#### RECOMMENDED ACTIONS

1. That the Board of Police Commissioners (Board) REVIEW and APPROVE this report;

- 2. That the Board TRANSMIT the attached grant application, pursuant to Administrative Code Section 14.6(a), to the Mayor, Office of the City Administrative Officer (CAO), Office of the Chief Legislative Analyst, City Clerk for Committee, and City Council consideration;
- 3. That the Board REQUEST the Mayor and City Council to:
  - A. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to retroactively apply for and subsequently ACCEPT the grant award for the 2022 California Coverdell Program in the amount of \$124,859 for the period of April 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024, from the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (Cal OES);
  - B. AUTHORIZE the Chief of Police or his designee to negotiate and execute the grant award agreement, subject to City Attorney approval as to form and legality;
  - C. AUTHORIZE the Controller to set up a grant receivable and appropriate \$124,859 to appropriation account, account number to be determined within Fund No. 339, Department No. 70, for the receipt and disbursement of the Cal OES 2022 Coverdell Program in accordance with the grant award;
  - D. AUTHORIZE the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) to spend up to \$124,859 in accordance with the grant award agreement;
  - E. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to submit grant reimbursement requests to the grantor and deposit grant receipts into Fund No. 339, Department No. 70;

F. AUTHORIZE the Controller to increase appropriations for Cal OES's 2022 Paul Coverdell Program as needed from appropriation account number to be determined in Fund No. 339, Department No. 70, to Fund No. 100, Department No. 70, account number and amount as follows:

G. AUTHORIZE the LAPD to prepare Controller's instructions for any technical adjustments, subject to the approval of the CAO, and AUTHORIZE and INSTRUCT the Controller to implement the instructions.

#### DISCUSSION

The Cal OES has allocated \$124,859 of the 2022 Cal OES Coverdell Program grant funding to the LAPD. The goal of the program is to improve the quality, timeliness, and efficiency of forensic science services. This grant will be used to fund overtime, fringe benefit and related costs to complete backlogged and incomplete cases within the Forensic Science Division (FSD). The overtime will also be used to allow analysts to respond to crime scenes on an emergency basis, and train new firearm analysts within the FSD from April 1, 2023 through June 30, 2024.

The grant award will provide \$89,200 for the Firearms Analysis Unit; \$28,303 for the Narcotics Analysis Unit; and, \$7,356 for fringe benefit and related costs for civilian overtime to be used to improve the overall efficiency, quality, and timeliness within FSD. No matching funds are required for this grant.

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must comply with all applicable laws, regulations, policies, and official DOJ guidance (including specific cost limits, prior approval and reporting requirements, where applicable) governing the use of federal funds for expenses related to conferences (as that term is defined by DOJ), including the provision of food and/or beverages at such conferences, and costs of attendance at such conferences.

Information on the pertinent DOJ definition of conferences and the rules applicable to this Grant Subaward appears in the DOJ Grants Financial Guide (currently, as section 3.10 of "Postaward Requirements" in the "DOJ Grants Financial Guide").

#### 9. Requirement for Data on Performance and Effectiveness under the Grant Subaward

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must collect and maintain data that measure the performance and effectiveness of work under this Grant Subaward. Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must provide data (within the required timeframes) specified by OJP, Cal OES, and other applicable written guidance. Data collection supports compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010, and other applicable laws.

#### 10. Determination of Suitability to Interact with Participating Minors

This condition applies to the Grant Subaward (if it is indicated) when some or all of the activities to be carried out under the Grant Subaward (whether by Subrecipients, or Second-Tier Subrecipients) is to benefit a set of individuals under 18 years of age.

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must make determinations of suitability before certain individuals may interact with participating minors. This requirement applies regardless of an individual's employment status.

#### 11. Compliance with DOJ Grants Financial Guide

#### 12. Encouragement of Policies to Ban Text Messaging while Driving

Pursuant to Executive Order 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," 74 Fed. Reg. 51225 (October 1, 2009), the DOJ encourages Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) to adopt and enforce policies banning employees from text messaging while driving any vehicle during the course of performing work funded by this Grant Subaward, and to establish workplace safety policies and conduct education, awareness, and other outreach to decrease crashes caused by distracted drivers.

# 13. Compliance with General Appropriations-law Restrictions on the use of Federal Funds (FY 2022)

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must comply with all applicable restrictions on the use of federal funds set out in federal appropriations statutes. Should a question arise as to whether a particular use of federal funds by Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) would or might fall within the scope of an appropriations or law restriction, Subrecipients are to contact Cal OES for guidance, and may not proceed without the express prior written approval of Cal OES.

#### 14. Potential Imposition of Additional Requirements

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) agree to comply with any additional requirements that may be imposed by the DOJ awarding agency (OJP or OVW, as appropriate) during the period of performance for this Grant Subaward, if Subrecipients are designated as "high-risk" for purposes of the DOJ high-risk grantee list.

#### 15. Employment Eligibility Verification for Hiring under the Grant Subaward

- a. Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must:
  - Ensure that, as part of the hiring process for any position within the United States that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with Grant Subaward funds, Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) properly verify the

employment eligibility of the individual who is being hired, consistent with the provisions of 8 U.S.C. 1324a(a)(1).

- 2) Notify all persons associated with Subrecipients (or any Second-Tier Subrecipients) who are or will be involved in activities under this Grant Subaward of both:

#### b. Monitoring

#### c. Allowable costs

To the extent that such costs are not reimbursed under any other federal program, Grant Subaward funds may be obligated for the reasonable, necessary, and allocable costs (if any) of actions designed to ensure compliance with this condition.

#### d. Rules of construction

1) Staff involved in the hiring process

For purposes of this condition, persons "who are or will be involved in activities under this Grant Subaward" specifically includes (without limitation) any and all Subrecipient officials or other staff who are or will be involved in the hiring process with respect to a position that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with Grant Subaward funds.

2) Employment eligibility confirmation with E-Verify

For purposes of satisfying the requirement of this condition regarding verification of employment eligibility, Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) may choose to participate in, and use, E-Verify (www.e-verify.gov), provided an appropriate person authorized to act on behalf of the Subrecipient (and any Second-Tier Subrecipient) uses E-Verify (and follows the proper E-Verify procedures, including in the event of a "Tentative Nonconfirmation" or a "Final Nonconfirmation") to confirm employment eligibility for each hiring for a position in the United States that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with Grant Subaward funds.

- 3) "United States" specifically includes the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands of the United States, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.
- 4) Nothing in this condition shall be understood to authorize or require Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients), or any person or other entity, to violate any federal law, including any applicable civil rights or nondiscrimination law.
- 5) Nothing in this condition, including in paragraph 4.B., shall be understood to relieve Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) or any person or other entity, of any obligation otherwise imposed by law, including 8 U.S.C. 1324a(a)(1).

# 16. Restrictions and Certifications Regarding Non-disclosure Agreements and Related Matters

No Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) under this Grant Subaward, or entity that receives a procurement contract or subcontract with any funds under this Grant Subaward, may require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information.

The foregoing is not intended, and shall not be understood by the agency making this Grant Subaward, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

- a. In accepting this Grant Subaward, Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients):
  - Represent that they neither require, nor have required, internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and
  - 2) Certify that, if they learn, or are notified, that they have, or have been, requiring their employees or contractors to execute agreements or statements that prohibit or otherwise restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict), reporting of waste, fraud, or abuse as described above, they will immediately stop any further obligations of Grant Subaward funds, will provide prompt written notification to Cal OES, and will resume (or permit resumption of) such obligations only if expressly authorized to do so by Cal OES.
- b. If Subrecipients are authorized under this award to make Second-Tier Subawards, procurement contracts, or both:
  - 1) Subrecipients represent that:
    - a) No other entity (whether through a Second-Tier Subaward ("subgrant"), procurement contract, or subcontract under a procurement contract) that they pass funds to either requires or has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and

# 17. Reclassification of Various Statutory Provisions to a New Title 34 of the United States Code

On September 1, 2017, various statutory provisions previously codified elsewhere in the U.S. Code were editorially reclassified (that is, moved and renumbered) to a new Title 34, entitled "Crime Control and Law Enforcement." The reclassification encompassed a number of statutory provisions pertinent to OJP awards (that is, OJP grants and cooperative agreements), including many provisions previously codified in Title 42 of the U.S. Code.

Effective as of September 1, 2017, any reference in this award document to a statutory provision that has been reclassified to the new Title 34 of the U.S. Code is to be read as a reference to that statutory provision as reclassified to Title 34. This rule of construction specifically includes references set out in award conditions, references set out in material incorporated by reference through award conditions, and references set out in other award requirements.

#### 18. OJP Training Guiding Principles

Any training or training materials that the Subrecipient (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) – develops or delivers with OJP award funds must adhere to the OJP Training Guiding Principle for Grantee and Subgrantees available at https://ojp.gov/funding/Implement/TrainingPrinciplesForGrantees-Subgrantees.htm.

#### 19. All Grant Subawards must have Specific Federal Authorization

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must comply with all applicable requirements for authorization of any Grant Subaward. This condition applies to agreements that -- for purposes of federal grants administrative requirements -- OJP considers a "Grant Subaward" (and therefore does not consider a procurement "contract").

The details of the requirement for authorization of any Grant Subaward are posted on the OJP website at https://ojp.gov/funding/Explore/SubawardAuthorization.htm.

# 20. Requirements Related to System for Award Management and Universal Identifier Requirements

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must comply with applicable requirements regarding the System for Award Management (SAM), currently accessible at https://www.sam.gov/. This includes applicable requirements regarding registration with SAM, as well as maintaining the currency of information in SAM.

Subrecipients also must comply with applicable restrictions for Second-Tier Subawards, including restrictions on Grant Subawards to entities that do not acquire

and provide (to Subrecipients) the unique entity identifier required for SAM registration.

#### 21. Restrictions on "Lobbying"

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must comply with all applicable requirements to obtain specific advance approval to use a noncompetitive approach in any procurement contract that would exceed the Simplified Acquisition Threshold (currently, \$250,000). This condition applies to agreements that – for purposes of federal grants administrative requirements – OJP considers a procurement "contract" (and therefore does not consider a subaward).

# 23. Requirements Pertaining to Prohibited Conduct Related to Trafficking in Persons (including reporting requirements and OJP Authority to Terminate Grant Subaward)

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must comply with all applicable requirements (including requirements to report allegations) pertaining to prohibited conduct related to the trafficking of persons, whether on the part of Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients), or individuals defined (for purposes of this condition) as "employees" of Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients).

#### 24. Reporting Potential Fraud, Waste, and Abuse, and Similar Misconduct

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must promptly refer to Cal OES any credible evidence that a principal, employee, agent, Subrecipient, contractor, subcontractor, or other person has, in connection with funds under this Grant Subaward— (1) submitted a claim that violates the False Claims Act; or (2) committed a criminal or civil violation of laws pertaining to fraud, conflict of interest, bribery, gratuity, or similar misconduct.

Potential fraud, waste, abuse, or misconduct involving or relating to funds under this Grant Subaward must also be reported to Cal OES. Additional information is available from the DOJ OIG website at https://oig.justice.gov/hotline.

#### 25. Limit on Use of Grant Funds for Grantees' Employees' Salaries

With respect to this Grant Subaward, federal funds may not be used to pay cash compensation (salary plus bonuses) to any employee of the Grant Subaward recipient at a rate that exceeds 110% of the maximum annual salary payable to a member of the federal government's Senior Executive Service (SES) at an agency with a Certified SES Performance Appraisal System for that year. (A Grant Subaward recipient may compensate an employee at a higher rate, provided the amount in excess of this compensation limitation is paid with non-federal funds.)

This limitation on compensation rates allowable under this Grant Subaward may be waived on an individual basis at the discretion of the OJP official indicated in the program announcement under which this Grant Subaward is made.

#### 26. Information and/or Data Requests

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) agree to cooperate with any assessments, national evaluation efforts, or information or data collection requests, including, but not limited to, the provision of any information required for the assessment or evaluation of any activities within this project.

#### 27. Published Written and Web-based Materials

Subrecipients shall provide the Cal OES Program Specialist with a copy of any curricula, training materials, proposed publications, reports, or any other written materials that will be published, including web-based materials and website content, resulting from this Grant Subaward at least forty-five working days prior to the targeted dissemination date. Any written, visual, or audio publications, with the exception of press releases, whether published at the grantee's or government's expense, shall contain the following statements: "This project was supported by Grant No. CQ22 19 7250 , awarded by the Bureau of Justice Assistance. The Bureau of Justice Assistance is a component of the Department of Justice's Office of Justice Programs, which also includes the Bureau of Justice Statistics, the National Institute of Justice, the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the Office for Victims of Crime, and the SMART Office. Points of view or opinions in this document are those of the author and do not necessarily represent the official position or policies of the U.S. Department of Justice."

#### 28. Press Releases

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) shall transmit to the Cal OES Program Specialist copies of all official award-related press releases at least fifteen working days prior to public release. Advance notice permits time for coordination of release of information by Cal OES where appropriate and to respond to press or public inquiries.

#### 29. Copyright; Data rights

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) acknowledge that OJP reserves a royalty-free, non-exclusive, and irrevocable license to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and authorize others to use (in whole or in part, including in connection with derivative works), for Federal purposes: (1) any work subject to copyright developed under a Grant Subaward; and (2) any rights of copyright to which a Subrecipient (at any Second-Tier Subrecipient) purchases ownership with Federal support.

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) acknowledge that OJP has the right to (1) obtain, reproduce, publish, or otherwise use the data first produced under a Grant Subaward; and (2) authorize others to receive, reproduce, publish, or

otherwise use such data for Federal purposes. "Data" includes data as defined in Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) provision 52.227-14 (Rights in Data – General).

It is the responsibility of the Subrecipient (and any Second-Tier Subrecipient) to ensure that the provisions of this condition are included in any Grant Subawards (and any Second-Tier Subrecipient) under this award.

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) have the responsibility to obtain from Subrecipients, contractors, and subcontractors (if any) all rights and data necessary to fulfill the Subrecipient's obligations to the Government under this Grant Subaward. If a proposed Subrecipient, contractor, or subcontractor refuses to accept terms affording the Government such rights, the Subrecipient shall promptly bring such refusal to the attention of the Cal OES Program Specialist for the Grant Subaward and not proceed with the agreement in question without further authorization from Cal OES.

#### 30. Generally Accepted Laboratory Practices

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) shall ensure that any forensic laboratory, forensic laboratory system, medical examiner's office, or coroner's office that will receive any portion of the Grant Subaward uses generally accepted laboratory practices and procedures as established by accrediting organizations or appropriate certifying bodies.

#### a. External Investigations

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) shall ensure that requirements associated with 34 U.S.C. section 10562(4) (which relate to processes in place to conduct independent external investigations into allegations of serious negligence or misconduct by employees or contractors) are satisfied with respect to any forensic laboratory system, medical examiner's office, coroner's office, law enforcement storage facility, or medical facility in the State that will receive a portion of the grant amount.

#### b. Accreditation

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) shall ensure that any forensic laboratory or forensic laboratory system (not including any medical examiner's office or coroner's office) that will receive any portion of the award either is accredited, or will use a portion of this award to prepare and apply for accreditation by not more than two years from the award date of this award.

Additionally, with respect to accreditation, the Subrecipient (and any Second-Tier Subrecipient) shall ensure that for any Grant Subaward it makes under this award, it will require in a legally-binding and enforceable writing, such as the Grant

Subaward documentation (for example, Grant Subaward terms and conditions), that its Subrecipient: (1) if accredited, must continue to demonstrate such accreditation as a condition of receiving or using the Grant Subaward funds; or (2) if not accredited, must use the Grant Subaward funds to prepare and apply for accreditation.

The Coverdell statute (see 34 U.S.C. section 10562(2)) and the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program solicitation state certain requirements and guidance associated with proper accreditation and regarding what BJA will consider to be acceptable documentation of accreditation. The Subrecipient is to contact the Cal OES Program Specialist for clarification or guidance if it should have any question as to what constitutes proper accreditation for the purposes of the Coverdell program. Grant Subaward funds may not be used under this Grant Subaward by a forensic laboratory or forensic laboratory system with accreditation (or by such laboratory to obtain accreditation) that BJA determines not to be consistent with the Coverdell law and the solicitation or to be otherwise deficient.

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) agree to notify Cal OES promptly upon any change in the accreditation status of any forensic science laboratory or forensic laboratory system that receives funding under this Grant Subaward.

#### 31. Use of Funds; No Research

Funds provided under this Grant Subaward shall be used only for the purposes and types of expenses set forth in the Request for Application. Funds shall not be used for general law enforcement functions or non-forensic investigatory functions, and shall not be used for research or statistical projects or activities. Use of Grant Subaward funds for construction of new facilities is restricted by statute. Any questions concerning this provision should be directed to the Cal OES Program Specialist prior to incurring the expense or commencing the activity in question.

To ensure compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (Pub. L. No. 103-62) and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010 (Pub. L. No. 111-352), program performance under this Grant Subaward is measured by the following: (1) percent reduction in the average number of days from the submission of a sample to a forensic science laboratory to the delivery of test results to a requesting office or agency (calculated by reporting the average number of days to process a sample at the beginning of the grant period versus the average number of days to process a sample at the end of the grant period); (2) percent reduction in the number of backlogged forensic cases (calculated by reporting the number of backlogged forensic cases at the beginning of the grant period versus the number of backlogged forensic cases at the end of grant period), if applicable to the Grant Subaward; and (3) the number of forensic science or medical examiner/coroner's

office personnel who completed appropriate training or educational opportunities with these Coverdell funds, if applicable to the Grant Subaward. Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) are required to collect and report data relevant to these measures.

#### 32. Forensic Science or Medical Examiner Services Fees

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) understand and agree that, throughout the Grant Subaward Performance Period, it must promptly notify Cal OES if it either starts or stops charging fees for forensic science or medical examiner services, or if it revises its method of allocating fees received for such services to program income. Notice must be provided in writing to the Cal OES Program Specialist within fifteen business days of implementation of the change.

#### 33. External Investigations

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) acknowledge that, as stated in the solicitation for the Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement Grants Program, BJA assumes that Subrecipients (and Second-Tier Subrecipients) of Coverdell funds will make use of the process referenced in their certification as to external investigations and will refer allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results to government entities with an appropriate process in place to conduct independent external investigations, such as the government entity (or entities) identified in the grant application. The Subrecipient shall submit the following information as part of its final report: (1) the number and nature of any allegations of serious negligence or misconduct substantially affecting the integrity of forensic results received during the Grant Subaward: (2) information on the referrals of such allegations (e.g., the government entity or entities to which referred, the date of referral); (3) the outcome of such referrals (if known as of the date of the report); and (4) if any such allegations were not referred, the reason(s) for the non-referral. Should the project period for this award be extended, the Subrecipient shall submit the above information as to subsequent twelve-month periods every twelve months thereafter (as part of a semiannual progress report) until the close of the Grant Subaward, at which point the Subrecipient shall submit the required information as to any period not covered by prior reports as part of its final report. The Subrecipient understands and agrees that funds may be withheld (including funds under future awards), or other related requirements may be imposed, if the required information is not submitted on a timely basis.

### 34. Subrecipient Integrity and Performance Matters

Subrecipients (and any Second-Tier Subrecipients) must comply with any and all applicable requirements regarding reporting of information on civil, criminal, and administrative proceedings connected with (or connected to the performance of) either this OJP award or any other grant, cooperative agreement, or procurement

contract from the federal government. Under certain circumstances, Subrecipients of OJP awards are required to report information about such proceedings, through the federal System for Award Management (known as "SAM"), to the designated federal integrity and performance system (currently, "FAPIIS").

#### **Budget Narrative**

The City of Los Angeles (City) - Los Angeles Police Department's (LAPD) Forensic Science Division (FSD) proposes to use the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services' 2022 Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement (CQ) Program grant funds on personnel costs to support the following objectives: (1) improve the quality and timeliness of the forensic science services provided to the City of Los Angeles (City) by the Firearm Analysis Unit (FAU); and (2) reduce the number of incomplete and/or backlogged cases in the FAU and the Narcotics Analysis Unit (NAU). The total funding requested is \$124,859.

The 2022 CQ grant program will be implemented by the current FSD organizational and operational structure and supported by the LAPD Grants Section, who will coordinate grant and reporting requirements.

The grant funds will support direct services. The proposed expenditures under this grant will be solely used by the respective FSD units to support the objectives of the grant program. There will be no shared cost allocation. All personnel allocations will be used to support the objectives of the grant program.

Subcontractors may be utilized in FSD but will not be subject to these grant funds.

No unusual expenditures are anticipated. All salary adjustments have been included in the Personnel budget allocations.

#### Personnel: \$116,859

#### 1. Overtime – Firearm Analysis Unit (FAU)

Due to the number of new personnel who need to be trained, along with calls for emergency crime scene response, FAU personnel works overtime to manage the number of incomplete and/or backlogged cases. Since City funds are extremely limited for overtime, FAU staff are typically compensated with 1.5 hours of time-off for every overtime hour worked. This is counterproductive when trying to reduce a backlog and complete cases within a timely manner. Providing cash overtime will enable the analysts to work the needed extra hours without being required to take time-off.

The FSD plans to allocate \$89,200 of the 2022 Coverdell funds for overtime hours, plus \$5,584 in fringe and related costs for overtime, for FAU personnel to work on casework analysis, NIBIN tasks, field activities during emergency crime scene response, and training activities for both trainers and trainees. These additional work hours will improve the quality and timeliness of FAU services and reduce the number of incomplete requests in the FAU.

Casework: The grant funds will provide cash overtime to Criminalists, Firearm

Examiners, and Laboratory Technicians in the FAU to work on cases, reducing the number of incomplete requests for analysis and pending National Integrated

Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) requests by approximately 223 cases, or approximately 29% of the number of requests for complex analysis received by FAU each year.

On average, a FAU request (including analysis and NIBIN tasks) takes 4 work hours to complete. The average hourly rate for a senior FAU analyst is \$66.67 and the average overtime rate is \$100 per hour. The overtime calculation is:

4 hours per case x \$100/hour = \$400 per case

\$400 per case x 223 cases = \$89,200

The projected 223 cases completed on overtime may be decreased by the funds used to pay for emergency crime scene response and training activities.

<u>Crime Scene Response:</u> As needed, the grant funds may be used to provide cash overtime for emergency crime scene responses, making analysts available to perform analysis during regular work hours.

<u>Training:</u> As needed, the grant funds may be used to provide cash overtime to new trainees and trainers to expedite training activities and the development of fully trained FAU analysts. The duties of FAU forensic scientists – *Criminalists*,

Firearm Examiners, and Laboratory Technicians – include microscopic analysis
and comparison of bullets and cartridge cases, gun processing and test-firing,

investigations, and general processing of firearms evidence. Criminalists assigned
to the FAU are required to possess a bachelor's degree in a natural or physical
science, Firearm Examiners are required to possess a bachelor's degree, and
Laboratory Technicians are trained to perform NIBIN tasks. All staff need training
and must demonstrate their qualifications to perform scientific and technical work
by successfully completing a series of competency examinations as well as
annual proficiency tests.

# 2. Overtime – Narcotics Analysis Unit (NAU)

Due to the number of new personnel who need to be trained, along with method development and validations and calls for Hazardous Chemicals Team response, NAU personnel work overtime to manage the number of incomplete and/or backlogged cases. Since the City funds available are extremely limited, NAU staff are typically compensated with 1.5 hours time-off for every overtime hour worked. This is counterproductive when trying to complete cases within a timely manner and avoid a backlog. Providing cash overtime will enable the analysts to work the needed extra hours without being required to take time-off.

The FSD plans to allocate **\$28,303** of the 2022 CQ Program funds for overtime hours, plus **\$1,772** in fringe and related costs for overtime, for NAU personnel to work on casework analysis. These additional work hours will improve the quality and timeliness of NAU services and reduce the number of incomplete requests in the NAU.

Casework: The grant funds will provide cash overtime to Criminalists and Laboratory Technicians in the FAU to work on cases, reducing the number of incomplete requests for analysis by approximately 153 cases, or approximately 2.5% of the number of requests for complex analysis received by NAU each year. On average, a NAU request takes 2 work hours to complete. The average hourly rate for a senior NAU analyst is \$66.67 and the average overtime rate is \$100 per hour. The overtime calculation is:

1.5 hours per case x \$100/hour = \$150 per case

\$150 per case x 188.68 cases = ~ \$28,303

The projected 188.68 cases completed on overtime may be decreased depending on the complexity of analysis needed for each request.

#### **Project Narrative**

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

The Los Angeles Police Department's (LAPD) Forensic Science Division (FSD) provides forensic science services for the City of Los Angeles (City). The FSD Laboratory conducts a full array of evidence analysis and crime scene processing services for crimes being investigated by the LAPD as well as local, County, State, and Federal agencies on a limited basis. The FSD Laboratory has maintained continuous accreditation since 1998 and currently remains in good standing with the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) National Accreditation Board (ANAB). In June 2019, ANAB performed a full accreditation assessment and renewed the FSD Laboratory's accreditation in the Field of Forensic Testing and Calibration, encompassing the following disciplines: Biology, Crime Scene Investigation, Document Examination, Firearms and Toolmarks, Fire Debris and Explosives, Footwear/Tire, Gunshot Residue, Materials (Trace), Seized Drugs, and Toxicology. In April 2022, after the completion of an annual surveillance assessment, ANAB approved continuance of the FSD Laboratory's accreditation.

The FSD Laboratory is comprised of seven units: Field Investigation Unit (FIU), Firearm Analysis Unit (FAU), Narcotics Analysis Unit (NAU), Serology/DNA Unit (SDU), Trace



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Analysis Unit (now includes Questioned Documents services), Toxicology Unit (TOX), and a Quality Assurance Unit (QA). The FSD has authorization for 199 positions but is currently staffed with 175 employees and is working to fill the 24 vacancies. The FSD Laboratory serves a department of 9,200 police officers and a city of approximately four million people. The City has been experiencing overall increases in violent crime and weapons arrests since 2019, as shown in Table 1.

# LAPD's Plan for Improving the Quality and Timeliness of Forensic Science

The LAPD is seeking \$124,859 in grant funding under the 2022 Paul Coverdell Forensic Science Improvement (CQ) Program to implement the 2022 LAPD



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Coverdell Program. The proposed program intends to improve the quality and timeliness of FSD's analyses of firearms and narcotics by providing casework and training overtime hours and by adding vital equipment to its operations.

The following actions will be taken:

# A. Improve quality, timeliness, efficiency, and eliminate backlog with <u>Firearm</u> <u>Analysis</u>

The LAPD plans to reduce the number of incomplete and backlogged cases in the FAU by providing additional work hours for training activities, casework, and emergency crime scene response by FAU staff.

The FAU performs examinations and comparisons of microscopic markings on fired cartridge cases and bullets, serial number restorations, renders firearms safe, conducts scientific investigations at shooting scenes, and provides expert testimony in court. Additionally, the FAU is responsible for entering firearms and shooting evidence into the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN), a national database managed by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, to compare digital images of fired cartridge cases and bullets found at crime scenes or test-fired from confiscated weapons. Since 2015,



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the LAPD has been especially focused on expanding the use of NIBIN to provide comprehensive entry of evidence items from LAPD's 21 geographical divisions. This effort has resulted in significant annual increases in the NIBIN volume processed by FAU, increases in the number of investigative leads ("Cold Hits") generated, and increases in comparison requests to confirm the Cold Hits. The most recent trends are presented in Table 2.

Although the number of NIBIN Cold Hits continue to increase, the FAU experienced a notable decrease in comparison requests and other formal analyses in 2022. This decrease is likely linked to fewer violent crime and firearm-

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related charges going to trial this past year; however, the FAU still continues to manage the largest backlog in the laboratory and requests for FAU analysis are anticipated to increase. Furthermore, increasing NIBIN entry remains a current goal of the LAPD and the FAU is actively working to acquire additional NIBIN equipment and staff before further expansion in 2023.

Overtime Hours for Casework, NIBIN Tasks, Training, and Emergency Crime Scene Response

The FAU has historically maintained the largest backlog in the FSD Laboratory for well over a decade. This is due to the general increases in requests for service, insufficient number of fully trained firearm analysts, and a lengthy multi-year training program. In response, the LAPD hired 15 new criminalists for FAU over the past few years and re-assigned other laboratory staff to the unit. Currently, the FAU is actively training 12 analysts in various FAU analyses, and is anticipated to fill four vacancies in 2023, bringing the total number of trainees to 16. On average, new employees need approximately 4,200 training hours in the various aspects of firearm analysis including microscopic comparisons, crime scene response, and tasks to support NIBIN. The training program in FAU is administered by FAU's senior staff (including case-carrying examiners, technical leads, and supervisors). Due to



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this demand, senior staff are less available to complete their regular assignments which include casework, organizing and developing training modules, updating training manuals, and other projects. Alternately, when there is an increase in case load and crime scene demands, training schedules are impacted – this is especially true with the increases in NIBIN entries where newer trainees are often redirected to complete NIBIN tasks. Through the 2022 LAPD Coverdell Program, additional hours will be provided for casework, emergency crime scene response, and training activities.

Previous Coverdell funds were used to provide overtime for these activities and have greatly benefited the FAU. In 2020, the FAU managed to eliminate a decades-old backlog due to the assistance of CQI Program funding, but the demand for FAU services continued to increase and the FAU is, once-again, experiencing a backlog. The FAU workload is presented in Table 3.

The FSD Laboratory considers "backlog" to include all cases not completed within 90 days. As such, the FAU backlog has been slowly increasing since 2020 and is presently at 42 requests, 3 of which are unassigned due to lack of trained firearm examiners.

With four Supervising Criminalists, four technical leads, and four senior examiners, the FAU is balancing requests for technical analyses while also focusing on training 12 new Criminalists in the various firearm analyses. The trainees are often redirected to assist five Police Officers with the daily NIBIN tasks, which further limit their formal training efforts. Additional FAU trainees are anticipated to join the unit before this grant period begins, further adding to the need for overtime funds.



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The FAU personnel are anticipated to work on approximately 189 cases, while also continuing to train new staff and respond to crime scenes. However, the actual number of cases completed under the 2022 LAPD CQ Program may decrease when funds are needed for other vital activities such as emergency crime scene work or training activities, which include organizing, developing, and updating training manuals, and conducting new analyst training. Nonetheless, the completion of these activities will significantly increase the FAU's overall efficiency.

#### B. Improve timeliness and efficiency with Narcotics Analysis

The Narcotics Analysis Unit (NAU) tests evidence for the presence of controlled substances listed in Schedules I-V of the California Health and Safety Code and some controlled substances listed in the U.S. Code. Drugs that are frequently identified by NAU include cocaine, cocaine base, methamphetamine, heroin, PCP, MDMA (ecstasy), cannabis, concentrated cannabis, hydrocodone, and oxycodone. Some NAU staff also serve on the Department's Hazardous Chemical Team, which is responsible for responding to clandestine laboratories, weighing and packaging of larger seizures of suspected narcotics, booking and transport of compressed gas cylinders, and assisting in other non-routine narcotics



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issues. Due to local, state, and federal laws, evidence must be analyzed within two business days of seizure, which requires NAU to operate at peak efficiency every day.

In the past three years, the NAU lost four senior staff due to attrition and the multiple vacancies could not be filled until recently. The NAU staff are struggling to balance casework analysis with other duties, including training four new Criminalists, performing instrument maintenance, validating new test methods, and Hazardous Chemical Team duties. Lack of trained staff and a 16% increase in responses by the Hazardous Chemicals Team have negatively impacted the average turnaround time (TAT) for NAU casework, as presented below in Table 4.

The NAU personnel are anticipated to work on 201.5 cases, while also continuing to train new staff, develop and validate new methods, and respond to service calls for Hazardous Chemical Team. However, the actual number of cases



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completed under the 2022 LAPD Coverdell Program may decrease depending on the complexity of analysis needed for each request. Nonetheless, the availability of overtime funds for casework will increase NAU's overall timeliness and efficiency in meeting customer needs.

#### How the Program Will be Used to Benefit the Community

The grant funds will allow for more accurate analysis and expeditious testing. This improved quality and timeliness will assist LAPD Detectives in solving cases in a timely manner and thereby gaining trust from the community.

#### Plan for Maintaining Accreditation

Accreditation is the result of an extensive commitment of resources by the management and personnel of the entire laboratory. Accreditation demonstrates to our customers – including law enforcement agencies, the judicial system, and public – that the laboratory continues to meet established quality requirements. The FSD is committed to good professional practices and to provide the highest-level quality of service to the criminal justice system. The Quality Assurance Unit (QA) is responsible for administering and monitoring the quality system of the laboratory, which includes training. This ensures that all staff



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performing casework successfully complete training programs that are thorough and thoroughly documented and all work performed meets established accreditation requirements.

#### Plan for Training Forensic Staff

The FSD is committed to use available funds to complete training programs for each analyst so it can perform more casework activities.

#### How the Objectives of the Program Will be Met

The LAPD will provide fiscal and administrative oversight over the 2022 LAPD Coverdell Program. The FSD has successfully managed the Coverdell Program grant awards for over 17 years. The FSD management, headed by Ms. Kristina Takeshita, LAPD Coverdell Program Project Director and FSD Laboratory Director, will ensure that all program objectives will be met. The LAPD's Grants Section has extensive experience in managing and overseeing federal, state, and local grant projects. LAPD Grants Section consists of a Grant Manager and six Grant Analysts to oversee and report on over 30 active grants ranging from \$100,000 to \$9,000,000. The Grants Section will be responsible for all grant-related purchases as well as adhering to and submitting all grant requirements.


