Recommendation for Mayor and Council Action:

The Board of Recreation and Park Commissioners (Board) respectfully requests the Mayor and City Council authorize the Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) (i) to submit the Baldwin Hills and Urban Watersheds Conservancy (BHUWC) Proposition 68 Grant for the Slauson-Connect Park Project (Grant), (ii) Approve the Resolution attached as Attachment No. 1 to this Report (Resolution), and recommend City Council adopt such Resolution as required under the Grant.

Background:

On June 5, 2018, Proposition 68 (Prop 68) was passed by a majority of California voters to fund a \$4.1 billion "California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor for All Act of 2018". The purpose of Prop 68 is to fund state and local parks, beaches, environmental protection and restoration, water infrastructure, and flood protection projects. Under the Chapter 8 of Proposition 68, \$180,000,000 is allocated to the State Conservancy, Wildlife Conservation Board, and Authority Funding of which \$6,000,000 is allocated to the Baldwin Hills and Urban Watersheds Conservancy (BHUWC).

In mid-February 2023, RAP was invited to apply for the BHUWC Prop 68 Grant. The BHUWC Prop 68 Grant program would provide funds of \$2,257,000 that would benefit the BHUWC territory in one of the four categories: 1) Resource Protection and Restoration; 2) Vegetation Management and Fire Safety; 3) Visitor Serving Development and Improvement; or 4) Community Access, Education and Interpretation Projects.

SUMMARY

On June 5, 2018, Proposition 68 (Prop 68) was passed by a majority of California voters to fund a \$4.1 billion "California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor for All Act of 2018". The purpose of Prop 68 is to fund state and local parks, beaches, environmental protection and restoration, water infrastructure, and flood protection projects. Under the Chapter 8 of Proposition 68, \$180,000,000 is allocated to the State Conservancy, Wildlife Conservation Board, and Authority Funding of which \$6,000,000 is allocated to the Baldwin Hills and Urban Watersheds Conservancy (BHUWC).

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A Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) property located at 5820 Normandie Avenue, Los Angeles 90047, has been identified by Council District (CD 9) to be within the BHUWC territory. RAP has been working with CD 9 and Public Works Bureau of Engineering (BOE) to create a new park. MTA would be leasing the subject property to the City to operate and maintain the project improvements. The Project grant scope under BHUWC Prop 68 grant is as follows:

- 1) Pedestrian Paving (Walking Path within Park with Historical Trail Pavement Treatment)
- 2) Athletic, Recreational, and Playfield Areas (Resilient surfacing)
- 3) Site Development (Green/Living Walls, Site Structures, Park Site Fixture of Furniture & Equipment, excluding Self-Cleaning Restroom & Park Signage)
- 4) Landscaping (Drought Tolerant Planting, Green Infrastructure Learning Area, Turf Areas, Trees, Ground Coverings, Park Irrigation)

The project budget for the grant award is \$2,257,000. The Grant application is attached as Attachment 3 of this Report.

Although matching funds are not required, the BHUWC Prop 68 application would be more competitive by providing additional funds to the Project. Thus, the City will be committing \$1,991,000 in Proposition K funds to cover site preparation and site utilities infrastructures for this park project.

The BHUWC Prop 68 Grant application deadline is June 30, 2023.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT STATEMENT

The Los Angeles City Council approved a lease agreement between the City of Los Angeles and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transit Agency (MTA) on June 7, 2021, for the lease of land on which the City would construct a public recreation building. ("Project"). (Council file 21-0581). The Council adopted a report recommending the Project is exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act. (CEQA). Staff found that the current Project grant submittal and acceptance determination presented to the Board of Recreation and Parks Commissioners for consideration was envisioned as a component of the Project previously approved by the City Council, and thus presents no new potential environmental impacts to be independently analyzed under the California Environmental Quality Act.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

There is no anticipated fiscal impact to RAP's General Fund in connection with the application or acceptance of the Grant funds for the Slauson-Connect Park project. The maintenance of the proposed new park project will be determined when the proposed new park is completed by BOE and transferred to RAP for operation and maintenance.

WHEREAS, the Conservancy's procedures require the City Council of the City of Los Angeles to certify, by resolution, the approval of the application before submission of said application(s) to the Conservancy; and

WHEREAS, said application contains assurances that the City of Los Angeles must comply with; and

WHEREAS, the City of Los Angeles will enter into an Agreement with the Conservancy to provide funds for Slauson-Connect Park project.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES HEREBY:

- 1. Approves the filing of an application with the BHUWC for Proposition 68 Funds for the above project; and
- 2. Certifies that the City of Los Angeles understands the assurances and certification in the application form; and
- 3. Certifies that City of Los Angeles will be responsible for the operation and maintenance of the project for so long as the City has site control of the project; including, but not limited to land acquisitions, capital improvement projects, and intellectual property-related deliverables (i.e. web-based content)

- 4. Certifies that City of Los Angeles has, or will have, sufficient funds to operate and maintain the project for so long as the City has site control of the project; or has the right to assign maintenance to another agency; and
- 5. Grant Funds are to be used for planning, development, restoration, and acquisition of state and local parks, recreation areas and historical resources, and for land, air, and water conservation programs in accordance with the provisions confuned in the Proposition 68 Grant Program and this Agreement.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF GRANT Special Provisions

- 1. A resolution must be adopted by the Governing Body of the Grantee authorizing the execution of this Agreement and its terms and conditions.
- 2. Recipients of Grant Funds shall post signs acknowledging the source of the funds pursuant to the Proposition 68 signage requirements. Size, location and number of signs shall be determined by the State after consultation with Grantee and in compliance with Grantee's municipal code requirements. Required signage must be in place before Grant Funds for construction will be released.
- 3. Upon completion of detailed Project design, plans and specifications, Grantee shall provide to the State for review and approval a revised detailed Project Budget, Project Scope and detailed site plan. If Project includes habitat restoration or landscaping, Grantee shall provide a planting palette demonstrating how native vegetation will be used in the Project. Approval by the State of such plans and specifications, or any other approvals provided for in this Agreement, shall be for scope and quality of work and shall not relieve Grantee of the obligation to construct and maintain the facilities, or carry out any other obligations required by this Agreement, ir accordance with applicable law or any other standards ordinarily applied to such work or activity
- 4. Rights in Data: The Grantee agrees that all data, plans drawings, specifications, reports, computer programs, operating manuals, notes, and other written or graphic work produced in the performance of this Contract are subject to the rights of the State as set forth in this section. The State shall have the right to reproduce, publish, and use all sinch you or any part thereof, in any manner and for any purposes whatsoever and to authorize others to uo so. If any such work is copyrightable, the Grantee may copyright the same, except that, as a arrow work which is copyrighted by the Grantee, the State reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and revocable license to reproduce, publish, and use such work, or any part thereof, and to authorize there to do so.
- 5. Grantee shall comply with an 'sausfy an of the following conditions before the State will authorize Grantee to proceed with the construction of the Project:
 - A. Grantee's project representative shall present detailed progress reports as described in Section F2 of this C intract to the State during the performance period of the project. Said progress reports will be due in conjunction with requests for reimbursement and will include any changes in the By the Grantee that affect the project's design or budget.
 - B. Grantee and the State shall cooperate fully to identify and resolve issues in a timely manner and shall consult with the Conservancy for all policy decisions and guidance. Grantee shall develop new Design Development documents for the project consistent with the agreed upon scope of work as described in Exhibit A and subject to the approval of the Conservancy.

General Provisions

A. Definitions

- 1. The term "Act" means Proposition 68 California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018.
- 2. The term "Agreement" means this Grant Agreement.
- 3. The term "Application" means the individual application form, its required attachments for grants pursuant to the enabling legislation and/or program and any applicable materials supplied by applicant to the Conservancy prior to award.

- 4. The term "Application Guidelines" means the Proposition 68 Grant Guidelines and Application.
- 5. The term "CEQA" as used herein means the California Environmental Quality Act, Public Resources Code Section 21000 et seq.; Title 14, California Code of Regulations Section 15000 et seq.
- 6. The term "Contract" as used herein means a grant agreement between the State and Grantee specifying the payment of Grant Amount by the State for the performance of Work Plan within the Project Performance Period by the Grantee.
- 7. The term "Subcontractor" as used herein means any contractor or subcontractor that enters into an agreement with the Grantee pursuant to this Contract.
- 8. The term "Project Performance Period" as used herein means the period of time that the Grant Amount is available, and the time in which all work for Project that is eligible for reimbursement must be complete and billed as described on page 1 of this Contract.
- 9. The term "Project Representative" as used herein means the prison authorized by the Grantee to be responsible for the Project and is capable of making daily many Jement decisions.
- 10. The term "Design Development Documents" as used the rein reparable to detailed drawings (plans, sections, elevations, specifications, etc.) and estimated construction prepared by the Grantee.
- 11. The term "Construction Bid Package" as " see here in means the detailed drawings (plans, sections, elevations, details, specifications, etc.) and enumated construction costs from which a bidder may prepare and submit a bid and associa of budget through the public bidding process to be conducted by the Grantee.
- 12. The term "Development" mean improvement, rehabilitation, restoration, enhancement, preservation, protection and interpretation or other similar activities.
- 13. The term "Fair Marita" realized upon the property as supported by an appraisal that hat been eviewed and approved by the California Department of General Services (DGS).
- 14. The term "Grant" Grant Funds" means the money provided by the State to the Grantee in this Agreement.
- 15. The term "Grantee" means an applicant who has a signed agreement for Grant Funds.
- 16. The term "Conservancy" as used herein means the Baldwin Hills Conservancy.
- 17. The term "Interpretation" means visitor-serving amenities that communicate the significance and value of natural, historical and cultural resources in a manner that increases the understanding and enjoyment of these resources, or other similar activities.
- 18. The term "Other Sources of Funds" means cash or in-kind contributions that are required or used beyond the Grant Funds provided by this Agreement.
- 19. The term "Project" means the Development activity described in the application as modified by Exhibit A to be accomplished with Grant Funds.
- 20. The term "Project Budget" means the State approved cost estimate included as Exhibit B to this Agreement.

- 21. The term "Project Scope" means the description or activity for work to be accomplished by the Proposition 68 Grant Program.
- 22. The term "Public Agency" means any State of California department or agency, a county, city, public district or public agency formed under California law.
- 23. The term "State" means the Baldwin Hills Conservancy or its representatives, or other political subdivision of the State.
- 24. The term "Monitoring" means the periodic checking of results of works against the targets laid down in the proposal, in order to ensure the effectiveness of the funding granted through the water bond, while simultaneously ensuring the longevity and sustainability of the infrastructure implemented on its behalf.
- 25. The term "Efficiency" means the quantity of time and resources put into the project relative to the outputs and outcomes they result in.
- 26. The term "Effectiveness" means the research process' su cess in attaining the goals and objectives proposed to the Conservancy by the grantee.
- 27. The term "Appropriateness" means usefulness of the project in comparison with other means of attaining the results being sought through project implementation.

B. Project Execution

- 1. Subject to the availability of funds the Act, the State hereby grants to the Grantee a sum of money (Grant Funds) not to exceed the arrount stated on the signature page in consideration of and on condition that the sum of expended in carrying out the purposes as set forth in the description of Project in thir Agreement and its attachments and under the Terms and Conditions set forth in this Agreement.
- 2. Grantee agrees to periodic reviews by the State to determine if work is conducted in accordance with the approved Work Plan including a final review upon Project completion.
- 3. Grantee shall a rush any and all additional funds that may be necessary to complete the Project.
- 4. Grantee shall complete the Project in accordance with the Project Performance Period set forth on the signature page, unless an extension has been formally granted by the State and under the Terms and Conditions of this Agreement. Extensions may be requested in advance and will be considered by State, at its sole discretion, in the event of circumstances beyond the control of the Grantee, but in no event beyond TBD.
- 5. Grantee agrees, to acknowledge the Conservancy as a source of funds in all public and interagency correspondence and exhibits related to the Project.
- 6. Grantee shall at all times ensure the Project complies with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (Public Resources Code, Division 13, commencing with section 21000, et. seq., Cal Code Regs tit. 14, section 15000 et. seq.) and all other environmental laws, including but not limited to obtaining all necessary permits. Grant Funds will not be disbursed before the close of the period for legal challenge under CEQA.
- 7. Grant Funds for planning and document preparation may be available sooner if included in the grant Project Scope (Exhibit A) and approved by the State. CEQA compliance shall be completed within one (1) year from the Grant Agreement start date.
- 8. Changes to the scope resulting from CEQA compliance are permitted provided the State

- determines that the project continues to meet all objectives of the Proposition 68 Grant Program and is consistent with the intent cited in the original Application.
- 9. Projects must comply with Labor Code Section 1771.8 regarding the payment of prevailing wages and the labor compliance program as outlined in the Labor Code Section 1771.5 (b).
- 10. Grantee certifies that the Project does and will continue to comply with all current laws and regulations which apply to the Project, including, but not limited to, legal requirements for construction contracts, building codes, environmental laws, health and safety codes, and disabled access laws. Grantee shall certify to the State prior to commencement of construction that all applicable permits have been obtained.
- 11. Grantee shall provide access by the State upon 24 hours' notice to determine if Project work is in accordance with the approved Project Scope, including a final inspection upon Project completion.
- 12. Prior to the commencement of any work, Grantee agrees to submit in writing to the State for prior approval, any deviation from the original Project Scope per Exhibit A and the Application. Changes in Project Scope must continue to meet the need cited in the original application or they will not be approved. Any modification or alteration in the Project approved. Any modification on file with the State must be submitted to the State for approved. Any modification or alteration in the Project must also comply with all current laws and regulation, in adding but not limited to CEQA.
- 13. Grantee shall provide for public access to the Project in accordance with the intent of the Act.
- 14. If acquisition of land is involved, grater must have (1) fee title, (2) leasehold, or (3) other interest to Project lands and demonstrate to the satisfaction of the State that the proposed Project will provide public benefits had any commensurate with the type and duration of the interest in land. Any acquisition of the opening so the part of eminent domain proceedings.
- 15. Grantee shall promptly provide photographs of the site during and after implementation of Project at the request of the State

C. Progress Reports

- 1. Grantee shall sure Progress Reports on a quarterly basis, at minimum, during Project implementation.
- 2. Progress Reports must be received and up-to-date before Payment Requests will be processed for payment.

D. Project Costs

- 1. Any Grant Funds provided to Grantee under this Agreement will be disbursed for eligible costs, on a reimbursement basis, as follows, but shall not exceed in any event the amount set forth on the signature page of this Agreement:
 - a. Up to ten percent (10%) of the reimbursement amount will be held back as a retention and issued as a final payment upon completion of the Project.
 - b. Remaining Grant Funds shall be paid up to the total amount of the Grant Funds or the actual Project cost, whichever is less, upon completion of the Project, receipt of a detailed summary of Project costs from the Grantee found to be satisfactory by the State, and the satisfactory completion of a site inspection by the State.
- Indirect and overhead costs shall not exceed 10% of the Grant Amount.

- 3. Except as otherwise provided herein, the Grantee shall expend Grant Funds in the manner described in the Project Budget approved by the State. The dollar amount of an item in the Project Budget may be increased by up to ten percent (10%) through reallocation of funds from another item or items, without approval by the State; however, the Grantee shall notify the State in writing when any such reallocation is made, and shall identify both the item(s) being increased and those being decreased. Any increase or decrease of more than ten percent (10%) in the amount of an item must be approved in writing by the State. In any event, the total amount of the Grant Funds may not be increased, nor may any adjustments exceed the limits for preliminary costs as described in the program's grant guidelines.
- 4. Grant funds in this award have a limited period in which they must be expended. All Grantee expenditures must occur during the Performance Period of the Contract and must be submitted for reimbursement within ninety (90) days of the Performance Period expiration date.

E. Payment Documentation:

- 1. All payment requests must be submitted using a complead ray...ent Request Form, attached as Exhibit C. This form must be accompanied by arritemized list of all expenditures that clearly documents the check numbers, dates, recipients, enprise pay rates and rate sheets, line-item description as described in the Project Budget approved by the State and amounts. Each payment request must also include proof of payment such as receipts, paid invoices, canceled checks or other forms of documentation demonstrating payment is sheen made.
- 2. Any payment request that is submitted with ut the required itemization and documentation will not be authorized. If the payment request perchage is incomplete, inadequate or inaccurate, the State will inform the Grantee and hold to any nent request until all required information is received or corrected. Any penalties impused on the Grantee by a contractor, or other consequence, because of delays in payment will be paid by the Grantee and is not reimbursable under this Agreement.
- 3. Any overpayment of Grant Amount in excess of final project costs shall be returned to the State within 60 days of comple ion of the Project or the end of the Project Performance Period as shown on the signature page, whichever is earlier

F. Project Administration

- 1. Grantee shall promptly submit written Project reports, deliverables and/or photographs upon request by the State. In any event Grantee shall provide the State a report showing total final Project expenditures with the final payment request and required closing documents.
- 2. Grantee agrees to provide all technical and administrative services as needed for Contract completion; monitor and review all work performed; and coordinate budgeting and scheduling to assure that the Contract is completed within budget, on schedule, and in accordance with approved procedures, applicable laws, and regulations.
- 3. Grantee ensures that the Contract requirements are met through regular communication with the State and progress reports. The State reserves the right to require reports more frequently than on a quarterly basis if necessary, but no more than once a month.
 - a. The progress reports shall describe activities undertaken and accomplishments of each task during the quarter, milestones achieved, and any problems encountered in the performance of the work under this Contract. The description of activities and accomplishments of each task shall be in sufficient detail to provide a basis for payment of invoices. Progress reports should directly address tasks, timelines, deliverables, milestones, and associated costs scheduled in the Plan referencing deliverables in Exhibit A.

- b. The accompanying expenditure report should reflect tasks and deliverables in the quarterly progress report, including the projected costs associated with completion of remaining tasks. The sum of all quarterly expenditures should equal that of the approved Grant Amount. If at any point the Grantee exceeds the budgeted amount for completion of a task, it will be the Grantee's responsibility to notify the State and document steps taken to resolve the variance.
- 4. Disclosure Requirements include the following disclosure statement in any document, written report, or brochure prepared in whole or in part pursuant to this Contract:

"Funding for this project has been provided in full or in part through a Contract with the Baldwin Hills Conservancy (BHC) pursuant to the California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018

(Proposition 68),

The contents of this document do not necessarily reflect the views and policies of the BHC, nor does mention of trade names or commercial products constitute endorsement or recommendation of use."

- 5. Grantee shall use its best efforts to notify the State at 'east ten (10) working days prior to any public or media event publicizing the accomplishments a d'ar recults of this Contract and provide the opportunity for attendance and participation by PUC representatives.
- 6. Grantee must document steps taken in soliciting at a awarding any first-tier subcontracts and submit them to the State for review and document all subcontractor activities in quarterly reports.
- 7. At the completion of this Project the C antr a Project Representative shall fill out and provide a project certification form to the State, that led as Exhibit D.
- 8. Grantee shall make property a u fac lities acquired or developed pursuant to this Agreement available for inspection upon eques by me State.
- 9. Grantee shall use any non a econed by the Grantee from use of the Project to further Project purposes, or, if approved by the state, for related purposes within the jurisdiction.
- 10. Grantee shall submit all cocumentation for Project completion, including a notice of completion as applicable and has reimbursement within ninety (90) days of Project completion, but in no event, any later than **TBD**.
- 11. Final payment is contingent upon State verification that Project is consistent with Project Scope as described in Exhibit A, together with any State approved amendments.
- 12. This Agreement may be amended by mutual agreement in writing between Grantee and State. Any request by the Grantee for amendments must be in writing stating the amendment request and reason for the request. The Grantee shall make requests in a timely manner and in no event less than thirty (30) days before the effective date of the proposed amendment.
- 13. Grantee must document expenditures and account for all sources of other funds for the Project for review by the State.
- 14. Grantee indirect costs shall not exceed 10% of the project budget

G. Maintenance

 The Grantee shall maintain and operate the facility and structures constructed or improved as part of the Project throughout the normal life of the Project or up to 20 years, consistent with the purposes for which this Grant was made. Grantee has the right to assign maintenance and operation to the property owner or other agency pursuant to a Memorandum of Understanding or contract with the responsible entity prior to the end of the project performance period.

H. Project Termination

- 1. Prior to the completion of Project construction, either party may terminate this Agreement by providing the other party with thirty (30) days' written notice of such termination.
- 2. If the State terminates without cause the Agreement prior to the end of the Project Performance Period, the Grantee shall take all reasonable measures to prevent further costs to the State under this Agreement. The State shall be responsible for any reasonable and non-cancelable obligations incurred by the Grantee in the performance of the Agreement prior to the date of the notice to terminate, but only up to the undisbursed balance of funding authorized in this Agreement.
- 3. If the Grantee fails to complete the Project in accordance with this Agreement, or fails to fulfill any other obligations of this Agreement prior to the termination date, the Grantee shall be liable for immediate repayment to the State of all amounts disbursed by the State under this Agreement, plus accrued interest and any further costs related to the Project time State may, at its sole discretion, consider extenuating circumstances and not require chayment for work partially completed provided that the State determines it is in the State's best in are a to do so. This paragraph shall not be deemed to limit any other remedies available to the State for breach of this Agreement.
- 4. Failure by the Grantee to comply with the rems of this Agreement or any other Agreement under the Act shall be cause for suspension challed ligations of the State hereunder.
- 5. Failure of the Grantee to comply vit. the terms of this Agreement shall not be cause for suspending all obligations of the Serie persunder if, in the judgment of the State, such failure was due to no fault of the Grantee. A the discretion of the State, any amount required to settle at minimum cost any irrevolable obligations properly incurred shall be eligible for reimbursement under this Agreement.
- 6. Because the ben fit to the derived by the State, from the full compliance by the Grantee with the terms of this Agreement is the acquisition of land for development and restoration of state and local parks, recontinuous and historical resources, and for land, air, and water conservation programs for the prople of the State of California, and because such benefit exceeds to an immeasurable and unascertainable extent the amount of money furnished by the State by way of Grant Funds under the provisions of this Agreement, the Grantee agrees that payment by the Grantee to the State of an amount equal to the amount of the Grant Funds disbursed under this Agreement by the State would be inadequate compensation to the State for any breach by the Grantee of this Agreement. The Grantee further agrees therefore, that the appropriate remedy in the event of a breach by the Grantee of this Agreement shall be the specific performance of this Agreement, unless otherwise agreed to by the State.
- 7. Final payment may not be made until the Project conforms substantially to this Contract as determined by the State.

Contingencies

1. Both parties agree that any contingency costs that are eligible for reimbursement shall be shared equally between the State and the Grantee until all State Grant Funds have been exhausted.

J. Loss of Grant Amount

1. The following actions may result in (1) the loss of all the Grant Amount allocated to Grantee that has not been disbursed or has been disbursed but has not yet been spent for project purposes,

- or, (2) if a balance exists after Grant Funds have been disbursed and spent for project purposes, the following actions may require Grantee to return to State all remaining Grant Amount:
- A Grantee fails to return a signed Contract with the State within 60 days of receipt of the Contract.
- b. A Grantee fails to produce a Work Plan for approval by the State within 90 days of signing a Contract with the State.
- c. A Grantee fails to produce a Work Plan that is consistent with California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018 and the intent of State's objectives as stated in authorizing statute (Public Resources Code, Sections 79730-79738).
- d. A Grantee fails to complete the Project.

K. Hold Harmless

- 1. Grantee shall waive all claims and recourses against the Since, including the right to contribution for loss or damage to persons or property arising from, a wing sut of or in any way connected with or incident to this Agreement, except claims arising from the gross negligence of State, its officers, agents and employees.
- 2. Grantee shall indemnify, hold harmless and deriver State, its officers, agents and employees in perpetuity against any and all claims, demands, damages, costs, expenses or liability costs arising out of the Project, including Development and construction of the property described in the Project description which claims, demands or causes of action arise under Government Code Section 895.2 or otherwise, including but not limited to items to which the Grantee has certified, except for liability arising out of the gross near gence of State, its officers, agents or employees. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Grantee or its authorized managing agency of the Project site shall assume full responsibility for the operation and maintenance of the Project upon certification of the completion of construction by the Grantee acknowledges that it is solely responsible for compliance with items to which it has certified.
- 3. Grantee and Six's agree that in the event of judgment entered against the State and Grantee because of the grant negligence of the State and Grantee, their officers, agents or employees, an apportionment of liability to pay such judgment shall be made by a court of competent jurisdiction. Neither party shall request a jury apportionment.

L. Financial Records

- Grantee shall maintain satisfactory financial accounts, documents and records for the Project and to make them available to the State for auditing at reasonable times. Grantee shall also retain such financial accounts, documents and records for three (3) years after final payment and one (1) year following an audit.
- 2. Grantee agrees that during regular office hours, the State and its duly authorized representatives shall have the right to inspect and make copies of any books, records or reports of the Grantee pertaining to this Agreement, other matching funds, or matters related thereto. Grantee shall maintain and make available for inspection by the State accurate records of all of its costs, disbursements and receipts with respect to its activities under this Agreement.
- 3. Grantee shall use applicable Generally Accepted Accounting Principles, unless otherwise agreed to by the State.

M. Audit

- 1. Projects are subject to audit by the State for three years following the final payment of Grant Amount. The purpose of this audit is to verify that project expenditures were properly documented. Grantees will be contacted at least 30 days in advance of an audit.
- Audit will include all books, papers, accounts, documents, or other records of the Grantee, as they
 relate to the Project for which the State authorized Grant Amount. The Grantee shall have the
 Project records, including the source documents and cancelled warrants, readily available to the
 State.
- 3. The Grantee must also provide an employee having knowledge of the Project and the accounting procedure or system to assist the State's auditor. The Grantee shall provide a copy of any document, paper, record, or the like requested by the State.
- 4. All Project records must be retained for at least one year following an audit or final disputed audit findings.

N. Nondiscrimination

- 1. The Grantee shall not discriminate against any pers in red, the basis of sex, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (reducing HIV and AIDS), mental disability, medical condition (cancer), age (over 40), no rital status, and denial of family care leave in the use of any property or facility acquired or use allowed pursuant to this Agreement.
- 2. The Grantee shall not discriminate against my person on the basis of residence except to the extent that reasonable difference in admission or other fees may be maintained on the basis of residence and pursuant to law.
- 3. The completed Project ar. all related facilities shall be open to members of the public generally, except as noted under the special revolutions of this Agreement or under provisions of the Act.

O. Application Incorporation

The Grant Guidelin's and the Application and any subsequent changes or additions to the Application approved in writing by he State are hereby incorporated by reference into this Agreement as though set forth in full in this Agreement.

P. Severability

If any provision of this Agreement or the application thereof is held invalid, that invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Agreement which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this Agreement are severable.

Q. Amendments

Except as otherwise provided herein, no alteration or variation of the terms of this Contract shall be valid unless made in writing and signed by the parties hereto, and no oral understanding or agreement to be incorporated herein shall be binding on any of the parties hereto.

R. Waiver

No term or provision hereof will be considered waived by either party, and no breach excused by either party, unless such waiver or consent is in writing and signed on behalf of the party against whom the waiver is asserted. No consent by either party to, or waiver of, a breach by either party, whether

expressed or implied, will constitute consent to, waiver of or excuse of any other, different or subsequent breach by either party.

S. Assignment

Except as expressly provided otherwise, this Agreement is not assignable by the Grantee either in whole or in part.



Project Site Map: INSERT MAP



Slauson Connect Park Project PROJECT SCHEDULE





This community lacks park and recreational access for the residents. It is one of the disadvantage and underserved community in South Los Angeles. According to the 2016 Los Angeles Countywide Comprehensive Park & Recreation Needs Assessment (Study Area #164), the County of Los Angeles has determined this location to be in a "Very High Need) study area for park access. The surrounding area consists of mostly industrial, commercial buildings/businesses and residential homes along the very congested intersection of Normandie Avenue and Slauson Avenue.

Another issue is that there is a lack of safety for pedestrians and bicyclists who must travel along the Slauson Avenue corridor. According to a 2014 Feasibility study, the lack of sidewalks along Slauson Avenue posed a risk for pedestrians and the lack of bike facilities exposed bicyclists using Slauson Avenue to riding constrained, unsafe on-safe conditions, and competing with heavy and fast-moving vehicular traffic. Pedestrians and bicyclists face substantial risks for injury since the interception of Slauson and Normandie is part of a high injury network according to the City of LA's High Injury Network project (HIN). The HIN project indicates that nearly half of the High Injury Network streets (such as Slauson/Normandie) are in communities burdened with the poorest health outcomes and economic conditions. This lack of safe transportation network disadvantages youth, families, individuals with disabilities, and seniors who live near Slauson and Normandie to safely access parks and recreation.

With the new park, it will provide an open space area that will include historical and botanical education opportunities along the path, Discovery Garden for outdoor classroom, a habitat garden with bee hotels/bird houses, and a picnic area; a multipurpose plaza with basketball hoop; and flexible lawn area with mounds. It will also provide a safe access to recreation and a safe transportation network to connect the community to greater Los Angeles City and County.

One of the other challenges that this community faces due to the lack of green spaces its air and other environmental pollution. According to CalEnviroScreen 3.0, "people of color and low income Californians are more likely to live in areas with higher toxic chemical releases." For the residents near the Slauson Connect project site, deleterious toxic release percentile for this census tract is higher than 76.32% of the census tracts in California for the presence of toxic air chemicals that may be released by facilities and industries. The particulate matter (PM2.5) percentile for this census tract is higher than 84% of the census tracts in California and its prevalence exposes residents to air concentration that may include organic chemicals, dust, soot and metals. Furthermore, the drinking water contaminant percentile is higher than 79% of the census tracts in California. The prevalence of these environmental contaminants reflects an urgent need to mitigate these poor environmental conditions through greater carbon sequestration by planting trees and urban greenery as well as providing safe cleaner water and sustainable environmental practices as envisioned in the Slauson Connect project.

The project will plant new trees, grass areas, and landscapes that will increase carbon sequestration and provide a cooler microclimate through shade and evapotranspiration. The new Slauson Connect park will have an underground cistern that will provide safe, clean, water use and promote water conservation. Further, new drinking fountains and bottle fillers within the park will be installed to provide clean drinking water to park visitors.

The Slauson Connect Park project will provide the community access and safety to a new park and recreation amenities such as outdoor learning area, and picnic area for social gathering. The project will plant trees and add landscaping, to mitigate carbon sequestration and to provide shades.

The Slauson-Connect project which includes the community center and the park, has integrated the Southern Pacific Trails project as part of the Slauson-Connect project. The Southern Pacific Trails project scope is for the beautification of the railroad right-of-way, landscaping trails, and irrigation. Because of its location, it became part of the Rail to River Active Transportation Project. As part of the Rail to River Active Transportation Project, new environmental practices implemented will be consistent with the Upper Los Angeles River Watershed Management Group (ULAR EWMP) goals for green infrastructure programs to provide multiple benefits to the communities of South Los Angeles. The City of Los Angeles is a major coordinating stakeholder in ULAR EWMP. Urban Greening: The project will plant new trees, grass areas, and landscapes that will increase carbon sequestration and provide a cooler microclimate through shade and evapotranspiration. The entire Segment A section of the Rail to Rail project (6 miles) which includes Slauson Connect will plant approximately 7.5 acres of landscaping including 600 trees. Clean and Efficient Water Management: The new Slauson Connect park will have an underground cistern that will provide safe, clean, water use and promote water conservation. Further, new drinking fountains and bottle fillers within the park will be installed to provide clean drinking water to park visitors. The Rail to River Active Transportation Project will install new landscaping along Slauson Avenue with low impact development and nature-based solutions such as infiltration planters, biofiltration and hybrid infiltration areas to reduce water pollutants. This will help ensure that green infrastructure makes up over 58 percent of the control measure capacity in the EWMP to be implemented by 2028. Energy Efficiency and Sustainability: The City of Los Angeles Department of Recreation and Parks (RAP) will use sustainable practices that minimize carbon emissions to mitigate effects of climate change. In addition, Proposition 68 projects' regional benefits will advance the City's Green New Deal policies to create a "more sustainable, equitable city." Among the highest standards set by any city, the Green New Deal calls for a 50% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions by 2025 and increasing tree canopy in low-income, severely heat impacted areas by at least 50% by 2028.

The project will have matching funds of \$13,245,200 from Proposition K to fund the Site Preparation, Site Utilities, Electrical Site Improvements, and Site Communications and to fund other the community center and other project scope that will not be cover by the Baldwin Hills Conservancy Proposition 68 grant scope.

The project site, located at 5820 Normandie Boulevard, begins at the Northeast corner of Slauson Avenue and Normandie Boulevard, and stretches east to Budlong Avenue. The overall project site is approximately 81-foot-wide by 1,250-foot-long (or approximately 0.24 mile), totaling approximately 101,250 square feet or 2.32 acres. The project site for the new Slauson Connect park is an abandoned and unused freight railroad right of way. The site was formerly used as a railway line. However, the alignment has since been abandoned and the site is now a right of way owned by Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA). Thus, the site has never been used as a park. Further, the project site is not adjacent to an existing park. The nearest park is Harvard Park which is 0.7 miles away. The current project site will be converted to a new park (Slauson Connect) along the Rail to River Active Transportation Project which will link neighborhoods, schools, and other key destinations through the heart of South Los Angeles.

The site will be leased by MTA to the City via the Department of General Services (GSD) as the contract administrator for the ground lease. The lease agreement addresses a 50- foot wide by 1,250- foot long swath of the site, for the Project. The remainder of the site, 31 foot wide by 1,250' long, will be developed by METRO as part of their River 2 Rail Project.

California Conservation Corps and Certified Community Conservation Corps Proposition 68 – Parks, Environment and Water Bond Guidelines Corps Consultation Process

Applicants for grants from the Conservancy for restoration and ecosystem protection projects <u>shall</u> consult with representatives of the California Conservation Corps (CCC) and the California Association of Local Conservation Corps (CALCC), the entity representing the certified community conservation corps, (collectively, "the Corps") to determine the feasibility of the Corps participation.

Applicants seeking funds for Proposition 68 projects should consult with representatives of CCC AND CALCC (hereafter collectively referred to as Corps) to determine the feasibility of the Corps' participation. **Both CCC and CALCC must be consulted prior to application submission**.

The Corps have developed the following consultation process:

Step 3: Within five (5) business days of receiving the project information, CCC and CALCC representatives will review the submitted information, contact the

applicant if necessary and respond to the applicant with a Corps Consultation Review Document (template attached) informing them:

- (1) It is NOT feasible for CCC and/or certified community conservation corps services to be used on the project; or
- (2) It is feasible for CCC and/or certified community conservation corps services to be used on the project and identifying the aspects of the project that can be accomplished with Corps services.

Note: While the Corps will take up to five (5) business days to review projects, applicants are encouraged to contact CCC/CALCC representatives to discuss the Corps' project costs and feasibility **early in the project development process**.

The Corps cannot guarantee a compliant review process for applicants who submit project information fewer than five (5) business days before an application deadline.

- Step 4: Applicant submits application and Corps Consultation Review Document to Funder. If the Corps determine their participation is feasible, the applicant must describe the project components involving Corps in the application and provide an estimated budget for that component.
- Step 5: Funder reviews applications. Applications with documentation demonstrating that the Corps have been consulted will be given preference for a receipt of grant.

NOTE: Applicants that have been awarded funds for projects where the Corps has determined Corps services can be used must thereafter work with either CCC or CALCC to develop a scope of work and enter into a contract with the appropriate Corps.

The Corps have determined that it is not feasible to use their services on projects that do not include field work. Only projects without field work are exempt from the consultation process and do not need to submit the Corps Consultation Form to Funding Entities.

Compliance with Public Resources Code Section 80001(b)(5)

Public Resources Code Section 80001(b)(5) requires to the extent practicable, that projects provide workforce education and training, contractor, and job opportunities for disadvantaged communities. Partnering with Corps will provide workforce education, training and job opportunities for the young adult members of Conservation Corps.
