some of my concerns and comments regarding the matter. The following are some comments that I would like being taken into consideration and addressed.

From a transportation/traffic angle, one that I am familiar enough with having worked since the year 2000 for both the County of Los Angeles and, currently, the City of Los Angeles as a Transportation Engineer, typically schools wreak havoc on any street due to the impact first and foremost on the parking situation and loading and unloading of students. Specific loading zones and parking restrictions have usually to be implemented to suit the needs of a school. On the days I happened to be home and swimming lessons were taking place (tho I originally thought someone had a large party), parents were parking all the way up to at least my house. Most were large SUVs and our street is substandard with about 24' curb to curb. I was barely able to make it thru, and I drive a mid size sedan. Also a lot of driveways on our street are narrow and substandard (most homes on the street were mostly built in the 1950s). My fear is that, once the school in question is made permanent, residents will be unable to get in and out of their driveway due to cars parked too close and will call the city and ask for red curb around their driveway (we got dozens of such calls every month while I was in the Hollywood Wilshire District). In 99% of the cases the City will deny and ask them to enlarge their driveway. Only in 1% of the cases the driveway cannot be enlarged. Once denied, some residents will take matters in their own hands and start painting the curb red around their driveways. As you know, someone already took matters in their own hands and painted red curb in front of their house. You get my drift here. Other potential traffic impact problems is that with the presence of such school, parking on the street will get more limited for us residents (preferential parking as of now is not an option as the city implements that for an area not just a block, and no immediate area seems to have one). The city would install any parking restriction granted we submit a petition with 2/3 signatures from the stop sign all the way to the end. Now we all have to abide by the restriction we asked for whether it restricts parking for an hour or two. Unless it is preferential parking, even us the residents will have to abide by any parking restriction, while currently we have no restriction and the freedom not to worry about one.

In addition, if we have a speeding problem on the street, speed humps (the most common tool the City uses to deal with speeding on local and minor streets) are not an option in our street for 2 reasons: grade possibly over 8 % and the average daily traffic is under 500 (500 to 2000 is the range set by the city, and I have yet to see a cul de sac that carries over 500 vehicles per day). What I am trying to say thru all this is that we have a great street to be in, but if we invite trouble, the options are not great due to the grade and alignment of our street.

Being in my field, I am also sensitive to accidents. To give you an example, I was summoned along 5 other engineers last Spring for a grueling deposition about a stretch of Franklin we had all worked on. It is a 25 mph and one lane in each direction. A jogger was hit by a car going at 40 mph which resulted in permanent brain injury. The driver was first sued and the family got \$ 2.5 millions out of him. Then the family turned around and sued the city and every name that had appeared on any plan or email in the last 10 years on that stretch of Franklin was summoned for a deposition by the nastiest of lawyers. The City ended up settling out of court for \$12 millions. While driving down the street the day the swimming sessions were going, a 3-year old almost jumped in front of my car and I was going at 5 mph believe me. The risk of bodily injury is higher for all of us now that a school might be going. The website of "Swim to Bill" specifies that all prospective students are up to 2 years old only !!!!!!!

Another concern, if school in question becomes official, has to do again with parking. Emergencies can happen to all of us, regardless of age. With parents parking their big size SUVs on both sides of the street, an emergency vehicle will not be able to make it thru. The City will be sued and will come and install a double yellow center line with **Tow Away No Stopping Any Time** on one side of the street (actual scenario that I have seen happening in the City). Now we have lost half the parking on the street.....

We have all invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in renovations on all these old decaying homes we bought. In fact, some of us joke that we are a contractor's dream street. We have also just started enjoying the fruits of our labor. We did not originally sign in for that type of school/development on this street. In fact, most of us put up with grueling restorations because of the quiet and secluded nature of our street. A true paradise with mostly great families. While I could not be 100% sure not being a realtor myself, but I am suspecting allowing a school to proceed will change the nature of our quiet street and the possibility of home values taking a hit in the process might be real (A realtor has to weigh in on this).

The most baffling part is that the **Swim To Bill** people were proceeding with their plans and expanding their enrollment without any warning or regards as to the impact on the rest of us. The City of L.A. has 4 million plus residents and that is why laws and ordinances are in place, to regulate and monitor. We are not in a third world country.

Again the potential traffic and parking impact of a school going on our street is real and needs to be addressed.

To whom it may concern:

I own one of the houses that's in closest proximity to 3477 Laurelvale Dr, and I'm concerned about the impact on the neighborhood and my home value should a permit be granted to operate a private swim school at that residence.

Having owned my house (3506 Laurelvale Dr) for over 7 years, year after year I've experienced the parking and traffic problems that result from the swim school at 3477. The street is narrow, and it's a cul de sac. During periods when the classes are offered, there are between 3 and 6 additional cars on the street, some of which are driven by inconsiderate parkers. Although a few years ago our neighbor who operates the school agreed to require his clients to park on the same side of the street as his home (my house is on the opposite side), the additional cars still result in inconveniences for residents who live close and difficulties especially for the neighbors who live on that side of the street and wish to park in front of their homes.

Furthermore, the activity creates much noise and safety risks. Children are of course noisy by nature, and during the swim sessions, if the windows at my home are open, the excited screaming of the children can be heard in the house. My neighbors across the street, the Kubrins at 3501 Laurelvale, definitely are in a worse situation given how close the pool is to their property. My understanding is that the Kubrins hear the class from inside their house even with all windows closed. No one in a residential neighborhood should have to suffer this situation. Additionally, sometimes the children are not properly supervised and they dart into the street; no one on our street wants the risk of personal injury caused by the cluster of activity near 3477.

The impact of this school on my property value is also a concern. After speaking with real estate professionals and others experienced with this type

of situation, I'm convinced that if a swim school was permitted to legally operate at 3477, the value of homes on our street (especially those that are nearest to the proposed school) would be adversely affected.

For all of these reasons, and also because our street is located in a "very high" fire hazard zone, I oppose the granting of the permit.

Dear Jed;

As a seller of your personal residence you would be required to disclose to a potential buyer any material fact (Blight) you are aware of that may adversely affect the value of your property.

Most common forms of General blight are urban decay, high crime rates, tagging and graffiti and they all affect neighborhood pricing but have less impact on an individual home in the areas affected. Remedial blight such as damage to a roof or a foundation, a bee infestation, rats, termites, mold etc. will also affect value but for the most part are problems that can be corrected.

Valuable residential neighborhoods command the higher prices they enjoy based on the peace, quiet, and security they offer and if pervasive Noise is disclosed, it will damage an eventual sale.

While barking dogs or raucous party holders can be a problem, they are usually transitory in nature and can be handled with diplomacy. Homes near a Freeway, or on a busy street are generally worth considerable less than those that are not. If a property backs up to a parking lot or commercial enterprise, or is near to a night club or hotel, or any activity that has a commercial license to conduct business with attendant noise expect a reduction of 25% to 30% in your sales price.

These observations are my professional opinion based on selling residential real estate in the Hollywood Hills for the last 30 years. I hope they are helpful.

Dear Honorable City Planning Commissioners,

I hope this note finds you well. I am reaching out on behalf of Council District 4 to share our thoughts for Item 6 (CPC-2022-3413-CA), Item 7 (CPC-2022-3712-ZC), and Item 9 (CPC-2018-2223-CU), all being considered at the December 8, 2022 City Planning Commission meeting.

Item 6 (CPC-2022-3413-CA) and Item 7 (CPC-2022-3712-ZC)

One of the most incredible things about Los Angeles is that, even as a major city, it is home to a wealth of wildlife, native plants, and environmentally significant land. We are proud to represent a district that features prevalent and unique hillside geographies, most notably along the Santa Monica Mountains range. As such, we deal with numerous development challenges <u>notably</u>, <u>projects that push for out-of-scale development</u> requiring excessive grading, mature and protected tree removals, and wildlife habitat disruption. This overdevelopment not only directly negatively impacts our local ecology and wildlife, it also burdens our constituents to an untenable degree with larger projects requiring more grading, longer and more complicated construction, with the resulting mansions affordable to only the super-wealthy.

This is why having robust and effective hillside policies remains a key priority for Councilmember Raman. In the last two years, we have successfully:

- Applied Hillside Construction Regulations to three new neighborhoods;
- Co-sponsored motions and resolutions directing city departments to:
 - Develop a comprehensive regional wildlife habitat connectivity plan in partnership with neighboring jurisdictions and organizations,
 - Put together a detailed work plan and timeline for incorporating environmental justice values, metrics, and policy programs through updates to the General Plan or the creation of a standalone Environmental Justice Element,
 - Consult with the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy on any draft negative declarations and environmental impact reports under CEQA for any project within the Santa Monica Mountains Zone
 - And supported state legislation notifying counties and cities to update their local Open Space Elements by 2026.
- Instructed city departments to direct growth away from hillside areas, supported policies for open space
 preservation and opportunities for rezoning city-owned surplus land in hillside areas for open space, and
 advocated for stronger safety regulations, especially in high risk fire hazard, earthquake, and landslide prone areas
 through the proposed Housing Element, Community Plans, and Safety Element updates;

At the ground level, we dissect and weigh in on numerous development projects in the hillsides to ensure that they have gone through comprehensive environmental reviews as required and are modified to fit the needs and suitability of sensitive topographies.

The Draft Wildlife Ordinance presents a critical opportunity to create sensible regulations that help us address hillside issues and climate resiliency goals on a more systemic level. While this effort predates our time in office by many years, we are incredibly encouraged at the high level of engagement by community stakeholders, various city departments, and local and regional elected officials on this topic in order to create a practical policy.

We want to especially express our gratitude to the Planning Department for all of their work on this process. Prior to today, we worked with the Planning Department to ensure that there were comprehensive public materials, including fact sheets and maps available for residents about this ordinance and its potential impacts, which they have updated to address substantive comments, questions, concerns, and suggestions as this draft ordinance continues to take shape.

The latest Draft Wildlife Ordinance helps address key concerns from local stakeholders regarding small lots, site plan review, project definition and applicability, fencing standards, and setbacks among other components. Of note, the Ordinance includes rigorous grading standards, an overall height standard throughout the pilot area, and calculating

basements as part of the total residential floor area, all of which are important levers in controlling the size and scale of development.

For Site Plan Review, we appreciate the addition of a required biological assessment and hope there can be a consideration to reduce the review threshold size to ensure that any oversized development project is adequately captured and reviewed. We would also like to see the definition of "Open Space" in the previous version restored to include City-owned vacant land.

We respectfully ask that you consider this feedback in your deliberative process and look forward to listening in and taking note of today's discussion and public comments.

Item 9 (CPC-2018-2223-CU)

As previously shared with Department of City Planning staff, the Council Office has received concerns from immediate neighbors regarding Swim to Bill, located at 3477 North Laurelvale Drive in Studio City in the RE15-1-H zone, and the Conditional Use Permit entitlement request. To our understanding, Swim to Bill has been in operation on and off since 2010 without proper city-approved permits or approvals, including after receiving orders to comply from the Department of Building and Safety.

Constituents have shared concerns regarding: excessive and amplified noise from the school in an otherwise quiet residential neighborhood, lack of available parking along an exceedingly narrow street in a very high fire severity hillside area that terminates in a cul-de-sac, a commercial business functioning for years without proper permits or use approvals, a lack of privacy for abutting neighbors, a lack of building permits required for accessibility and code compliance, and a lack of compatibility with residential uses in the area.

As a matter of land use approval, we want to ensure that the conditions of approval adequately address grievances and concerns raised by residents, and that the conditions are set out in a way that is able to be properly monitored and enforced by our city departments. We are also aware that a proposed use such as this in a single-family residential zone is being requested in a context where companies like Swimply are increasing operations in Los Angeles.

We respectfully ask that you consider this feedback in your deliberative process.

I have been on the zoom this morning but unfortunately, I now have to go to a meeting. I am writing my comments regarding the case for William Marsh below.

Roxie Forbes died in 2019 in front of my son at summer camp in Pasadena. Almost 900 children drown every year in the US. Drowning is the #1 cause of unintentional death for children between the ages of 1-4 - with the most common cause within that being the lack of swimming ability

There are many people that teach swim lessons to children in the community, but there are not many that give the community access to true water safety classes. I was a nationally ranked competitive swimmer and used my skills to teach swimming while in college and I do not have the same set of skills that Bill Marsh has. As a result of his classes, my son survived an accidental fall into a pool at 18 months. He had opened a slider and landed himself in the pool and was able to swim to the edge. This is a priceless service. I wish families like Roxie's had had access to someone like Bill. I am forever grateful for his service in our community.

Our very narrow street does not have sidewalks, and during the time his school was operating illegally, very young children would often pop out from between parked cars with no notice, and I am afraid that continued operation will lead to a tragedy. Attempting to talk with them about the problems it was causing was met with a blank refusal of any attempt of mitigation, such as spacing out sessions or asking clients to park more carefully.

Also, his house is a house. It is not a school, nor is it currently a commercial establishment. It does not meet ADA requirements. His pool does not have a lift for disabled access. It does not have a ramp for disabled access. There are innumerable other regulations that commercial establishments should follow for the safety of their customers that are not possible at this location without either complete renovation/demolition that are impractical/impossible at this location.

Lastly, I would imagine that a permitted swim school would lower our property values. For most of us, our home is our greatest asset. If approved, we would have to disclose that there is a permitted swim school on our street, which would greatly affect the sale price.

While I'm sure that Bill is a terrific swim instructor, I do not believe that Laurelvale Drive is the appropriate or safe place for a swim school. It's a quiet, residential neighborhood, that those of us who bought houses in, did so because it's a quiet, residential neighborhood. If Bill wishes to live in a commercially zoned neighborhood, he is welcome to do so, but I do not wish to do so. I urge the council to listen to the neighbors, listen to the zoning, look at the laws, and pay attention to the facts which are this - it's a residential pool, it's not a school. Schools have sprinklers, ADA access, bathrooms, parking, and so on. Residential homes Don't. There's a difference between having a swim instructor come to your house and give a lesson to you and few friends for a week or so, and running 9 hours of lessons, 6 days a weeks, for 9 months of the year at his house.

Re: William Marsh Swimming School "Swim to Bill"

I am a resident home owner at 3530 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, Ca. I have owned and lived in this address over 30 years (since August 1986).

A couple years ago Bill Marsh, a resident and presumably home owner at 3477 Laurelvale Drive, Studio City, a property the includes a swimming pool, began holding swimming classes for children. Laurelvale is a street that rises (using a map-grid basis) from low in the west to high in the east. The rise is quite steep. Sound travels uphill.

I have heard, during morning sessions of this swim school, the sound of children screaming. On one occasion the sound was so strong and the tenor of the screaming so strident that I was genuinely concerned that a child was being tortured. I walked downhill to the property from which the sounds of torture were coming and discovered, in the backyard of the property, a swimming pool with three or four adults present and one or two children also present. One child was being held in the water by an adult. I did not see any signs of harm to the child.

Laurelvale is a narrow street and it is permitted to park vehicles on both sides of the street. When two vehicles are parked across from each other it leaves barely enough room for a single third vehicle to pass between the two parked vehicles. If either (or both) of the parked vehicles are either a) too wide, b) have protrusions that are wider than the parked vehicle, or c) either vehicle is parked more than 12 inches away from the curb, it is impossible to pass between the parked vehicles.

On one occasion in the month of May, 2018, I was driving home when a personal passenger vehicle was stopped in the middle of the street, between two cars parked on each side. The driver of the vehicle was a woman. The vehicle was in front of the Marsh house. I asked the woman to please move her vehicle. She ignored my request, got out of her automobile (leaving it stopped in the middle of the street) and then moved to the rear of her vehicle where she located and then assisted in loading a young child into the rear seat of the vehicle. She buckled in the child, closed the rear door of the vehicle, then climbed into her vehicle and backed up into an available parking space that was available immediately behind the vehicle parked on the north side of the street.

On Wednesdays our trash is picked up. Three trash trucks must navigate this narrow street to pick up trash. On occasion, a trash truck will be unable to pass because of vehicles parked in front of the Marsh house. The trash truck honked its horn insistently for over 3 minutes. I knocked on the door of the Marsh house and when nobody answered the door I walked into the back yard (around the side of the house) and saw people in the swimming pool I asked them to have the car moved. The car was then move and the trash truck was able to continue on its route.

On many occasions I have heard the sound of children screaming while participating in the swim school activities.

The sound of screaming children is annoying. The disruption of traffic is also annoying.

Laurelvale is a dead-end street, in the hills of Studio City. Because of the hilly nature of the terrain sounds are contained within the hills located on both sides of the street. The hills also block noise from the city to the north. The area is physically attractive and the residents are mostly quiet and the neighborhood is peaceful.

In the event of an emergency, such as a medical emergency requiring the presence of an ambulance or a fire calling for a fire truck, the blocking of the street of Laurelvale, for which there is no outlet (I.e., a "dead-end" street) could result in a mass tragedy including possible death and/or loss and destruction of houses.

The swim school is violating municipal code and has been cited by the LADBS because it is causing greater volume of vehicle traffic than is normal.

Laurelvale Drive is an extremely narrow street and cars have a hard time getting up and down on a daily basis. With the addition of a swim school, the traffic and parking situation would become untenable. The trash trucks are often unable to empty all of our cans on a weekly basis. I am concerned that if a swim school is permitted, emergency vehicles will not be able to make it up the street. We have several elderly residents and we live in a high fire zone. This could lead to a catastrophe.

Lastly, I would imagine that a permitted swim school would lower our property values. For most of us, our home is our greatest asset. If approved, we would have to disclose that there is a permitted swim school on our street, which would greatly affect the sale price.

Hello Jed,

By now a few stakeholders, including yourself, have brought to my attention, as well as to that of other residents on our street, the possibility of a swimming school being permanently and officially implemented on our Street. Needless to say some of us were baffled and blindsided. The following are some of my concerns and comments regarding the matter. The following are some comments that I would like being taken into consideration and addressed.

From a transportation/traffic angle, one that I am familiar enough with having worked since the year 2000 for both the County of Los Angeles and, currently, the City of Los Angeles as a Transportation Engineer, typically schools wreak havoc on any street due to the impact first and foremost on the parking situation and loading and unloading of students. Specific loading zones and parking restrictions have usually to be implemented to suit the needs of a school. On the days I happened to be home and swimming lessons were taking place (tho I originally thought someone had a large party), parents were parking all the way up to at least my house. Most were large SUVs and our street is substandard with about 24' curb to curb. I was barely able to make it thru, and I drive a mid size sedan. Also a lot of driveways on our street are narrow and substandard (most homes on the street were mostly built in the 1950s). My fear is that, once the school in question is made permanent, residents will be unable to get in and out of their driveway due to cars parked too close and will call the city and ask for red curb around their driveway (we got dozens of such calls every month while I was in the Hollywood Wilshire District). In 99% of the cases the City will deny and ask them to enlarge their driveway. Only in 1% of the cases the driveway cannot be enlarged. Once denied, some residents will take matters in their own hands and start painting the curb red around their driveways. As you know, someone already took matters in their own hands and painted red curb in front of their house. You get my drift here. Other potential traffic impact problems is that with the presence of such school, parking on the street will get more limited for us residents (preferential parking as of now is not an option as the city implements that for an area not just a block, and no immediate area seems to have one). The city would install any parking restriction granted we submit a petition with 2/3 signatures from the stop sign all the way to the end. Now we all have to abide by the restriction we asked for whether it restricts parking for an hour or two. Unless it is preferential parking, even us the residents will have to abide by any parking restriction, while currently we have no restriction and the freedom not to worry about one.

In addition, if we have a speeding problem on the street, speed humps (the most common tool the City uses to deal with speeding on local and minor streets) are not an option in our street for 2 reasons: grade possibly over 8 % and the average daily traffic is under 500 (500 to 2000 is the range set by the city, and I have yet to see a cul de sac that carries over 500 vehicles per day). What I am trying to say thru all this is that we have a great street to be in, but if we invite trouble, the options are not great due to the grade and alignment of our street.

Being in my field, I am also sensitive to accidents. To give you an example, I was summoned along 5 other engineers last Spring for a grueling deposition about a stretch of Franklin we had all worked on. It is a 25 mph and one lane in each direction. A jogger was hit by a car going at 40 mph which resulted in permanent brain injury. The driver was first sued and the family got \$ 2.5 millions out of him. Then the family turned around and sued the city and every name that had appeared on any plan or email in the last 10 years on that stretch of Franklin was summoned for a deposition by the nastiest of lawyers. The City ended up settling out of court for \$12 millions. While driving down the street the day the swimming sessions were going, a 3-year old almost jumped in front of my car and I was going at 5 mph believe me. The risk of bodily injury is higher for all of us now that a school might be going. The website of "Swim to Bill" specifies that all prospective students are up to 2 years old only !!!!!!!

Another concern, if school in question becomes official, has to do again with parking. Emergencies can happen to all of us, regardless of age. With parents parking their big size SUVs on both sides of the street, an emergency vehicle will not be able to make it thru. The City will be sued and will come and install a double yellow center line with **Tow Away No Stopping Any Time** on one side of the street (actual scenario that I have seen happening in the City). Now we have lost half the parking on the street.....

We have all invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in renovations on all these old decaying homes we bought. In fact, some of us joke that we are a contractor's dream street. We have also just started enjoying the fruits of our labor. We did not originally sign in for that type of school/development on this street. In fact, most of us put up with grueling restorations because of the quiet and secluded nature of our street. A true paradise with mostly great families. While I could not be 100% sure not being a realtor myself, but I am suspecting allowing a school to proceed will change the nature of our quiet street and the possibility of home values taking a hit in the process might be real (A realtor has to weigh in on this).

The most baffling part is that the **Swim To Bill** people were proceeding with their plans and expanding their enrollment without any warning or regards as to the impact on the rest of us. The City of L.A. has 4 million plus residents and that is why laws and ordinances are in place, to regulate and monitor. We are not in a third world country.

Again the potential traffic and parking impact of a school going on our street is real and needs to be addressed.

To whom it may concern:

I own one of the houses that's in closest proximity to 3477 Laurelvale Dr, and I'm concerned about the impact on the neighborhood and my home value should a permit be granted to operate a private swim school at that residence.

Having owned my house (3506 Laurelvale Dr) for over 7 years, year after year I've experienced the parking and traffic problems that result from the swim school at 3477. The street is narrow, and it's a cul de sac. During periods when the classes are offered, there are between 3 and 6 additional cars on the street, some of which are driven by inconsiderate parkers. Although a few years ago our neighbor who operates the school agreed to require his clients to park on the same side of the street as his home (my house is on the opposite side), the additional cars still result in inconveniences for residents who live close and difficulties especially for the neighbors who live on that side of the street and wish to park in front of their homes.

Furthermore, the activity creates much noise and safety risks. Children are of course noisy by nature, and during the swim sessions, if the windows at my home are open, the excited screaming of the children can be heard in the house. My neighbors across the street, the Kubrins at 3501 Laurelvale, definitely are in a worse situation given how close the pool is to their property. My understanding is that the Kubrins hear the class from inside their house even with all windows closed. No one in a residential neighborhood should have to suffer this situation. Additionally, sometimes the children are not properly supervised and they dart into the street; no one on our street wants the risk of personal injury caused by the cluster of activity near 3477.

The impact of this school on my property value is also a concern. After speaking with real estate professionals and others experienced with this type

of situation, I'm convinced that if a swim school was permitted to legally operate at 3477, the value of homes on our street (especially those that are nearest to the proposed school) would be adversely affected.

For all of these reasons, and also because our street is located in a "very high" fire hazard zone, I oppose the granting of the permit.

Dear Jed;

As a seller of your personal residence you would be required to disclose to a potential buyer any material fact (Blight) you are aware of that may adversely affect the value of your property.

Most common forms of General blight are urban decay, high crime rates, tagging and graffiti and they all affect neighborhood pricing but have less impact on an individual home in the areas affected. Remedial blight such as damage to a roof or a foundation, a bee infestation, rats, termites, mold etc. will also affect value but for the most part are problems that can be corrected.

Valuable residential neighborhoods command the higher prices they enjoy based on the peace, quiet, and security they offer and if pervasive Noise is disclosed, it will damage an eventual sale.

While barking dogs or raucous party holders can be a problem, they are usually transitory in nature and can be handled with diplomacy. Homes near a Freeway, or on a busy street are generally worth considerable less than those that are not. If a property backs up to a parking lot or commercial enterprise, or is near to a night club or hotel, or any activity that has a commercial license to conduct business with attendant noise expect a reduction of 25% to 30% in your sales price.

These observations are my professional opinion based on selling residential real estate in the Hollywood Hills for the last 30 years. I hope they are helpful.

Everyone who spends time with children should observe Bill Marsh's swim class. Parents, careproviders, and teachers of all disciplines would, within moments, question their own impulses and teaching methods. Even though the nature of his work is life-or-death, he works effortlessly, almost as though he is teaching without doing anything at all. Watch him for a few days and it becomes slowly evident that he is teaching children more than just how to swim -- he is teaching adults how to teach, and showing us how children really learn.

The two other children in her class became characters in our game. The impact of the morning lesson was so strong that she was moved to practice at home without realizing it.

Bill speaks to children with respect and always chooses kindness over fear-based commands. He is completely present in the water and tuned into every child's personality and needs. He will give you extra time in the pool if your child needs extra practice. Promising that your child will swim at the end of the session is not his marketing gimmick -- it is his true mission.

After nine half-hour sessions, Alice was literally smiling underwater. And we continue to practice, in Bill's style, at our pool at home. A year and a half later, Alice is still asking if she can go to "Swim With Bill" again.

Bill Marsh is a treasure to our city; there is no other swim class like his. His roster fills up immediately each year because word of mouth is so strong. We need his work. And he deserves to be able to do it wherever he thinks his students will thrive.

My name is Marnie Diamond. I do not know what we would have done if it weren't for William Marsh and Swim To Bill. In 2010, our daughter Éilis had been taking lessons from a supposedly reputable. permitted swim school in the San Fernando Valley. There weren't many swim schools in our area. other Mom's recommended this school with the warning that it wasn't very good but it was the only option in our area. However, we were excited for Éilis to learn how to swim properly, even if it was our only close option. Unfortunately, we took our daughter to this school. The owners were not friendly. They were indifferent, as if they were over it all. The instructor wasn't even friendly. She barely engaged with our daughter, which we thought was strange. She then pulled our daughter underwater, within having her in the water for only 5 minutes, without her being ready for it, without her permission. I had the pleasure of bringing both of my daughters, Julian and Jesse, to Bill Marsh's swim class in 2015 and 2017. My oldest daughter had tried a number of swim classes and teachers and by the age of 7, still could not swim. Nothing seemed to work and no one could get her comfortable in the water. She dreaded pool parties and missed out on some of the fun at camp. A friend suggested we try the "Swim to Bill" method and I am so glad she did. After just a few days in Bill's class, something clicked and my daughter was finally swimming on her own. I watched what Bill did at each lesson but I still can't explain his method. Bill has such a talent with kids that it is almost as if he is performing a magic trick in the water. I was saddened to read this email and I'm sorry that you are experiencing this push back in your neighborhood. Simply put, you have a gift in teaching kids to swim. I have met so many children over the years who are not water safe. They either have a fear of water or they have been exposed to pools and bodies of water with crutches such as floaties, rafts, their parents etc. I can remember as early as 6 months old with our firstborn (Rex), the alarms going off in my parenting mind that he needed to be water safe as young as possible. My extended family had had a drowning incident of a small child and you commonly hear about them all too often through friends, the news etc. I researched options in the L.A. area but none seemed to fit the importance of the child "learning" to swim as opposed to "enjoying" to swim. Your program was recommended to us by several referrals and I was lucky enough to get a spot. Since then, you have successfully taught two of my sons by the age off 2vr old to swim and will no doubt teach our 3rd, born a couple weeks ago. I've sat through hours of your practices, through multiples sessions a season and watched dozens of children go through the learning curve of your swim program. It's unlike so many other programs in the sense that you help children conquer their fears and build their confidence and eventually something clicks and they engage fully with the pool. In this transition they become water safe. They develop an understanding of their boundaries, their abilities to recover given those boundaries are pushed and overall enjoy the act of swimming. I am a parent and an attorney writing this letter in support of William Marsh and his Swim to Bill program. My then three year old, Essie Streets, took a two-week course in May 2017.

I regard water safety as paramount in my young children's lives. Still, I also wanted to instill in them confidence and a love for the water. I looked into dozens of programs until I found Swim to Bill. I spoke with others whose children went through his program and everyone reported the same: he is kind, respectful, and <u>effective</u>.

Mr. Marsh has a unique way of teaching swimming to young children. Unlike many short programs, he employs zero shame, coercion, or fear. With a genuinely kind demeanor, he manages to introduce children to the water in a loving and respectful way. My young daughter thoroughly enjoyed her time in his program and looked forward to attending each day.

Several months after Essie took lessons with Mr. Marsh, I put her in our local swim school to continue her swimming lessons. The instructor was blown away by her confidence in the water. At each of her first four lessons, she was promoted a level, such that by her fourth lesson, she was in Level 4. To put this in context, when my son was her age, he started his learning at the same swim school and it took him nearly 6 months to achieve Level 4. I am confident that Essie's success was in great part to Mr. Marsh's gentle introduction to the water. I am incredibly grateful that we found his program and that we left there with a water safe child after just two weeks.

I would also like to note that Mr. Marsh was abundantly clear about his expectation and requirement that parents be respectful to his neighbors, and ensured that we parked in his driveway and nowhere else at any time. The lessons were not excessively noisy in any manner, as they are limited to three children per session. The children are quietly engrossed in their swim work during the half hour they are together. It would be a great loss to the community, future young swimmers, and water safety in general if Swim to Bill were discontinued.

Our family has entrusted Bill Marsh to teach our children to swim for the past three years. I say that he teaches children how to swim, but what he is doing is giving children joy and the self-confidence they need in their own bodies.

Our eldest son was diagnosed with social anxiety and selective mutism. In a traditional swim class, he was overwhelmed, afraid, and did not make much progress. While he was slowly learning how to swim, each lesson was a struggle, and his progression was slow because of an ongoing fear of the water. We had tried many instructors at different facilities, without success. We have two kids. We tried a number of swim teachers at a variety of location types.

Our older daughter was have a very hard time learning both physically and emotionally which was strange because she loves all sports, but when it came to swimming something different was going on. Her little brother was quickly absorbing all of her emotional cues, and he became equally resistant to all swim lessons.

A close friend recommended William Marsh's "Swim to Bill" classes at Bill's house.

Swimming isn't like other sports. If my daughter freaked out about soccer, I couldn't care less--we can find other sports she loved. But swimming is also a safety concern. They have a grandmother and an aunt who have pools in their backyard.



I hope you're well. I'm writing to ask a favor because I'm desperately in need of your help if you've got the time.

Last year a neighbor tried to shut down my swimming classes by making complaints to the city. There's nothing illegal about teaching kids to swim, but this neighbor found that there is a buildings and Safety code which says if you work at your house, it has to be inside the house and only one person per hour. This prevented me from being able to teach at my house most of last summer. Needless to say this has been pretty difficult for me and my family. The code is not practical for swim teachers and the city knows this so there is a pathway to getting a permit to allow me to teach at my house again. It's very expensive and not guaranteed, but the city, inspector and the rest of my neighbors have been supportive.

Getting the permit depends largely on whether or not I have the support of the community and my swim families so. If you feel like you had a positive experience or feel like what I do is beneficial for the community; could you please send me a simple email with your opinion. The city and my legal advisors are telling me that the quantity of letters of support that I can get will greatly influence the city's decision as to wether or not they will grant the permit. If you can, please don't delay. It doesn't have to take a long time or be beautifully written but the amount of letters I can bring in to the hearing will mean a lot to the city. It will mean even more to me, my family and also to the past and future little swimmers who are about to discover the joy of moving around by themselves in the water. Thanks you so much for taking the time to consider this. Take care.

Dear City of LA Inspectors,

I am writing to express my profound support for William Marsh and his services to the community and respectfully ask that you allow him the permit to continue his swim classes.

I have two daughters who are 7 and 9 now. When each of them turned 2 years old, my husband and I signed them up for swimming classes at the local YMCA primarily out of concern for their safety. Although these classes got them used to being in the water, not much actual swimming was learned. I chalked it up to the fact that they were 2 at the time. When the younger one had finished this class, however, a friend of mine said that she had just taken her two-year-old daughter to a swim teacher in Studio City and even though her daughter cried every day for the first week, she was actually swimming to the side of the pool by the end of that first week. To Members of the City Planning Commission:

What started as a simple application to permit a commercial, home-based enterprise in this quiet hillside residential street under the home occupation ordinance has, under the Staff Recommendation Report, morphed into an unrecognizable – and mistaken – examination of whether a school is allowed to function in the neighborhood. The Staff Report turns the analysis on its head entirely, removes any discussion of the home occupation rules, and instead mischaracterizes the applicant's backyard swim lessons as a "school" that serves a salutary societal purpose.

The Commission must refocus the analysis and return to the question of the propriety of permitting a bustling, commercial, for-profit, home-based business in the applicant's backyard, that fails to comply with most of the home occupation ordinance relating to parking, number of clients, and outdoor activities. If the Commission instead continues with the wholly inappropriate "school" analysis, it sets the extremely dangerous precedent of allowing any commercial operation that offers "classes" – yoga, karate, cheerleading, fitness, music, tap dancing – or that offers a service like doggie day care, hair salons, fitness, even Buddhist sound baths – to simply declare itself a "school," evade the home occupation rules and turn even the quietest neighborhood into a humming business district. This is plainly not what the General Plan and the zoning laws contemplate.

If the Staff had properly analyzed the application pursuant to the home occupation rules, they would have been compelled to recommend denying the application both because the business necessarily violates the rules and because the significant neighbor opposition, noise, parking, traffic and fire safety hazards make any variance from those ordinances (to the extent the application can be considered seeking such a variance) unwise and unwarranted.

Executive Summary

- The Staff Report ignores the Home Occupation ordinance, LAMC §12.05A(16)
- The Staff Report mischaracterizes backyard swim lessons as a "school." The Los Angeles Municipal Code defines "school" as "An institution of learning and study required to be taught in the public schools by the Education Code of the State of California." LAMC §12.03. Plainly backyard swim lessons are not included in this definition.

- The Commission lacks jurisdiction over this application, which should be before the Zoning Administrator, because LAMC §12.24-U,24 does not apply.
- The Staff Report repeatedly relies on the alleged "continued use" of the backyard pool for swim lessons as a basis for granting the application, while ignoring that the use was *unlawful* for the duration of its existence. An applicant's history of illegal activity should not be used as a justification for granting his application. This is distinguishable from the Herrick application, where there was a history of permitted use. The Staff Report notes only one "relevant case" in which the applicant was Ordered to Comply in 2018, but fails to address the previous investigations, complaints to LADBS, violations, citations, lawsuit and resulting injunction.
- For the same reason, the CEQA Class 1 "existing use" and Class 23 "normal operations" exemptions do not apply here.
- The Staff Report fails to take into account the fire safety hazard posed by the constant additional traffic and extra parking on this quiet cul-de-sac substandard hillside street. The Report acknowledges the street is "substandard," but Staff failed to refer the issue to the LAFD to see if having a commercial operation and the extra cars in this Very High Fire Severity Zone was acceptable and whether any special plans, such as for evacuation in case of fire, would be required.
- The Staff Report drastically understates neighborhood opposition based on noise, safety, parking and traffic issues, and instead is seemingly dazzled by letters in support of the applicant's wonderful teaching skills *nearly all from people who do not live in the neighborhood*. The issue is not whether Bill is a good swim teacher. It is notable that none of the supporters stated they would be happy to have an outdoor commercial operation running next door to their own home; they just think it's fine to do in someone else's neighborhood. The finding that this purely financial arrangement somehow benefits the neighborhood is inconsistent with the significant neighborhood opposition.
- The so-called "conditions" placed on operation of applicant's commercial enterprise are illusory. Enforcement is the burden of the neighbors, there is no way to verify whether the applicant complies, there are no substantive conditions regarding noise (i.e., no wall or fencing is required, no requirement that students remain quiet), and the "Traffic Management Program" does not actually impose any conditions. Rather, it merely requires that clients be notified of the option of parking in the driveway "if possible," and simply "encourages" them to do so. It also lacks enforcement mechanisms and fails to take into account that most clients neither drop-off nor pick-up students, because they are extremely young children who must be accompanied by adults who park and walk in. The 15-minute stagger of classes and the 18-child daily limit do not adequately address the parking, safety and noise problems and are left entirely to the discretion of the applicant to ensure compliance.
- The noise test conducted has little evidentiary value because it was not conducted on site and does not take into account any site-specific conditions such as the



canyon effect, proximity to adjacent neighbors, lack of buffers, lack of other ambient noises, etc. Nor does the report indicate how many students were present or the point in the class cycle (Marsh has stated the crying and screaming tends to be far worse during the first half of the 9-day cycle).

• Despite his history of refusing to abide by regulations, conditions, and orders from the City, the Staff Report blithely accepts the applicant's assertion that his intent "is to ensure code compliance." He has repeatedly shown he has little regard for ensuring code compliance – not only because he ran this business in violation of the home occupation rules for 7 years, and not only because he simply ignored orders of the LADBS, but also because it took a court order to finally get him to stop. Indeed, he even removed the signage required in front of his house in connection with the public hearing! The applicant has established his inability or unwillingness to comply with the code or any conditions placed on him and has given no reason to believe he will behave any differently now.

1. The Staff Recommendation Report ignores the Home Occupation ordinance, LAMC §12.05(16), which governs here.

At the most basic level, the Staff Report is faulty for its failure to examine this application in light of the Home Occupation ordinance, LAMC §12.05A(16). The applicant seeks permission for a home-based commercial enterprise, no different from any other business. Though the applicant's representative asserted this was not a commercial operation, Marsh has claimed that he earns approximately \$100,000.00 per year from his swim lessons and argued in court that an injunction would cause damage to his livelihood. The proposed use here is just a business that can occur anywhere (as evidenced by the Applicant's ability to run his business elsewhere while the injunction has been in place). The applicant only wants it at his house to save money on renting a facility or driving to client's homes. He is externalizing the costs onto the neighbors so he can reap the profits. The Staff's failure even to analyze this application under §12.05 is a major error that renders the entire process defective.

In any event, as set forth more fully in my letter of October 24, 2022, to the Staff, applicant's backyard swim lessons *cannot be made compatible with the home occupation statute, no matter what conditions are placed on it.* The Los Angeles Municipal Code sets the following requirements for a home occupation, in relevant part:

- Activities may not be visible from outside of the dwelling unit;
- "The use shall be conducted within the main dwelling unit, except for truck gardening, and only by persons residing within the dwelling unit;"
- Visitors' parked cars cannot displace the use of required parking spaces;
- "The home occupation shall not generate greater vehicular or pedestrian traffic that is normal for the district in which the home occupation is located;"
- The use cannot cause a "public nuisance or disruption to the residential character of the neighborhood;"

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• "No more than one client visit, or one client vehicle, per hour, shall be permitted."

Los Angeles Municipal Code §12.05A(16). As evidenced by the CUP application itself, there is no way for the proposed use to comply with these. Applicant would have to seek a number of variances from the rules, which he has not done here. Accordingly, the Staff should have recommended denial of the application.

2. The Staff Report improperly characterizes backyard swim lessons as a "school"

To avoid the home occupation analysis, the Staff Report instead focuses on characterizing the applicant's business as a "school." Backyard swim lessons, however, are not included in LAMC's definition of school: "An institution of learning and study required to be taught in the public schools by the Education Code of the State of California." LAMC §12.03. Obviously, Marsh's backyard swim lessons do not meet this definition.

- **Single Discipline**: The applicant does not provide instruction in "several branches of learning," but rather offers only basic swim instruction to young children just learning to swim.
- Not Required by Code: Swim lessons are not "required to be taught by the Education Code of the State of California." The swim lessons are plainly more akin to other fitness or art instruction where the teacher offers instruction in a single branch of learning.
- For Profit Purpose: Perhaps more importantly, like other fitness and music classes, the swim lessons are a commercial, for-profit enterprise.

Section 12.24-U,24, the section pursuant to which the Staff chose to analyze the application, applies to the following:

- (a) Public schools, elementary and high (kindergarten through 12th grade);
- (b) Private schools, elementary and high (kindergarten through 12th grade) in the A, RE, RS, RI, RU, RZ, RMP, RW1, R2, RD, RW2, R3, C1, C1.5, or M Zones;
- (c) Private schools [other than elementary or high (kindergarten through 12th grade) or nursery school] in the A, R, CR, C1, or C1.5 zones.

Backyard swim lessons are not public or private schools and are not kindergarten through grade twelve. They are like instruction in such things as yoga, karate, cheerleading, kickboxing, basketball, pickleball, crossfit, ballet, gymnastics, pilates, horseback riding, tap dancing, tennis, tai chi, aerial silks and the like. It would frankly be absurd to consider all of these commercial operations as "schools," and backyard swim lessons are no different. Simply calling it a school is not enough. Miss Renee's School of Dance or the School of Rock would hardly qualify as a "school" under the LAMC; there is no reason Swim to Bill should either.

3. Because the backyard swim lessons are not a school, the Commission lacks jurisdiction over this application.



The Staff Report's mischaracterization of the home-based business as a school also means the Commission lacks jurisdiction to consider this application, which should properly be before the Zoning Administrator. Under §12.24-U,24, the City Planning Commission is only the initial decision-maker where an applicant seeks a conditional use permit for a "school." Because backyard swim lessons are not a school as defined by the LAMC, but rather are a simple commercial enterprise, subsection 24 is inapplicable and the City Planning Commission is not the proper initial decision-maker.

Pursuant to Los Angeles Municipal Code §12.05A(16), as made applicable by §12.07.01-A-8, residences located in Zone RE are permitted to conduct home-based occupations, provided they comply with the regulations. Thus, Marsh is allowed to conduct his swim lessons from his backyard pool so long as he has only one client per hour, does not conduct classes outside of 8 am to 8 pm, his business is not conducted outside of his dwelling and other regulations set forth in §12.06.

Because he seeks permission to vary some of those zoning rules – in particular, his classes have 3 students per half hour lesson, his two required parking spaces would be used by his swim clients and obviously swim lessons are in the pool outside of his residence – he should have proceeded under LAMC §12.27 and sought a variance. Such decisions are made by the Zoning Administrator, with an appeal to the Area Planning Commission and then to the City Council.

4. Relying on the applicant's long history of unlawful use is not a proper baseline for assessing the propriety of granting the application.

The Staff Report reaches the shocking – and frankly insulting – conclusion that Marsh's long history of illegally operating a non-conforming home business from his backyard entitles him to obtain permission now. The Commission should reject the Staff's recommendation on this point.

The Report is littered with references to the "continued use" of the property as a swim school. As an initial matter, as discussed in detail above, these backyard, for-profit swim lessons are not properly classified as a school, so the application cannot be based on any "continued use" of the property as a school.

More importantly, however, Marsh's use of the property for his swim lessons has been in violation of the home occupation ordinance since 2011. The Staff Report notes only one "relevant case" in which the applicant was Ordered to Comply in 2018, but fails to address the previous investigations, complaints to LADBS, violations and citations, or the Los Angeles Superior Court case and resulting injunction. It defies common sense to credit Marsh for his time running an unlawful business from his home and sets a dangerous precedent that would allow anyone to set up shop illegally and then claim a right to have that unlawful use receive the Commission's blessing. The Commission obviously should not reward residents for violating the law by granting their applications.

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The "continued use" approach plainly comes from the Herrick application, on which Marsh relies heavily. The differences between that application and the one at issue here are significant and render the Herrick application a poor template:

- Herrick had prior approvals and then added conditions, so calling it "continued use" was accurate and based on previous lawful use;
- Herrick had full support of neighbors, the HOA, the Valley Village Neighborhood Council and Council District 2 office;
- Herrick is located on a larger, standard street with more than one ingress and egress point;
- Herrick's pools are covered by enclosures that limited noise;
- Herrick's customers are required to park on-site; there is no off-site parking permitted.

5. CEQA Class 1 "existing use" and Class 23 "normal operations" exemptions do not apply here.

For the same reason, the Staff Report erroneously concludes both Class 1 and Class 23 exemptions apply in this instance. Though Marsh initially sought the Class 23 exemption, the Class 1 exemption was not part of his original application but apparently was added after consultation with the Staff. For either exemption, Marsh's history of illegal use should not provide the basis for applying those exemptions.

The Staff recommends finding that "The continued use of an existing swim school at a private residence qualifies for a Class 1 and Class 23 Categorical Exemption. The use is an existing facility, and its operation occurs within the site's swimming pool. The school was formerly cited for operating without permits." This recommendation requires assuming first that the use is properly categorized as a school, and then that the past use was lawful. Both are wrong.

"Class 1 consists of the operation, repair, maintenance, permitting, leasing, licensing, or minor alteration of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of existing or former use." 14 Cal Codes Reg. §15301. The examples include such things as maintaining existing landscape, altering on/off signs, minor additions to existing structures, restoring damaged structures.

Granting this exemption would require accepting the fiction that Marsh's personal single-family residence is in fact a "school" that existed for this very use in the past. In fact, however, granting this exemption would require more than a minor or negligible expansion; it would entail transformation of his home to a commercial operation. In addition, granting this exemption fails to take into consideration the changes that should be required, such as building sound barriers to ensure the "school" noise does not continue to disrupt the peaceful residential nature of the neighborhood.

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Granting this exemption also, again, requires assuming that the past use was lawful. It cannot be the position of this Commission that a project is simply exempt from environmental regulations where the applicant had been using the property unlawfully.

Similarly, Class 23 is intended for the normal operations of existing public facilities, using those facilities for the purpose for which they were designed. Examples are racetracks, stadiums, and public pools. *See* 14 Cal. Code Regs. §15323. A pool in someone's back yard is not public, nor was a backyard pool designed for the purpose of running a commercial enterprise.

In addition, though the applicant repeatedly refers to the "past use" of his backyard pool for a commercial operation as support for granting the CUP under this exemption, again *his past use was illegal*. It would be improper to exempt him from regulations based on an illegal past use, which would incentivize applicants to use properties for unlawful purposes and then rely on that past history to obtain permits. The Applicant plainly should not get any credit for his past unlawful use.

In any event, even if Class 23 did apply, there are exceptions to the categorical exemptions. Under §15300.2(a), for example, the exemption might not apply if the project is to be placed in a "particularly sensitive environment." As discussed in detail below, the Laurelvale neighborhood is considered a "Very High Fire Hazard Severity Zone," which would be categorized as particularly sensitive. Similarly, §15300.2(c) is an exception for the "reasonable possibility that the activity will have a significant effect on the environment due to unusual circumstances." Again, the operation of a commercial enterprise with increased traffic on a substandard street in a high fire zone may well qualify as an unusual circumstance.

Thus, the Staff mistakenly recommended that the project should be exempt under both Class 1 and Class 23.

6. The Staff Report fails even to consider the extreme fire safety risk the proposed use poses in this "Very High Fire Severity" zone.

Next, the Report is entirely devoid of consideration of the fire risk posed by the additional cars on this substandard cul-de-sac hillside street.

The Staff Report acknowledges the street is "substandard," despite the applicant's repeated insistence it is a standard local street. As such, and because the street is located in a "Very High Fire Severity" zone, the Staff should have referred the project to the Los Angeles Fire Department for a review, to ascertain whether having a commercial operation of this magnitude, with its approximately 18 additional cars every single weekday for 9 months of the year parking on the narrow substandard hillside street, would be acceptable, and whether any fire safety plans, such as for evacuation, would be required.

The neighborhood opposition was quite clear that the street is already difficult to navigate when there are cars parked on both sides, especially on days when trash cans are also out and especially *Attorneys & Counselors at Law*

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for those houses north of the applicant's property, closer to the cul-de sac. There is only one point of ingress and egress at the bottom of the street, often requiring the garbage and safety vehicles on the street to back down once they have entered because they do not have space to turn around. The Staff Report dismisses parking and traffic concerns based on the so-called conditions placed on parking, but as will be discussed below, those conditions are ineffectual and do nothing to address safety concerns.

Given the high fire risk on this street, the extreme drought in Los Angeles, and the sad history of fire damage to entire communities in Southern California, it would be irresponsible to grant this application where the proposed use necessitates significant additional traffic, parking and the concomitant fire safety risk they bring.

7. The Staff Report drastically understates the neighborhood opposition, opting instead to credit the opinion of customers of the business who do not live on the street and would be unaffected by the noise, increased traffic and parking issues.

A significant majority of the immediate neighbors oppose granting the application. As their letters state, those neighbors to the north of the subject property have borne the brunt of the problems – the shrieking, crying children, the blocked driveways, the kids darting out, the trash and emergency vehicles unable to turn around. Not surprisingly, of the 14 homes to the north of the Marsh property, 9 have written letters in opposition and the only one that previously supported the project has withdrawn her support. The three houses to the south that support the proposed use are separated from the Marsh home by wooded hillside and by Marsh's immediate neighbor to the south, so the noise does not travel toward their homes. In addition, for homes to the south, the pool is partially blocked by the Marsh house itself. Cars tend to park to the north of Marsh's home because the trail to the back of the house is along the north side of his property, directly abutting the immediately adjacent property.

The letters in support of Marsh as a swim teacher are admittedly a bit overwhelming; plainly Marsh is very good at his job and has high profile Hollywood celebs praising him. But most of these supporters are nothing more than satisfied customers who are not affected by the ongoing issues the neighbors must deal with. Of the numerous letters in support, only 3 come from someone who lives even close to the backyard swim lessons.¹ It is unlikely the applicant's supporters would be so enthusiastic if the swim lessons were being taught next door to their home in their own quiet, residential, private neighborhood, turning their peaceful street into a commercial center. In any event, their opinion of Marsh as a swim teacher should not be the guiding factor. (Indeed, this factor only takes on such primacy in the Staff Report because of the mistaken conclusion that this business is a "school.") The question must be, who will be directly impacted by the proposed use? As evidenced by the sold-out lessons even when Marsh had set up shop elsewhere, the customers will not be affected by the location of the business but the neighbors – especially those to the north

- will continue to suffer. The proposed finding that this purely commercial use somehow benefits the neighborhood is inconsistent with the actual neighbors' significant opposition.

8. The "conditions" recommended by the Staff Report are illusory and unenforceable and fail to ameliorate the problems raised by the affected neighbors.

Even if conditions could appropriately be imposed on this proposed use – and for all the reasons already discussed, they cannot – the conditions set forth by the Staff Report would have no effect.

First, the Staff Report suggests a "Traffic Management Program" that is not based on fact and that is not enforceable. It is merely a suggestion. The Report suggests Marsh be required to tell his customers that they may park in his driveway "if possible," and "encourages" them to do so. They are still free to park on the street wherever and whenever they please. There is no penalty for failure to park in the driveway and no way to police who parks where. Indeed, enforcement would be entirely the burden of the neighbors, who would have to complain to Marsh himself.

The traffic program also suggests that customers drop-off and pick-up in the driveway, but the reality is that these are very young children – starting at the age of about 2 years – who do not get dropped off. Instead, typically the parent or nanny must park the car, accompany the child to the pool and wait for the half-hour lesson to conclude. This is not like the drop-off and pick-up line at a typical school. In any event, drop-off at a school happens once a day; here, it is every half hour.

Next, the only noise condition is that Marsh is prohibited from playing amplified music. There are no conditions required for maintaining the quiet and peaceful nature of the neighborhood, such as building a wall or fence or planting trees that would deaden the noise emanating from the pool. Nor is Marsh even required to remind his customers to be quiet; they may shriek and cry and scream as much as they wish.

Finally, the 15-minute buffer and the 18 customer per day limitation do not adequately address the problems. Like the parking issue, enforcement of these rules is left to Marsh's discretion or the neighbor's policing. There is no way to ensure Marsh does not simply add customers or additional time slots. In any event, 18 kids a day in the pool, day in and day out every weekday for 9 months a year, is still a lot of crying, screaming kids. And a lot of extra cars on the street every day for 9 months a year.

9. The noise test at a different location is not substantive evidence of noise conditions at the subject site.

The Staff Report relies on a noise assessment conducted off-site as support for the conclusion that the 18 children per day in the pool produce little to no perceptible noise. This report must be given no evidentiary value for the following reasons:

• It was not conducted at the applicant's property;

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- It does not take into account the orientation of the pool to the neighbors' homes;
- It does not take into account the "canyon effect" of Laurelvale;
- It does not take into account the proximity of the neighbors;
- It does not take into account what types of buffers exist at the assessment site as compared to the subject site;
- It does not address differences in ambient noises between the subject and assessment sites and the likelihood those noises would mask the swim lesson noise;
- It does not indicate how many children were in the pool at the time;
- It does not indicate on what day of the swim lesson cycle the recording was made – which is significant because Marsh has explained that the children tend to scream louder and longer during the first half of the class cycle as they become accustomed to the water;
- It improperly compares the swim lesson noise to neighborhood landscaping noises, without addressing that those noises occur for a few minutes here and there, while the swim lessons take place for hours in a row, every weekday for 9 months.

The Commission should therefore reject the Staff Report's recommendation to give this noise test any weight.

10. The applicant has a long history of violating the home occupation law and has shown he cannot be trusted to comply with any conditions placed on his backyard commercial enterprise.

Finally, even if conditions could properly be placed on this use to permit a home-based commercial swim business in his backyard, the applicant has firmly established that he is unable (or unwilling) to comply. Though the Staff Report posits that Marsh's intent is "to ensure code compliance," he has repeatedly shown otherwise.

First, of course, he ignored the rules for 7 or 8 years. The applicant simply conducted his commercial operation from his home in open and obvious violation of the ordinance. Next, when he *was* cited, he continued to refuse to comply. Indeed, even after receiving an Order to Comply and paying a fine, and temporarily ceasing his business operations, he resumed his business because he believed no one would enforce the law and he could get away with it. It was only once the court entered an injunction against the applicant that he finally complied. Even then – when Marsh was required to post a sign in his yard with information about the CUP hearing, he removed the sign and the city had to force him to reinstall it.

Given the loose nature of the conditions recommended by the Staff Report and the lack of enforcement mechanisms, and the fact that Marsh will simply be trusted to comply, his history of failure to comply is overwhelming evidence that he will be unable or unwilling to comply with any conditions the Commission places on him.



For all the foregoing reasons, as well as those set forth in my October 24, 2022, letter with exhibits that is made a part of the record, on behalf of my clients Jed and Marisa Kubrin, I therefore respectfully request that the Commission reject the Staff Recommendation and vote to deny the application.
