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What we've learned...

Participants have communicated:

- Reduced stress and anxiety
- Ability to meet basic needs
- Reduced income instability, allowing households to plan for the future
- More liquidity to pay for unexpected expenses
- Ability to pay down their debt
- Leveraged GBI support to find full-time employment
- Supplemental income provided significant relief to underpaid workers, especially care workers, who are primarily women of color
