Comments for Public Posting: August 10, 2023 Due to a last-minute meeting time change at my workplace, I'm unable to make the following remarks to the Ad Hoc Committee on City Governance Reform in person today: ***
First impressions are important. My first impression of democracy happened in DC in 2010, when I cast my first ever vote for my ONE local representative and two of FOUR at-large members on the 14 member DC City Council. My first impression of LA democracy happened in 2021, when my ONE and only city representative, in a city more than FIVE times' DC's size, had her district, District 4, radically altered just after I elected her to office. Angelenos deserve as much democratic power as I had when I lived in DC, and the injustice done to all Angelenos and Councilmembers by a tainted redistricting process has not yet been made right. I'm asking this committee to: + swiftly move to expand the Council to at least 35 members, to get voters closer to the same representative proportions as our nation's capital, + immediately study the addition of an at-large membership model, so each Angeleno can have more than one person on the Council represent their interests, and + conduct a new round of redistricting enhanced with all necessary ethical reforms as soon as possible, so that in five years' time, when the entire democratic world's eyes are on us, LA and its government can make a great first impression. *** I now also ask the committee to please ensure that all matters of governance reform that so dramatically affect all City residents offer remote public comment. Those working during normal business hours, or otherwise limited in their ability to attend, should be able to deliver their public comment with the same weight as as those able to attend in person. Comments for Public Posting: We are writing on behalf of KIWA (Koreatown Immigrant Workers Alliance). We are based in City Council District 10. Founded in 1992, KIWA builds power with immigrant workers and renters to bring about a more just and equitable Los Angeles. We organize workers, particularly in the restaurant and retail industries, to improve their working conditions, with an understanding of the deep connections between labor and housing justice. We are writing alongside AAPI Equity Alliance in solidarity with our coalition partners at OUR LA calling for racial equity as we re-envision aspects of our city's charter. We can't have racial equity without considering all communities. The Asian Pacific Islander (API) population makes up 12% of the city population, and we are rapidly growing. At 15 seats, there are no districts in which APIs make up more than 25% of the voters. The current size of the Los Angeles City Council was decided by voters in 1925 when Los Angeles was notably less equitable, diverse, and populated. We have a unique opportunity to change the makeup and size of our council districts and restore political power to those left out. According to modeling by OUR LA and Fair Rep LA, we see that 23 districts is the minimum number of seats for AAPI and Black voters to see the possibility of creating districts in which we make up a critical mass of 35% or more. While we support increasing council size to at least 23, we are cautious about council sizes beyond 31. Modeling shows that having 31 districts is the point at which it becomes harder to keep Koreatown whole. As a multiracial worker center based in Koreatown for over 30 years, we urge you to respect our wishes to use Koreatown's size of around 115,000 individuals as a minimum size for district populations, and no smaller than that. The task of drawing maps must be done by an independent redistricting commission, equipped with resources to actively and consistently outreach to our hardest-to-reach communities. In order to bring about city governance guided by racial equity, the city must ensure that the people most affected and most marginalized—particularly low-income people, unhoused people, communities of color, recent immigrants, speakers of English as a second language – have a say in the decisions that affect their lives. Again, we urge you to pass independent redistricting and increase council size to between 23-31 seats to create a more

equitable and representative LA.
