At its meeting held on September 28, 2023, the L.A. for Kids Steering Committee approved the recommendations of the attached Office of the City Administrative Officer report as amended, which is hereby transmitted for Council consideration, subject to the concurrence of the Mayor. Adoption of the report would authorize; 1) staff to identify and transfer unspent funds remaining for completed projects; 2) the work completed by external funding sources as having satisfied the Proposition K scope; 3) the use of the Proposition K program surplus funding capacity to offset the funding shortfalls projected for future specified projects; 4) the tentative earmark of \$9.0 million in Proposition K program interest funds to reduce the shortfall for four specified projects; 5) the Controller to adjust balances within the Proposition K funds and implement technical adjustments; and 6) the CAO to prepare technical adjustments as necessary.

The Proposition K: L.A. for Kids Program is currently in its 27<sup>th</sup> year of a 30-year authority, during which the City is authorized to collect up to \$25 million in annual assessments for a total funding of \$750 million over the life of the program. The program was established in November 1996, by passage of the Proposition K Ballot Measure approved by City voters, with allowable funding use restricted to capital development of youth recreational and cultural facilities, along with associated administrative and maintenance expenses.

To plan for the program's successful completion, the program management team has prepared a reconciliation of the first 26 years of the Proposition K program, status updates on completed, active and phased projects, and policy consideration and funding recommendations for accomplishing the remaining Proposition K funding requirements.

There is no additional impact on the General Fund as the funding commitments recommended through the report recommendations are funded by Special Fund monies. Specific cost estimates for operating and maintaining the projects addressed through the funding recommendations of this report have not yet been developed, but will be addressed through the City budget as projects are completed.

PROJECTS, RECOMMENDED FUNDING ADJUSTMENTS, AND

STRATEGIC PLAN TO COMPLETE PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

#### **Summary**

The Proposition K: L.A. for Kids program is currently in its 27<sup>th</sup> year of a 30-year authority. The City is authorized to collect up to \$25 million in annual assessments for a total funding of \$750 million over the life of the program. The program was established in November 1996, by passage of the Proposition K Ballot Measure approved by the City voters, with allowable funding use restricted to capital development of youth recreational and cultural facilities, along with associated administrative and maintenance expenses.

In order to plan for the program's successful completion, the program management team has worked on various reconciliation activities and recommendations that are presented in this report and its supporting attachments, as follows:

- 1. Reconciliation of Program Years (PYs) 1-26 of the Of the Proposition K program;
- 2. Status updates on completed, active, and phased projects; and,
- 3. Policy considerations and funding recommendations for accomplishing the remaining Proposition K funding requirements by committing the program's surplus funding capacity to offset the funding gap currently projected for the remaining projects the City is obligated to complete under the program and identifying potential alternative funding sources. This report is also responsive to the Council Motion directing staff to report on the status of the Proposition K program and provide a strategic plan for accomplishing the remaining program requisites (C.F. 12-1670-S1).

Due to aggressive efforts to deliver on the commitments made to City residents, the majority of the Proposition K funding requirements have already been satisfied with three

additional PYs remaining. Staff has worked over the course of the last year on reconciliation activities and cost projections to serve as a framework for developing a strategic plan to complete the remaining Proposition K funding requirements.

Pursuant to the terms of the Proposition K Ballot Measure authorizing the program, the City is required to complete 183 specified projects and award a minimum of \$143.65 million in competitive funds across eight funding categories. As of the current PY, 150 of the 183 specified projects have been completed or have been deemed infeasible (Attachment 2). There are 33 specified projects remaining, 29 of which are in active development (Attachment 5), and of these 16 have phased components (Attachment 4). Throughout ten award cycles, the cumulative level of competitive grant awards total \$145 million. However, although there has been \$12.8 million is excess funding awarded under three of the competitive funding categories, an additional \$11.4 million in future competitive grants still needs to be awarded in order to satisfy the Ballot Measure requirements.

As reflected in the chart below, all the remaining non-specified funding requirements can be fully funded for \$29.1 million in Proposition K funds. The remaining funding capacity for the specified funding program totals \$45.9 million. Of this amount, the maximum level of funding that active and future specified projects qualify for totals \$31.2 million, based on the established inflation and interest award rates (Attachments 5 and 8). This leaves a surplus funding capacity of \$14.7 million after all program requirements have been satisfied. This surplus funding capacity is recommended to offset funding shortfalls for remaining specified projects.

One of the allowable uses of program funds defined in the Proposition K Ballot Measure is the award of inflationary adjustments for specified projects. At the time the current inflation and interest award rates were established, various assumptions were made as to the timing and costs of projects that although reasonable at the time, do not reflect the reality that currently confronts the program. The Bureau of Engineering (BOE) has developed cost estimates for the 33 remaining specified projects, with an estimated

funding gap of \$89.9 million after accounting for all committed and future earmarks of supplemental funding sources (Attachment 8). The Steering Committee recommends utilizing all available resources in order to fulfill the programs mandates including utilizing all surplus funding capacity to address the funding shortfalls projected for the remaining set of specified projects, reprogramming remaining funding as available from completed projects, down-scoping projects or seeking alternative delivery methods as appropriate, and seeking additional supplemental funding sources.

It is recommended that the remaining \$14.7 million in surplus funding capacity, which can only be used for eligible Proposition K program expenses, also be used to offset project shortfalls, which would reduce the estimated funding gap to \$75.3 million. The surplus funding capacity that exists under the program is partially attributable to the inflationary allowance defined for specified projects in the program Ballot Measure. A significant level of surplus capacity has also been generated through deliberate efforts of the part of the Steering Committee to leverage supplemental funding sources, such as federal and state grants, to offset costs that would have otherwise been funded by Proposition K monies. Additional savings are attributable to sound financial management exercised during the first half of the program to deliver active projects within available funds and maximize the level of funds retained for future use to complete the remaining program mandates.

As part of the annual budget process, program assessment funds must be obligated through contractual agreements, awards to City departments, or through eligible labor costs incurred by City staff. Any unobligated portion of assessment funds would be permanently lost to the program. In addition to the \$25 million in program assessment funds collected from local residents annually, the Proposition K program also generates interest earnings that are not subject to the same annual funding obligation requirements. The Steering Committee recommends that interest earnings be utilized to offset project shortfalls as projects enter into active development, subject to Council approval, in order to accelerate completion of these remaining specified projects. Subject to approval to commit these funds, the surplus funding capacity projected for the program would increase by an additional \$9.0 million. It is anticipated that there will also be unspent funds remaining for completed projects that will be identified as closeout procedures are completed and recommended for programming through future reports to Council.

Conceptual approval is recommended to utilize the program's surplus funding capacity to address shortfalls projected for the remaining Proposition K specified projects identified in Attachment 8, in excess of the current inflation and interest award rates. As discussed in report section 5, the Proposition K program is not subject to the same use restrictions as other assessment programs adopted following the passage of Proposition 218. The City Attorney has confirmed there are no legal authorities that expressly allow or prohibit the recommended use of the program's surplus funding capacity. However, the City Attorney also states that there is the possibility of legal challenges from City property owners who may assert that there was an expectation that the City would commit non-program funding sources to offset funding shortfalls for specified projects in excess

of the levels authorized in the Proposition K Ballot Measure, inclusive of inflationary adjustments from program inflation and interest monies.

As of the current year, there is only partial cost recovery for project delivery expenses funded by the City's General Fund. Additionally, capital monies derived from City funding sources are regularly utilized to offset funding shortfalls for Proposition K projects, as reflected in the report recommendations. It is the intent of the Steering Committee to continue leveraging capital funds from both City and external funding sources, to the extent that these monies are available. However due to the magnitude of shortfalls projected for some of the remaining specified projects, the most viable means for moving these projects into active development is to utilize a portion of the program's surplus funding capacity, as recommended. The Steering Committee is also sensitive to the issue of funding equity and will continue to monitor the geographic distribution of funds and take necessary measures to address any current or future imbalances over the course of the remaining program years.

The reimbursement of project delivery costs advanced by the General Fund has been irregular due to the need to prioritize use of available monies to fund the capital improvements the City is required to accomplish under the terms of the Proposition K Ballot Measure. Beginning in 2009-10, the General Fund has received one-time revenues from savings remaining from completed projects. Program staff anticipates identifying additional residual funds at the conclusion of closeout activities currently underway that may be available to provide additional reimbursement of prior-year General Fund expenses. However, given the continued need to prioritize use of available monies to fund the capital improvements, General Fund reimbursements may continue to be irregular.

The remaining report recommendations enable authorities needed to complete the program reconciliation for prior program year. Additional administrative considerations adopted by the L.A. for Kids Steering Committee at its meeting held on September 28, 2023, are reflected in section 6 of this report.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

That the City Council, subject to the approval of the Mayor:

Program Reconciliation: Program Years 1-26

- Authorize staff to identify and transfer unspent funds remaining for completed projects (Attachments 2 and 3) to new accounts within the Proposition K program entitled "Residual Funds for Reprogramming," with a specific use of these monies to be presented for Council and Mayor approval in a forthcoming report.
- 2. Accept the work completed by external funding sources as having satisfied the Proposition K scope requirements for four specified project phases identified in report section 3d and authorize staff to process reimbursements to the General Fund for project expenses incurred on these projects.

### Future Projects: Program Years 28-30

- 3. Approve in concept the use of the Proposition K program surplus funding capacity, as identified in Attachment 1, to offset the funding shortfalls projected for the future specified projects with the actual awards to be reauthorized by separate Council action(s).
- 4. Authorize the tentative earmark of \$9.0 million in Proposition K program interest funds, to reduce the shortfall for the design and construction activities for four future specified projects identified in Attachment 8.

#### Controller's Instructions and Technical Adjustments

- 5. Authorize the Controller to adjust balances within the Proposition K Funds (Fund Nos. 43K, 43L, 43M) to effectuate the funding adjustments associated with Recommendations 1 and 2 above, in accordance with instructions to be provided by the Office of the City Administrative Officer.
- Authorize the CAO to prepare technical adjustments, as needed to carry out the intent of the Council action and authorize the Controller to implement those technical adjustments.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT**

There is no additional impact on the General Fund as the funding commitments recommended through the report recommendations are funded by Special Fund monies. To the extent that the Proposition K surplus funding capacity discussed in this report can be utilized to fund the cost of the remaining specified projects, the level of cost offsets incurred by the General Fund for project delivery costs would decrease. Program staff are completing closeout activities and expect to identify residual funds for completed projects that could potentially be used to offset remaining shortfalls for Ballot mandated specified projects.

An award of \$9 million in Proposition K interest funds is recommended to address funding shortfalls for four out of the 33 specified projects remaining in the program (Attachment 8), which have the largest shortfalls. Specific cost estimates for operating and maintaining the projects addressed through the funding recommendations of this report have not yet been developed, but will be addressed through the City budget as projects are completed.

#### CITY FINANCIAL POLICIES STATEMENT

Approval of the recommendations in this report are in compliance with the City's Financial Policies as there is no fiscal impact to the General Fund.

#### DISCUSSION

#### 1. Basis for Report

With four years remaining in the Proposition K program, the program management team has conducted an extensive reconciliation in order to accomplish the following objectives:

- a. Provide a complete report on program accomplishments during PYs 1-26;
- b. Report on active projects in development as of the current PY 27;
- c. Provide the status of active projects presented in section 4 of this report and the accompanying Attachments 4-6; and,
- d. Develop a strategic plan for accomplishing the remaining program requirements over PYs 28-30.

### 2. Program Background and Funding Requirements

The Proposition K program, currently in its 27<sup>th</sup> year of a 30-year authorization, was established by the adoption of a Ballot Measure approved by City voters in November 1996. Under the terms of the Ballot Measure, the City is allowed to collect up to \$25 million in annual assessments for a 30-year period covering FYs 1997-98 through 2026-27. Proposition K assessment funds can only be used for capital improvements or acquisition costs associated with youth recreational projects, program administration, maintenance of completed capital projects and debt service on bond financed projects.

The L.A. for Kids Steering Committee (Steering Committee) was created by City Ordinance as the program's administering entity (Los Angeles Administrative Code section 8.325). Committee membership consists of representatives from the Offices of the Mayor, the Chief Legislative Analyst (CLA) and the City Administrative Officer (CAO) with the latter serving as the chair. Council transferred project management from the Commission for Children, Youth and their Families to the BOE in April 2002 (C.F. 02-0600-S51) and administration of the programs competitive awards process in December 2003 (C.F. 03-0515-S2). The CAO staff serves as the program administrator.

Over the life of the program, the City is required to award a minimum of \$143.65 million in competitive grants and complete 183 projects specified in the Ballot Measure with predefined scope requirements. The specified projects are further divided into two categories:

- a. Regional projects that serve multiple Council Districts or the City as a whole; and,
- b. Local projects serving a small number of communities within the same District.

The Ballot Measure specifies expenditure ratios that the City must achieve over the 30-year life of the program for capital expenses (82%), maintenance of Proposition K funded projects (15%) and administration (3%). State law prohibits the use of Proposition K funds on program operations. The funding limits and use restrictions for the three funding categories are:

### 3. Reconciliation of Program Years 1 through 26

The program management staff conducted a financial review of all program expenditures during the first 26 years of the program. As part of the review, staff validated the cumulative funding levels for the three major categories of program expenses, as outlined in the preceding section. Staff also conducted an extensive review to confirm the development and funding status of all projects initiated during PYs 1-26.

### a. Cumulative Expenses by Program Funding Categories

Inclusive of funds budgeted for 2023-24, the chart below reflects the cumulative funding levels for the three major categories of program expenses and the estimated level of funds available for future years. The proposed expenditure schedule for the remaining program years is reflected in Attachment 1, along with a detailed itemization of the funding expended in prior program years.

#### b. Validation of Project Completions - Specified & Competitive

The project management team conducted a comprehensive review of projects funded during PYs 1-26, finding substantial compliance with the following evaluation criteria:

- Completion of full scope requirements supported by acceptable documentation;
- Expended funds do not exceed the maximum Proposition K funding level applicable to each project; and,
- Proposition K program monies used to fund a portion or all of the required scope elements.

In total there are 373 completed projects which includes 150 specified projects and 223 competitive projects, as summarized below and detailed in Attachments 2 and 3, respectively.

Since several critical functions, including program management responsibilities were transitioned during the initial years of the program, many of the early program closeout documents needed to substantiate project closeouts were not readily available or needed to be supported by alternate documentation. With few exceptions, the program management team has been successful in compiling appropriate documentation to substantiate project completions. Similarly, some of the most recently completed projects are awaiting final acceptance documentation. Any outstanding documentation noted in the report attachments will be obtained through follow-up activities, with a subsequent report to the Steering Committee on final outcomes.

<sup>\*\*</sup> Specified projects have defined scopes and funding limits established by the Ballot Measure.

The completed project count does not included a total of 16 phased projects that are in various stages of completion, as detailed in Attachment 4. These phased projects will be added to the completed projects list in future years once the full scope requirements of the overall project have been satisfied.

#### c. Recommended Offset for Funding Overages – Completed Projects

Of the projects completed under the program since the last reconciliation, only two received excess assessment funds totaling \$32,724, as detailed in Attachment 10. This overage is recommended to be offset by the return of \$32,724 in unspent funds awarded to the respective projects detailed in Attachment 10.

#### d. Crediting the Program for Projects Completed with External Funding

Various components of the Proposition K specified scope requirements may have been satisfied by external funding sources. The City Attorney has advised that in order to credit the program for satisfying the respective scope requirements, Proposition K funds must reimburse a portion of the incurred expenses. The program management team will process General Fund reimbursements for costs incurred on the projects identified below:

#### e. Competitive Program – Cumulative Funding for Cycles 1-10

The Ballot Measure established minimum funding levels for eight categories of competitive projects. At this time, the program has met and exceeded three of these categories by \$12.8 million. In order to satisfy the funding requirements for the remaining two categories, an additional \$11.4 million in competitive funds will need to be awarded prior to the sunset of the program in 2026-27, as reflected in the chart below:

### f. Options for Future Competitive Funding Cycle(s)

Staff recommends limiting future awards of competitive funding to satisfy the \$11.4 million in additional funding awards that are needed to satisfy the minimum funding requirements for the two remaining funding categories as reflected in the chart above. This will enable the program to fully satisfy the competitive funding requirements established in the Proposition K Ballot Measure, while preserving the maximum level of surplus funding capacity remaining under the program to address the funding requirements of the specified program (refer to report section 5).

### g. Competitive Program – Regional Distribution of Funds

At the onset of every funding cycle, an equal level of competitive funds is assigned to each of the three Proposition K funding regions for the Central, Southern, and Valley regions. At this point in the program there is an imbalance between the levels of funds currently awarded between the three regions as reflected below. However, in various rounds there were insufficient eligible requests for funding to award at the maximum level of funds available for each of the respective regions. Rescinded awards and reprogramming actions also impacted the regional distribution of competitive funding.

As part of the programmatic reconciliation conducted in 2018-2019, the regional funding imbalance was reported as:

Efforts were made to reduce the cumulative funding imbalance by awarding additional funds to the Central and Southern regions as part of the Tenth competitive funding cycle that awarded a total of \$4.4 million. However, the additional funding provided through the Tenth cycle was not sufficient to achieve an equitable funding distribution across three geographic regions, as reflected in the chart below:

The variance in funding across regions is attributable to various factors that include award rescissions, reprogramming actions, redistricting and low levels of eligible funding requests within a given region, relative to the level of funds available.

As presented in Section 3e, the City will need to award an additional \$11.4 million in competitive funds through an 11<sup>th</sup> award cycle to fully satisfy the funding requirements defined for the program. An effort will be made to reduce the variance in cumulative funding between the respective regions.

### h. Competitive Program – Service and Maintenance Requirements

As a condition for receiving Proposition K competitive funds, grant recipients are contractually obligated to provide specific services over a set term of years. The service and maintenance requirements and preliminary compliance status for the completed competitive projects is reflected in Attachment 3. BOE is in the process of providing technical support to agencies that are not currently in full compliance with their service and maintenance terms. BOE will report to the Steering Committee with

suggested follow-up for any competitive grantee that remains out of compliance with the respective service and maintenance terms.

### i. Competitive Program – Award Rescissions

There are 19 competitive projects for which the grant recipients have provided written requests to rescind all or a portion of the respective grant awards or have been rescinded by Council action (Attachment 11). As summarized below, \$7.9 million has been reprogrammed to other competitive projects and the current funding available for reprogramming is \$763,082.

As part of the annual Proposition K budget process, applicants that did not receive the full level of funding requested through the competitive award cycles are added to the "Proposition K C-List of Alternative Projects." These C-List projects can potentially receive funding that becomes available from competitive projects that are withdrawn or rescinded. Action to officially reprogram the competitive grant awards identified above will need to be deferred in order to provide sufficient time for staff to assess the viability of projects eligible to receive the \$763,082 in competitive funds at issue. Potentially these monies could be utilized to reduce the regional funding imbalance as discussed in section 3g of this report.

### 4. Status of Active Projects and Options to Offset Funding Shortfalls

There are currently 46 projects in various phases of active development, including those in pre-design, design, acquisition, construction, and post-construction. The active project count includes 29 specified projects and 18 competitive projects, with a full listing provided in Attachments 5 and 6, respectively.

The Project Management Team has examined the funding status for the seven Proposition K projects which have been identified as being in active construction. Shortfalls have been identified for projects that are in pre-design, design, and in the bid and award stage and as the scopes and budget estimates for active projects are refined, particularly those in early phases of development, additional funding strategies will be developed. Shortfalls beyond the current estimates will be addressed in subsequent years with program funds and supplemental monies available to the program.

#### a. Shortfall Funding Recommendations for Active Projects

The Steering Committee has previously recommended the use of available supplemental program funding sources to maximize the number of active funding shortfalls that are resolved, while working within the various funding restrictions that apply to the individual funding sources. Program funding sources that are typically used to offset project funding shortfalls include: Proposition K inflation and interest funds, Measure A, Quimby, Capital and Technology Improvement Expenditure Program (CTIEP), Park and Recreational Sites and Facilities (Sites and Facilities) Fund, and the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

In developing a funding strategy to address the estimated funding needs of projects in active construction staff accounted for all committed and future earmarks of supplemental funding sources available to the program, as identified in attachment 7. These include Proposition K inflation and interest awards, Sites and Facilities, MICLA, Proposition 68, Quimby, General Fund, General City Purpose, RAP Deferred Maintenance, Proposition K surplus funding, CRA/LA Excess Bond Funds, and Council Office Discretionary funds.

#### b. City Cost Recovery for Administration, Maintenance, and Project Delivery Costs

Since the inception of the program, City departments have received partial funding for program administration and project maintenance costs at levels that remain fairly stable from one year to the next. However, the reimbursement of project delivery costs advanced by the General Fund has been irregular due to the need to prioritize use of available monies to fund the required Proposition K capital improvements the City is required to complete. Beginning in 2009-10, the General Fund has received one-time revenues from savings remaining from completed Proposition K projects.

Efforts to recover additional administration and program costs supported by the General Fund will continue as part of an ongoing administrative review of the program. As the program's surplus capacity is unlikely to be sufficient to fully fund the costs of capital improvements and the City's associated project delivery costs, the annual offsets provided by the General Fund are not likely to increase. Program staff does expect to identify additional residual funds remaining from completed projects once closeout activities currently underway are concluded. These residual funds would be available to provide additional funding to support the completion of capital projects and thus lessen the burden on other funding sources.

However, as part of the administrative validation, staff compared the amount set-aside for the County Recorder fees to the amount collected per PY retroactive to the previous reconciliation performed in 2014 and found surplus funds available for potential reimbursement of administrative costs advanced by the General Fund.

#### 5. Remaining Program Requirements and Plan for Completion

As presented in the preceding sections of this report, the majority of the funding requirements defined in the Proposition K Ballot Measure have been satisfied as of the current PY 27. In an effort to develop a plan for completing remaining program requirements, the program management team has developed cost projections for the remaining specified projects (Attachment 8). After accounting for all the remaining program expenses and remaining program funds there is a significant funding shortfall estimated at \$75 million. This shortfall will be partially addressed through the reprogramming of residual funding from completed projects as project close-outs continue, the application of interest awards as discussed in section 4 of this report, the use of down-scoping and alternative delivery methods, and the securing of alternative funding sources available to the program such as Sites and Facilities, Quimby, Park Fees, Measure A, CDBG, and CTIEP.

#### 1. Surplus Funding Capacity – Proposed Use to Offset Specified Project Shortfalls

As reflected in Attachment 1, the funding capacity for the remaining 3 years authorized for the Proposition K program totals \$75 million. Of this total, \$29.11 million is needed to satisfy all non-specified program funding requirements:

- Program administration (\$3.44 million);
- Maintenance for completed projects (\$14.28 million); and,
- Competitive grant awards (\$11.39 million).

This leaves a remaining funding capacity of \$45.89 million to complete all the active and future specified projects (Attachments 5 and 8). As summarized in the chart below, there is a surplus funding capacity of \$14.67 million after reserving the maximum level of:

- Proposition K specified funds that both active and future projects are entitled to receive; and,
- Proposition K inflation and interest monies that active and future projects qualify for based on the current rates of award.

#### 2. <u>Current Award Policy – Proposition K Inflation and Interest Funds</u>

Proposition K inflation and interest monies are primarily used to offset project funding shortfalls for specified projects that are attributable to cost escalation over the course of the 30 year program. Proposition K inflation funds are programmed each year as part of the \$25 million annual program budget. Program interest funds are outside of the annual budget and are in addition to annual assessment fund collections. The interest funds are program revenues in the form of interest earnings on the assessment funds and collection penalties. Program interest monies can also be used to offset shortfalls in annual collections or to accelerate program outcomes by funding expenses in excess of the \$25 million annual spending limit applied to program assessment funds.

In a memorandum dated February 4, 2003, the City Attorney provides background on how these rates were established, the applicable use restrictions and the conditions required to implement a revised award policy. In the 2014 Reconciliation of the Proposition K program the program management team presented key features of the current inflation and interest award policies which are outlined below and in current use:

- Specified projects are eligible to receive a maximum inflation allowance of three percent each program year starting from Program Year 2 through the year the constructing contract is awarded.
- An objective index is used to determine the maximum award of interest funds that
  a specified project is eligible to receive (currently the Department of Labor,
  Producer Price Index is used).
- The interest award eligibility level is reduced by the amount of inflation funds awarded to the respective projects.
- The combined level of inflation and interest funds awarded to a project is further limited to the shortfall funding level identified at the time of construction award.

 Competitive projects are ineligible to receive inflation/interest funds since project estimates are provided in response to periodic Request for Proposals and should therefore reflect current cost estimates that account for inflationary factors over the course of the construction term.

#### 3. Proposed Award Policy – Proposition K Inflation and Interest Funds

The City Attorney advises there is no expressed prohibition to utilize the program's surplus funding capacity as recommended in this report. However, the City Attorney also states there is the possibility of legal challenges from the City property owners who may assert that there was an expectation that the City would commit non-program funding sources to offset funding shortfalls for specified projects in excess of the levels authorized in the Proposition K Ballot Measure, inclusive of inflationary adjustments from program inflation and interest monies.

Even with the proposed use of the program's surplus capacity, the Steering Committee still intends to continue its practice leveraging supplemental funding from City sources, along with County, State and Federal grants, as available. As reflected in the report recommendations and supporting attachments, City capital funds along with other non-program funding sources are being used to offset shortfalls projected for the active Proposition K projects.

It is also important to recognize that since the Proposition K program was established by City voters at the time Proposition 218 was adopted, the program is not subject to the various restrictions that apply to other assessment programs. Under the terms of Proposition 218, assessment fees are limited to the special benefits directly assignable to individual property owners in association with the capital projects to be funded by the assessment fees. The Proposition K Ballot Measure, by contrast, allows for a broader use of assessment funds, with specified projects serving communities across multiple Council Districts.

Absent specific legal restrictions, approval in concept to utilize the program's surplus funding capacity, as identified in Attachment 1, to offset the funding shortfalls projected for the remaining specified projects is recommended up to the amounts specified in Attachment 8. The actual award levels would be subject to separate approval on the part of the Steering Committee, Council and the Mayor, as part of the annual budget at the time the respective projects are ready to proceed into construction.

#### 4. High Shortfall Specified Projects

Proposition K assessment funds must be obligated against incurred expenses or through contractual agreements prior to the close of every fiscal year to avoid the permanent loss of unobligated funds. These restrictions are in place to ensure that the program is only collecting the minimum level of funds from City property owners that are needed to support current program activities, in conformance with applicable State

and federal law. Program interest funds, while generally treated with the same considerations as program assessment monies, do not originate as program collections, but are generated as program revenues on assessment funds.

Since Proposition K interest funds are less restrictive, funding earmarks totaling \$9.0 million are recommended for future use to offset the funding shortfalls for the four highest shortfall specified projects. The recommended use of program interest funds would commit funding that is currently not utilized or needed for other program purposes to accelerate outcomes for completion of the remaining specified projects.

### 6. Steering Committee Policy Recommendations

Due to aggressive efforts to deliver on the funding commitments made to City residents through the Proposition K Ballot Measure, the majority of the program requirements have already been satisfied through the current Program Year 27, with three additional years remaining. As presented in report section 3, the program management team completed full financial reconciliation for prior program years and substantiated full scope compliance for the 373 completed specified and competitive projects that are listed in Attachments 2 and 3. Staff has also evaluated the funding needs of the 46 active Proposition K projects that are in different phases of development, as identified in Attachments 5 and 6. With a confirmed list of completed projects and sufficient funding available to address the funding needs identified at this time for projects in active construction, it is possible to estimate the level of funding available to complete the remaining program mandates over the course of the final three years of the Proposition K program.

As presented earlier in the report, all non-specified program requirements will be fully funded with the commitment of \$29.1 million, or the equivalent of 1.2 years of annual program collections, leaving \$45.9 million in funding capacity to complete the specified program (Attachment 1). Of this balance, the active and future specified projects are entitled to receive \$31.2 million in additional specified funds, inclusive of program inflation and interest monies calculated based on the established rates of award. This leaves a surplus capacity of \$14.7 million, all of which is recommended to address the funding shortfall estimated for the 33 remaining specified projects identified in Attachment 8.

In addition to the \$25 million in annual assessment funds collected from local property owners, the program also generates revenues as interest earnings. A total of \$9.0 million in available program interest funds are recommended for tentative earmark at this time to address the shortfall estimated for the four projects with the largest projected funding shortfalls included as part of the 33 future specified projects identified in Attachment 8. Program interest monies are recommended for commitment to these projects because they are not subject to the same annual obligation requirements as program assessment funds.

In order to implement the various recommendations presented throughout the preceding sections of this report, the report recommendations include actions that require Council

and Mayor approval. Additional policy considerations that were adopted by the L.A. for Kids Steering Committee at its meeting held September 28, 2023, are listed below:

### Program Reconciliation: Program Years 1-26

- 1. Approve the completed projects lists for the Proposition K Specified and Competitive program (Attachments 2 and 3), and direct staff to provide an updated status of project completions by September of all subsequent program years;
- Request that the Department of Recreation and Parks and the Bureau of Engineering (BOE), with assistance of the City Administrative Officer, provide the necessary documentation and formal procedures to complete the closeout of completed projects (Attachments 2 and 3);
- 3. Authorize staff to incorporate needed adjustments to the adopted 2023-24 Proposition K Four Year Budget to reflect the final confirmed funding levels for projects completed in prior program years, as reflected in the report attachments;

### Active Projects: Program Year 27

4. Direct BOE to provide technical assistance to competitive grant recipients that are not currently in compliance with their respective service and maintenance terms and report to the Steering Committee on any projects that are not in compliance at that time, including recommendations for appropriate actions needed to achieve compliance (Attachment 3);

### Future Projects: Program Years 28-30

- Direct BOE to report to the Steering Committee with recommendations for award of the \$11.4 million in additional competitive funds needed to satisfy the Ballot Measure requirements, including suggested options for achieving a more equitable distribution of funds across the Central, Southern, and Valley regions; and,
- 6. Authorize BOE to proceed with award of design contracts for the four highest shortfall future specified projects (Attachment 8), subject to completion of the necessary environmental documents (Attachment 12), and direct staff to provide a report on the status of these projects, including revised funding projections and project timelines.

The purpose of this letter is to inform the Proposition K: LA for Kids Steering Committee that the Proposition K grant in the amount of \$180,000 awarded to the Community Redevelopment Agency of Los Angeles ("CRA/LA") and Grand Performances for the Cal Plaza Awnings Project ("Project") will regrettably need to be returned to the City of Los Angeles.

CRA/LA staff was recently informed that the Grand Performances Board of Directors has elected not to proceed with the Proposition K grant in light of recent changes to the corporate ownership of California Plaza (see attached). Located in Bunker Hill, California Plaza is a Class "A" office development and consists of two towers and the California Plaza Watercourt (which includes the Project site, the Marina Pavilion amphitheater). The current owner of the One California Plaza tower, Maguire Properties, recently acquired the Two California Plaza lower on April 24, 2007 and, as a result, has since embarked on a comprehensive review of its newly acquired asset in addition to the rest of its portfolio holdings in Bunker Hill. Therefore, as future plans for California Plaza have yet to be determined, the Grand Performances Board has decided that it would be prudent to return the Proposition K grant at this time.



Thank you for the opportunity to submit this letter in response to your letter of September 12, 2019. People Coordinated Services of Southern California, Inc. (PCS) is appreciative to Proposition K for the designation of funds towards the construction of the Youth and Family Center. PCS had a contract with your office which we were under the impression had expired on December 31, 2017. PCS had not sought a contract extension because the \$700,300 funding alone would not have been sufficient to complete the Project, thereby we did not expend any of the funds. I had been advised by your office and State of California Department of Parks and Recreation that no additional funding was available for the project.

While PCS worked arduously towards the goal of completion of the Youth and Family Center construction, multiple challenges ensued such as unexpected underground conditions, massive number of change orders - numerous of which PCS did not agree with. PCS and its Legal Counsel subsequently concluded that it would be in the best interest of the agency to end the contract with the contractor. PCS did receive an Unconditional Waiver and Lien Release for the final payment that was paid to the Contractor and there were no outstanding financial or other liabilities for PCS or the Contractor.

It should be noted that PCS had continued efforts to complete the project, in fact; we provided 24 hours security to ensure the protection of the property, however; no additional funding was forthcoming. Our contract with the State required completion by March 31, 2019. No extension was available. The State sought to



achieve first ownership of the property, which certainly was not a viable option for PCS. Considering that PCS had to repay the State agencies more than 2.6 million dollars, we had no choice except to investigate the option to sale wherein the State could be reimbursed and PCS, as a non-profit that was founded in 1939, would not have such liabilities. The State of California signed the Release of Deed Restriction, authorizing the sale.

PCS is therefore, respectfully requesting that the Proposition K Grant Agreement No. C-115607 be rescinded. The property will be utilized to build low income housing, a project that would support the PCS mission. While we regret the necessity not to complete the project, we are grateful that the property can be used to build low income housing, thereby meeting a critical housing need in South Los Angeles.

The grant agreement is secured by a Deed of Trust and Assignment of Rents, dated June 20, 2016, recorded against the property, specifically APNs: 6048-012-029, and 6048-012-028.

As you may be aware, CII has been in discussions with Jacob John for the past few months about changes to the original design and possible options related to the future of the

project as the grant agreement expired in June 2019 and we were unsure about how best to utilize the grant funds.

For these reasons, we can no longer implement the design and construction of greenspace as contemplated in the grant agreement, and we are writing to inform the City of Los Angeles that we will not opt to continue the project. We respectfully request that the funds originally allocated to Cli's project be released back to the City. We further request that the City reconvey and release the Deed of Trust and any other lien securing the Grant Agreement.
